tions fail, according to Lt. Col. Robert L. Irving, commanding officer, 1st battalion, 188th infantry, Oregon National Guard.

A radio crew from headquarters company at Medford, headed by First Lt. Jack W. Shartzew, was here last Sunday to erect an antenna on the armory roof, Col. Irving said.

He revealed that if tests indicate satisfactory performance, additional stations will be set up at Grants Pass and Myrtle Creek armories, permitting communications with all units of this battalion.

Lt. Col. Irving said it is planned to add additional equipment under the military amateur radio system as soon as licensed operators are available at each station. This equipment will be powerful enough to operate under adverse conditions which might hamper field sets now in use, Irving revealed.

Monday evening's drill tests at the armory revealed that some additional adjustments are needed before routine messages can be transmitted. The set has a normal range of 25 miles, but with the addition of a long antenna, voice messages were transmitted to Medford, an airline distance of about

75 miles. In addition to the two permanent stations now being tested, first battalion headquarters also has a mobile set mounted in a three-quarter ton truck which is available in emergencies that may arise in areas now covered by the National Guard units.

### Paralysis Ends When Tot Reaches For Bunny

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., April 6.—Easter is going to be much happier for the Peterson family. Janice Peterson, 5, was struck down by a truck two weeks ago. After the accident she lapsed into a coma and didn't regain consciousness until last Tuesday. But her arm was paralyzed. Then yesterday an Easter bunny was brought to the hospital in connection with a merchant-sponsored Easter season observance.

Janice reached out with the arm that had been paralyzed to touch the bunny. Her mother, Mrs. R. D. Peterson, wept with joy. Doctors said the child probably will recover and that she was suffering from shock.

## Cancer Caused By Genes, New Clues Indicate

PALO ALTO, Calif., April 5.—(AP)—New evidence supporting the theory that cancer is caused by changes in genes, the hereditary factors in living cells, was reported Wednesday by two Stanford university researchers.

Dr. Edward L. Tatum and Dr. Raymond W. Barrett, biologists, made the tests on neurospora, which are single cells of mold but which like human cells contain genes. They reported the results to the American Cancer society.

Nine different kinds of rays and chemicals which are known to cause cancer in animals and humans were used on the neurospora. This was not done in any attempt to produce cancer in the neurospora but rather to see what other things the rays and chemicals could do to a single cell.

Seven of the nine rays and chemicals caused terrific increases in the number of gene changes in the mold cells. The changes took place at rates ranging from four to 200 times normal.

Since a gene change means a change also in some characteristic of the whole cell, the results suggested but did not prove that this is the process by which the rays and chemicals turn normal cells into malignant ones.

The next step in this research is to track neurospora with some chemicals which are structurally similar to these cancer causes but which never have produced malignancy in experimental animals.

If these non-cancer causing relatives do not produce gene changes in the neurospora the experimenters then will have strong evidence in support of the genetic theory of malignancy.

LOS ANGELES, April 6.—(AP)—An autopsy today may help clear up the mysterious death of Mrs. Sally Oswald, 39, whose nude body was found yesterday in a hotel room with ink scribbles on her back and chest.

Police were unable to determine immediately whether she committed suicide, died of alcoholism or natural causes, or was slain.
