Easter Season Sees Reduction In Prices Of Ham

Easter menu planners will find ham prices slashed two to eight cents a pound this week and selling at around eight cents cheaper than a year ago in most stores.

Another Easter special — top grade eggs—also were trimmed in some places, but usually only by a cent or two a dozen. Retail egg prices were well below a year ago, however—as much as 50 per cent lower in a few sections of the country.

With the exception of ham, meat prices were little changed from last week.

Frying, broiling and roasting chickens also were about steady and many stores were featuring turkey, whose prices averaged about 25 cents a pound below last year.

Lamb was less expensive than at Easter time last year when prices were close to record highs. But it continued scarce and the cost spread between lamb and other meats was so wide that many butchers considered it a specialty item.

The price trend in fresh vegetables was mostly downward as receipts of early crops increased.

Warmer weather helped boost demand for strawberries, now mostly from Louisiana, and tomatoes and new cabbage, and their prices edged upward. Canteloupes from Mexico were reported in lively demand. Carrots and cauliflower also were somewhat higher.

The agriculture department headlined pork, pork products, canned corn and onions on its most-plentiful-foods list for this week. It said onions are headed for market in such abundance this spring that special efforts will be made to increase consumption.

The Dun & Bradstreet wholesale food price index took its sharpest drop of the year this week, declining to \$5.75 from \$5.79 last week. The new level was lowest since early January, and .7 per cent below a year ago. Only five index foods advanced in wholesale price, against 14 declining. The index represents the total wholesale cost of a pound each of 31 foods in general use.
