

Oldest Parish In Washington Sets Rites On Easter

TOLEDO, Wash.—(AP)—The 112th observance of Easter in the state of Washington's oldest parish will take place Sunday in the pioneer St. Francis Xavier mission two miles north of here.

The worshippers will recall the first Easter service when Father Francis N. Blanchet said mass on March 31, 1839, for a small band of French Catholics.

No special ceremony will mark the 112th Easter observance, Rev. Dennis Mahoney, pastor, says, but the visitors to the mission church will have much to remind them of the founding ceremony.

Adjoining the church is the replica of the historic Catholic ladder by which Father Blanchet instructed the Indians of the Cowlitz prairie region in the early days of the mission. Nearby, too, is the old cemetery in which lie several of the northwest's illustrious pioneers, including Simon Plamondon, who was instrumental in bringing the first "black robes" to this area in 1838.

Records show that St. Francis mission is one of the earliest Catholic foundations of the Pacific Northwest, the first in the state of Washington, and consequently the mother church of the diocese of Seattle. The latter will observe its centenary this year.

The mission church is expected to be crowded for both masses Sunday.

Election Year Critical For Truman In View Of Mauling Given His Program By GOP

WASHINGTON. — (AP) — It's going to be interesting to see what President Truman does, if anything, to offset the battering his administration has received from the Republicans.

This is an important year for Mr. Truman. It's an election year, when the people will have to vote for all 435 members of the House and 36 of the 96 senators.

Although right now the Democrats have a majority in both houses, Mr. Truman's program—at least the part of it which affects us at home—hasn't been doing well.

His plan for middle-income housing got knocked on the head. His hopes that Congress will continue federal rent control when the law ends next June look pretty dim. His civil rights program is getting no place fast. His desire to wipe out the Taft-Hartley labor law looks hopeless.

McCarthy's Attack Felt

So much for his program. Meanwhile, his administration has been bludgeoned by some of the Republicans, led by Senator McCarthy, Wisconsin Republican.

McCarthy charged the State department was riddled with Communists or pro-Communists, and he named some names. Those accused by him, or some of them, have denied his charges and called him some unpretty names, including "liar." But McCarthy has conducted a kind of triple attack.

He attacked people, he attacked the State department, and he attacked the wisdom and leadership of the secretary of state, Dean Acheson. He called Acheson a " pompous diplomat with a phony British accent."

And some of the top Republicans in the Senate—Taft of Ohio, Bridges of New Hampshire, Wherry of Nebraska—have joined in lambasting the State department, particularly for the way it has handled policy toward China.

(Not all the Republicans go along with McCarthy. Some, like former Secretary of State Stimson, have denounced his performance, and former Senator John Foster Dulles wrote to Acheson that "public dissemination of rumors and suspicions encourages our enemies.")

Truman Orders Check
Mr. Truman, vacationing in Florida, opened up at a news conference there with the statement: "The greatest asset that the Kremlin has is the partisan attempt in the Senate to sabotage the bipartisan foreign policy of the United States."

McCarthy demanded—and so did the Senate subcommittee investigating his charges—that Mr. Truman let the subcommittee see the secret and confidential files on the people named by McCarthy. The senator said the files would back up his charges.

Mr. Truman refused, as other Presidents before him have refused, to let out secret files.

Mr. Truman has told his loyalty review board to check over once again some of the people named by McCarthy, and report back to him. It's possible Mr. Truman will have some statement on this report when he gets it.

KILLED IN CRASH
BELLINGHAM, April 7.—(AP)—Gordon Honeyman, 65, of Ladner, B. C., was killed in a violent collision between his southbound car and a northbound truck, driven by Carl E. Benson, Route 1, Bow, about eight miles south of here on highway 99 Thursday.

His 58-year-old wife was rushed to a hospital suffering from shock, leg injuries and a severe cut under the chin and other lacerations. Benson was uninjured.

Greatest Need Of Time Called 'Understanding'

The greatest need of the times is to gain a more comprehensive understanding of God, Will B. Davis, member of the board of trustees of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, said in a lecture in Roseburg Thursday night.

Speaking before a large audience at the Roseburg edifice of the Christian Science church, the lecturer declared that "the entire history of the human race shows plainly that envy and selfishness have been the underlying cause of most of the world's troubles."

"Basically, the reason mortals look to material sources or to the material possessions of others for their supply is that they are ignorant of the unlimited good which God is constantly giving," the speaker said. "Without the fear that there may not be enough to go around, there would never be any reason for covetousness. This fear emanates from ignorance of the true source or principle of all good, ignorance of God and of His abundant provision for all of His children."

Davis explained the teachings of the Church of Christ, Scientist, relative to materialism and healing, and developed the conclusion that "when one accepts the scriptural concept of God as Love, Spirit, or Mind, it is logical to conclude that the entire creation of Spirit must be spiritual."

'Don't Care' Runs Behind In Vote On Daylight Saving

WASHINGTON. — (AP)—A heady novelty for American voters square on the ballot where the happy-go-lucky citizen may register "don't care"—is getting a trial run here.

Most people are under the impression that residents of the district of Columbia are not allowed to vote.

That's right, they aren't. But then again they are.

The commissioners of the district of Columbia are running a quasi-official referendum to see whether the people favor daylight saving time. Bills are pending in Congress to let the commissioners put daylight time into effect if the public wants it. Forehandedly, the commissioners are making an advance check before Congress acts on the legislation.

The ballots, with squared marked "for," "against" and "don't care" have been distributed by policemen to volunteer workers in each block. Although no particular deadline has been set, the returns are beginning to drift in to the precinct police stations.

With 167,000 of the 200,000 ballots collected, daylight saving is winning by a margin of 70,700 to 24,900.

"Don't care" votes, at that point were 12,000.
