The Hollywood Stars today are in their familiar spot on top of the Pacific Coast league standings, have reached there by lousing in their Seattle hotel lobby and watching it rain.

While the Stars-Seattle contest was rained out last night, San Diego blasted Los Angeles 10-4 behind the six-hit pitching of Roy Welmaker. He whiffed an even dozen Angels in chalking up his third win without loss in this infant season. The loss put the Angels a half-game behind the Stars.

The Padres knocked Jack (Cactus) Kraus out of the box in the first with three run barrage. In the eighth, San Diego walloped five successive singles off two Angel hurlers for four more runs and picked up three more runs in the ninth. San Francisco introduced day ball on Wednesday by taking Sacramento 4-3. Les Fleming smacked a three run homer and Jackie Tobin batted in the game clincher. Tobin threw a strike from left field to nip what looked like a sure Solon run in the eighth. Solon pitcher Frank Dasso set the Seals down with only three hits but was much too free with walks to capitalize.

NCAA Revises Tourney Set-Up

CHICAGO, April 6.—(AP)—The National Collegiate Athletic association revised its basketball tournament set-up, approving a 16-team meet which would double the present eight-team field.

The NCAA's executive committee approved in principle a recommendation by basketball tourney chairman Arthur (Dutch) Lomborg calling for the enlarged meet. The plan calls for two eight-team, east-west semi-finals and a four-team final.

Details of the new set-up will be completed within two weeks.

Lomborg said in a report to the executive committee that the eight-team tourney failed in its purpose to provide the wide competition that exists in such other NCAA meets as track, swimming, boxing, wrestling, etc. In all, the NCAA

Shuttle-Relay Track Event Due At Meet

Something new in the way of track events may be tried at the three-day meet slated for Friday afternoon at Finlay field, between Roseburg, Myrtle Point and Coquille cinder squads.

Coach Frank Purdy, who already has introduced one new event—the weight man's relay—said a shuttle-relay relay may be included Friday, provided the other competing schools have on hand enough hurdlers.

The shuttle relay is an "old standby" at the Hayward relays, held annually at Eugene. Three men participated in each team, running 100 yards, all the while jumping over hurdles set up at strategic points along the route. A total of 324 yards are involved in the race, and makes for a "good" spectator event, Purdy said.

Purdy's weight men's relay is designed to furnish football teams with fast material. Usually, the heavier lads participated in the weight events, and all are just as usually football players, or at least, football aspirants. The event keeps them moving at a fast clip and they are ready to go, comes fall.

Purdy's boys have been taking it easy this week, what with spring vacations and all. Purdy himself is on the field from 2 to 7 p.m. each day, but the speedsters drift in at all hours, and the entire team is never there, all at the same time.

Purdy said that in the Friday meet, weight events will start promptly at 1:30 p.m. and running events start at 2 o'clock.

Former Gridiron Ace Raps Out 5 Hits For Cincy

The shift from grinding out yardage off tackle to banging baseballs off major league fences may turn out all right yet for Cincinnati outfielder Lloyd Merriman.

Stanford's former backfield ace, scrapping for a regular center-field spot, had a great day yesterday. Considered a light hitter, Merriman smacked a three-run homer in Cincy's 16-5 victory over the Atlanta Crackers. Better yet, he added four more hits.

In his first season up last year, the inexperienced Merriman hit only 230 in 103 games. He broke in with Columbia of the South Atlantic league in 1948, batting .298.

Detroit's Hoot Evers also had a heavy day. Evers keeps on hitting the long ones, this time two home runs in the Tigers' 11-9 victory over Macon. One came with the bases full.

Two New York pitchers hurled complete games. Larry Jansen of the Giants allowed Cleveland only four hits in New York's 8-2 victory. But watch out Joe Page: Allie Reynolds also lasted nine innings and he defeated the Cardinals, 8-4.

All last season Reynolds pitched only four complete games while winning 17, most of them with the help of relief pitcher Page. Another milestone, Reynolds is the first Yankee pitcher to go the route this spring.

Joe DiMaggio's legs gave out again. The great outfielder pulled a muscle in his calf while running to first but he is expected back in the lineup in a few days.

Billy Southworth seems happy with his Boston Braves this spring. The veteran manager chirps, "it's the best Boston squad I've ever brought north."

Only drawback is first baseman Earl Torgeson's twisted knee. The young infielder is leaving the squad for Boston to take treatments.

Southworth labeled utility infielder Connie Ryan as "my first baseman until further notice."

In the last few seasons the Chicago Cubs have come out on the wrong end of 22-12 scores. But not yesterday. They unloaded five homers, two by Andy Pafko, in walloping the St. Louis Browns.
