Canyonville Wins Spring Opener

The Canyonville Tigers opened their spring sports season by coming from behind in the last inning to take a 14-13 softball victory over Camas Valley in a game played on the Tigers' home field Friday.

Camas Valley led throughout most of the contest, aided by a big six-run first inning, when they put three hits, an error and two walks together for their margin. A four-run Canyonville rally in the fifth erased the lead, but Camas Valley went ahead again in the seventh, with five runs tallied on two hits and four Tiger errors.

Trailing 13-10 in the last of the seventh, the Tigers overcame the deficit by driving across four runs on three hits and two Tiger errors.

Shuey, with three for four; Cloud, with two for three; and Armstrong, with two for five, including a homer, were the batting stars for Canyonville. Heavy hitters for Camas Valley were Wheeler, with three for five, and Stanley, two for five. Both teams pounded out 11 hits.

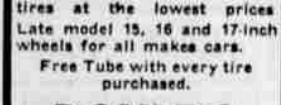

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2 Baseball Clubs Even In Contests

The Roseburg and Grants Pass baseball teams split a double header Saturday, with the Cave-men winning the opener, 5-3, and the Indians coming back to win the second, 10-7.

The first game was a tight pitchers' duel between Grants Pass pitcher Eldon Davidson and Roseburg's Mickey Coen for the first four innings. Davidson pitched no hit ball for four innings, while Coen gave up only two, one hit for two runs in the second, and one hit in the third.

In the first half of the fifth inning, Tiger Smith scratched a single for the Cave-men. Davidson sacrificed him to second, and Smith scored on an error by Dexter Garey, Indian second baseman, to put the Cave-men ahead by three runs. This lead held until the sixth, when one run on two hits by Gene Henry and Lloyd Stumbo, Grants Pass scored two more in the first half of the seventh, and Roseburg came up with four runs to make up.

Olson Singles
Indian shortstop Frank Olson got a single and Rauschert walked. Then pitcher Bob Sullivan and Gene Henry hit fielder's choices that backed up the Cave-men, and the Roseburg club had two more runs. Lloyd Stumbo then walked, but Garey, Barry Kenny and Chet Rowe were retired, and the ball game was over.

The Cave-men took a lead in the first inning of the second game when shortstop Don Jacobson, with two out, hit a single, then stole second, third and home for a score. Roseburg pitcher Tom Johnson then struck out Grants Pass's James to retire the side.

In Roseburg's half of the inning, Henry got to first on an error by Bob Amshary, Cave-men second baseman. Stumbo then got a single, and Henry scored on a fly to left by Garey. Kenny then sacrificed Stumbo to third, and Rowe was hit by Davidson on a pitched ball. Roseburg pitcher Tom Johnson then struck out Grants Pass's James to retire the side.

Then came Roseburg's big inning. Olson started out by getting on base on an error by James, GP third baseman. Rauschert singled him to third, and Bob Sullivan sacrificed him home to tie the score at 5-5. The Indians got 19.

Boston's Braves scored six runs in the eighth inning including Tommy Holmes' grand slam homer, to turn back the Cincinnati Reds, 15-12. Ted Williams crashed two home runs to lead the other Boston entry — the Red Sox — to a 12-4 romp over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The only match lost by the Roseburg boys was to Ron Robins, Marshfield's all-around athlete, in singles. Robins defeated Roy Van Horn, 6-2, 6-3. Van Horn later got even, however, as he teamed up with red hot Gordon Conley in doubles and waxed Robins and Jim Slover, 6-2, 6-2.

After two weeks of play, Hollywood's Stars are still leading in the Pacific Coast league baseball marathon today, but they're only half a step ahead of the weather man and the San Diego Padres.

Off to a ragged start, San Diego is now buoying along on the crest of a five game winning streak. With enough stick power to eat all the rugs in Persia, and maybe a few baseball teams thrown in, the Padres at this point rate as one of the loop's foremost pennant contenders.

They demonstrated this Sunday by grabbing both ends of a doubleheader at Los Angeles, 11 to 9 and 7 to 2. The sweep brought the Padres to within a half game of the lead and dropped the Angels into fifth place.

8 Pitchers in Opener
The opener was a three hour affair involving eight pitchers and 23 hits, including two homers by Ceece Garriotti and one by Stan Spence, both of Los Angeles. San Diego racked up five runs in the first inning.

At Portland, the fourth place Beavers also swept a twin bill, whipping Oakland by 1 to 0 and 8 to 5. Red Lynn twirled the shutout, scattering eight hits.

Portland won the second game with three runs in the sixth inning after Vince Shupe's roundtripper tied it at 5-5 in the fifth. Frank Nelson walked in one run and Eddie Basinski's single brought in the other two.

AAU Boxing Battle Starts

BOSTON, April 10.—(AP)—Approximately 170 young and ambitious boxers from Hawaii and most parts of the continental United States today begin a three day battle for eight individual AAU championships.

Team honors also are at stake in this 62nd national tournament opening some time after noon when the first pair of gloved competitors climbs through the ropes in the Boston garden ring.

A lucky punch, a sudden injury or sickness, or an odd decision and often has—changed the course of such a tournament.

Even so, most AAU officials and other observers won't be surprised if a majority of honors go westward, following a trail punched out in the last few years.

Among those considered capable of continuing the trend away from the East are:

Dick Guerrero, middleweight, from Chicago and two time Golden Glove champion who, former middleweight champion Tony Zale says hasn't lost a fight.

Middleweights West Echols of Atwater, Calif., and Carl Mills of the Seattle, Wash., team, a 6-1 hard punching boy with a reputed record of 32 knockouts in his 40 victories.
