

\$2 Million Legacy Falls To Excite Woman Of 90

VICTORIA, B. C., April 10.—(P) Ninety-year-old Mrs. Helen Lovekin was quite right not to get excited about a legacy of \$2,000,000. Two years ago while living here she was told her brother, American industrialist Nathaniel Stevens, had left her \$2,000,000-odd in his will.

"My husband and I are very comfortable and don't have to worry about money," she said at that time.

Today adjudication of the brother's will was completed and it turned out that Mrs. Lovekin got the money only in trust for her two children. Mrs. Lovekin now is living in Weston, Conn.

The money is part of Stevens' \$9,000,000 legacy. Mrs. Lovekin will hold in trust about \$2,500,000 worth of stocks. Her husband died last year.

Easter Devoted To Pleas Against Third World War

The worried Christian world returned today to everyday business after an Easter dedicated to prayers for peace.

Throughout the Christian countries that believe in a Savior risen from the dead, the faithful yesterday knelt in pleas for the dead and wounded of the last war. Everywhere they asked that war's destruction would not be repeated.

At St. Peter's basilica, in Rome, 500,000 Holy year pilgrims of the Roman Catholic church heard Pope Pius XII plead for a return to the gospel spirit and the idea of social justice.

The holy city of Jerusalem was jammed for services at the shrines dedicated to Christ's death and resurrection. At the basilica of the holy sepulchre, more than 10,000 persons knelt in prayer.

Traces of a midnight snow were seen for a while on New York's streets, but from dawn the city's churches were packed.

Fifth Avenue's annual Easter parade was sobered by a surprise cold snap which cut through light-weight spring garments. But bright sunlight later in the day brought sidewalk-packing hordes into the thoroughfare, with bright flowered hats to relieve the wintry blues.

Power Wires Electrify Falling Plane; 2 Men Die

LEICESTER, Mass., April 10.—(P)—A farmer and a man he attempted to rescue were electrocuted last night when a small plane crashed into high tension wires.

George Streimikis, 30, was killed as he tried to pull Michael Sloan, 27, of Worcester, a passenger in the plane, from the wreckage.

The pilot, Robert LaForce, 23, of Worcester, was thrown clear of the plane. He suffered a possible skull fracture and other injuries.

Police said the fallen wires electrified the plane and Streimikis was electrocuted as he attempted to save Sloan.

A woman, Mrs. Ann Taipilus, 54, was knocked to the ground and burned as she tried to help Streimikis.

Maryland Forest Fire Toll Upped; Inquiry Begun

BALTIMORE, April 10.—(P)—One hundred acres more Maryland woodland have been destroyed in a series of widely scattered brush and forest fires.

State forestry officials said the 12 fires yesterday brought the state's total since April 4 to 37 blazes which burned more than 1,000 acres.

Only last week a forest fire raged over 600 acres of southern Maryland before it was brought under control by hundreds of army and civilian fire fighting personnel.

State Forester H. C. Buckingham said his group was checking several clues to determine if several of the fires had been set deliberately.

Red Terror In China Reported By Vatican

VATICAN CITY, (P)—China's Communist regime is spreading terror that frequently drives its victims to suicide, the Vatican's congregation for propagation of the faith says.

It issued reports it said were received saying that legions of Russian military and civilians have gone into the country to help the followers of Mao Tse-tung control offices of Communist China.

Terror is spread throughout the country, these reports said, especially by "tribunals of the people" that try accused persons in the open, half naked or covered with a wet cloth in freezing weather.

Public confessions are forced, the congregation's reports said, and once this is done the condemned victim is beaten to death by execution squadrons, usually consisting of 16 to 18-year old boys.

T-Night Count For Nation Set

A special census of hotel guests will be carried out Tuesday night, April 11, throughout the nation, Ray M. Feves, census district supervisor for the southwestern Oregon area, said today. Feves said that local hotel managers will participate in the distribution of questionnaires to their guests as a voluntary service to the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Feves said that the census bureau is most anxious to have the enumeration of hotel guests interfere as little as possible with the routine operations of the hotels and the privacy of their guests. For this reason individual census reports will be given to the guests which they can fill out in a few minutes. The forms are equipped with gummed edges so that the guests can seal them up before handing them in.

Census enumerators will be stationed in hotel lobbies to assist any guest requesting aid in preparing his census report. This system of counting transients will apply only to hotels having more than 50 rooms with at least 30 percent reserved for short-time guests. According to arrangements for the "T" night census, as it is called, the larger hotels will have one enumerator on hand for each 100 rooms.

Feves said it should be impressed upon hotel guests that when the final tabulation of population figures is made, the guests will be included in the figures for their home towns.

Magneto Trouble Halts Flying Bixbys Again

TOKYO, April 10.—(P)—Chalk up another delay for the earthbound Bixbys.

The husband and wife team of Bob and Dianna—round-world flyers—discovered magneto trouble early today when they were preparing to take off for Midway Island.

They can't find a Rolls Royce magneto for their twin-engine British Mosquito bomber in all Japan. No one would predict when they can get away.

The Bixbys started their flight April 1 from San Francisco, shooting for the late Bill Odom's 73-hour world grilling mark. They came to trial—the first time—just out of Calcutta, India, when their right engine developed trouble.
