

Amateurs Pour Into City For Glove Tourney

Southern Oregon Boxing Series To Open Tonight At Roseburg Armory

Amateur fighters from over southern Oregon poured through both entrances to the city during the day, in hopes of drawing opponents for tonight's edition of the southern Oregon boxing tournament, to be held at the Roseburg armory, starting 8:30 o'clock.

Eight trophies will be awarded to champions in each weight division at the end of the tourney, which will continue for three consecutive Friday's, including tonight. It will be a double elimination affair.

According to promoter Ernie Nazelrod, who with YMCA Secretary Marion Yoder is helping to organize the amateur boxing show, fighters from points north and south are showing intense interest in the tournament. Application blanks have been pouring in, said Nazelrod, and more fighters are expected to be on hand tonight than will be able to perform. Those drawing bytes will return next weekend.

Eugene is sending from eight to 15 fighters, according to Nazelrod's figures, while three to six lads are scheduled to don trunks from Klamath Falls. Sutherland reported that from 12 to 15 leather tossers will enter the ring from the Sutherland-Oakland area, while here in Roseburg some seven boys hope for opponents tonight.

Roseburg aspirants include Bobby Sanders, Larry Kvidera, Don Mast, Maynard Talley, Frank Brundage and two others.

From this aggregation of available fistic talent, 20 fighters will be chosen to perform tonight. Opponents will be selected on the basis of weight and ability. Every attempt will be made to match fighters with similar experience.

A fast show, with plenty of action, is in the offing, Nazelrod assured. He added that pre-fight sale of tickets indicates that choice seats will be at a premium. Tickets at the door will sell at

Tag-Team Event Will Be Feature On Armory Mat

Australian tag-team wrestling, one of the most popular by-products of catch-as-catch-can grappling with Douglas county fans, will be featured at the Roseburg armory Saturday. Although there will be no championships at stake, the four-man free-for-all is certain to be full of fireworks.

Principals will be Jack O'Reilly, dynamic Australian who holds the coast light-heavyweight championship, and Leo Wallick, the hard-driving Detroit piledriver exponent, on one team. The opposition will be Ted Bell, the popular exhibitionist from Jersey City, N. J., and Gordon Hessel, the talented matmaster from New Mexico.

Under ordinary circumstances, the tag-team event would be a fine action-packed battle in which ability to use a sustained attack would win—but not this time. Hessel and Wallick are old rivals and Hessel has a score to settle with the Detroit grappler and promises he will do just that. It is an enmity of long standing which started here in early December when Wallick defeated Hessel with questionable tactics. Not only will the two grapplers vie in the tag event, but will be matched in one of the two 20-minute, one-fall preliminaries.

The weekly mat show will open with another one-fall engagement between O'Reilly and Bell. The starting time will be 8:30 p.m. There is nothing overly important in the O'Reilly-Bell bout, but the spectacular Jersey wrestler is hoping for a victory which would place him in line for a title shot against either O'Reilly or Al Saxe, current junior heavyweight king. Stamina will be of vital importance in the team event, in which sustained action is important. The ability to work out plans for shifting partners—by being tagged for relief at the ring corners—is of vital importance.

At Los Angeles, Jack Graham was the big cannon as the San Diego Padres blasted themselves into a second place tie with the Angels. Graham got four hits, including his first homer. The 1948 league home run king accounted for four runs in the Padres' 7-4 victory. Meanwhile, the Angels could collect but seven blows off rookie George Zaverink. Two of the Angel hits were homers by Lee Handley and Frankie Baumholtz.

The San Francisco Seals with now that it had rained a little harder. Their game with Sacramento was delayed 15 minutes by rain in the last of the eighth. The score was tied 2-2 but the Seals would have won if the game had been called as they held a 2-1 lead going into the eighth.

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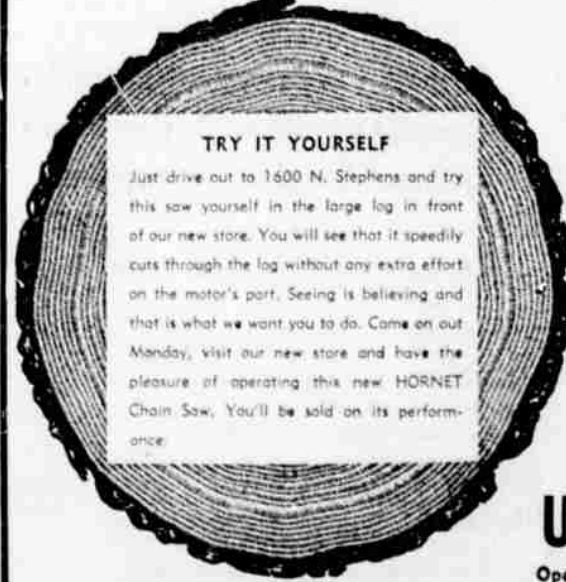
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
