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MRS. DALLIN JONES FIRST WINNER OF TOASTMISTRESS TROPHY

Mrs. Dallen Jones was the first winner of the trophy inaugurated by the Roseburg Toastmistress club Tuesday, March 28, at Carl's Haven. The trophy is to be given to the best speaker of the evening as determined by the vote of the members. Mrs. Jones interested the group in palmistry with her speech "My Hobby."

Mrs. Herman Matisoff, toastmistress of the evening, presented a varied program. Mrs. Opal Tuttle, president of the club, gave a book review on "Mama's Bank Account" by Kathryn Forbes.

Mrs. Benjamin O. DuFresne spoke on "The Sex Education of Grammar School Children." She pointed out that the present day conviction that the growing child should have some scientific information on sex education is an interesting example of social progress. In earlier days the trend in sex education was to keep children as ignorant as possible as long as possible.

A brief history of Oregon's health education brought out the present plan for social hygiene education in the schools of Oregon which, with the schools of Cincinnati leads the nation in this program. This is the result of long years of planning and cooperative effort of various educational and professional

al groups interested in the total mental and physical well-being of the school child. "Lifting of taboos has tended to throw special emphasis on the area of health instruction which should be carried on as naturally and matter-of-factly, and with no more fanfare than the study of the digestive system, the common cold and why we brush our teeth."

The greatest obstacle is that teachers are not trained to teach this program. 98.2 percent of parents and teachers viewing the film "Human Growth" are pleased with the material presented and are desirous of having their children see the film. This film requires teachers who have previewed it and are qualified to do adequate preliminary and follow-up teaching for best results.

A new film "Human Beginnings" is designed for Kindergarten, First and Second grades. "Human Beginnings" was authored and supervised by Dr. Lester F. Beck, Associate Professor of Psychology at the University of Oregon. Roseburg High School was listed as one of the four high schools in the state as doing outstanding work at this level through the biological approach.

Mrs. DuFresne's conclusions were that children will learn about sex one way or another, so the trend is to teach them WHAT they want to know WHEN they want to know it and that sex education should be taught in schools and in such a way as to be fundamental, not isolated. The important thing is that sex education should emerge naturally and without undue emphasis.

Mrs. E. L. Tauscher enlisted the aid of the Toastmistresses for the educational committee for Pest Control. A committee for pest control has been formed in Roseburg by representatives from the civic organizations. The city has promised \$3,000 to help this program. The committee is now seeking a like amount from the county.
