John Nowak filed suit in circuit court Wednesday for \$300 damages and costs, arising out of a collision between the automobile of the plaintiff and a logging truck of the defendant, William E. Tyrell.

According to the plaintiff's complaint, the defendant allegedly drove his truck "carelessly and recklessly" into the path of the plaintiff's car, so that it was impossible for the plaintiff to avoid striking the truck.

The automobile was damaged in the amount asked, the complaint adds.

CIO President's Peace Bid Meets Cold Response

WASHINGTON, April 6. — (AP) — Philip Murray's "friendly offer" of peace among the nation's big labor groups has met with sparse—and somewhat chill—response from the American Federation of Labor and the United Mine Workers.

The CIO president wrote major union groups proposing that they join his organization in setting up a standing committee with authority to work together on economic, political and legislative problems, and plan for eventual merger.

He called it "the most significant proposal of its kind that has been offered by the CIO to the AFL and these other organizations since the CIO was originally organized."

It went to AFL President William Green; John L. Lewis, president of the UMW, and to the heads of the International Association of Machinists, the Railway Labor Executives association, the Railroad Trainmen and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

"I have every reason to express the hope that a favorable reply will be forthcoming," Murray told reporters.

Green's associates here indicated that they would hold to their long-time stand that the two big federations must merge before they cooperate on anything.

Harold Lloyd Dons Specs For Shrine Inspection

PORTLAND, April 6. — (AP) — Harold Lloyd put on his horn-rimmed glasses Wednesday and had a big time inspecting the Shrine hospital for crippled children.

Lloyd, silent-era movie comedian, is the Shrine's imperial potentate and was here in the course of an inspection trip to temples and Shrine hospitals.

He said he was taking color movies at each of the Shrine's hospitals and hopes to put it together, with inserted bits of Hollywood's film famous, and release it as an entertainment and philanthropic venture.

The Shrine's hospital-for-children program was drafted in Portland in 1926 by the imperial council, Lloyd said, and the first one was built in Shreveport, La. The second was here.

"We've restored to health between 150,000 and 200,000 youngsters," he said, "and it costs us over \$2,000,000 a year."

He said the money comes from dues, football games, circuses and other events.

Choker Setter Demands Damages For Injuries

More than \$7,500 damages are asked by Howard Moore in a complaint filed in circuit court Wednesday, as a result of an accident suffered while in the employ of the defendant, Harbor Plywood Corp.

According to the complaint, Moore suffered an injury to his eye and face, when a piece of steel broke from a "mushroomed" hammer, while the plaintiff was occupied as a choker setter. The hammer was wielded by another employee, the complaint states.

The plaintiff alleges that failure to comply with the safety code of the Oregon State Industrial Accident commission as regards the proper maintenance of tools, was the direct result of the accident.

The plaintiff asks for special damages of \$527.60, for time alleged lost as a result of the accident.

Woman Tells Of Captivity In Mountain Cabin

TACOMA, April 6. — (AP) — A 25-year-old woman staggered into the sheriff's office here Tuesday night and told how she had been abducted and held captive in a mountain cabin for nearly three days by an unknown man.

Sheriff Lee Croft identified the woman as Mrs. Eleanor May Barnes, 25. He said the woman had related in a signed complaint that the man had unsuccessfully attempted to attack her in a lonely cabin near Ashford.

Mrs. Barnes' statement said she managed to escape at 3 a. m. yesterday and walked nearly 40 miles back to Tacoma. She kept to the woods most of the way for fear of being caught again by her abductor.

Croft quoted her statement as saying she was en route home from a baby sitting job when early Sunday her automobile lights went out.

While she was changing a fuse, the statement said, she was approached by a man who ordered her to drive to the Roy "Y", a highway intersection. He then took over the wheel and drove to the cabin, arriving about 4 a. m.

The sheriff said Mrs. Barnes' statement told of several attempts by her abductor to attack her before she escaped. Her clothing was badly torn when she reached the sheriff's office.

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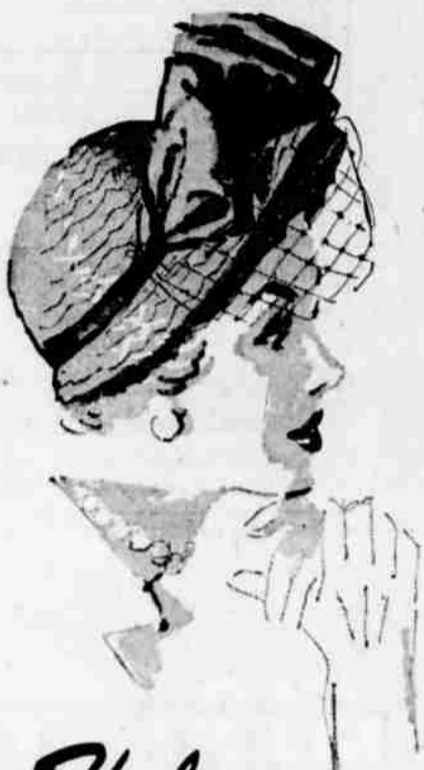
