Demaret, Ferrier Label 13th Hole 'The Death Hole'
AUGUSTA, Ga., April 10 —(AP)—Jimmy Demaret, the Masters winner, and Jim Ferrier, the runner-up who blew up, decided their finishes on the Augusta national's 13th hole — "the death hole of the Masters."

For Demaret, first three-time Masters gold tournament winner, the 13th was a lucky hole — he admits it. For Ferrier, the 13th was "his unlucky hole, the death hole," Demaret says.

Demaret shot a final day three-under par 69 for a total winning score of 283 strokes. He slipped in the winner's hole, Ferrier, who had led for two days and most of the final round. Ferrier, a giant Australian now living in San Francisco, blew to a 75 on the final round for a 285 total.

Defending masters champion Sam Snead was third with 287 and Ben Hogan and Byron Nelson tied for fourth with par 288's.

Lloyd Mangrum was sixth with Clayton Heafner and national open champion Cary Middlecoff were next with 292's.

On Demaret's four trips around the Augusta national's 6,900-yard championship course, he eagled the par five 13th hole twice and shot two birdies. He picked up six strokes on par on the one hole.

Ferrier was two under par until he mounted the 13th tee on the final round and he looked like the winner without a doubt. But on the 13th he began to blow and he didn't calm down until after Demaret had won.

Ferrier needed a stroke more than Par on the 480-yard hole, which dog legs to the left, crosses a creek and a deep ditch before reaching a sand trapped green.

On the next hole he couldn't recover and he continued to fall until the round was finished.

Demaret and other money winners got a 20 percent bonus in prize money when Bobby Jones, President of the Augusta national, said the tournament again was a great success as a crowd attraction. About 18,000 fans were out the final day and about 10,000 for the semi-finals. The tournament was

Winter Travel Of Steelhead Upped
Despite unfavorable weather conditions, the 1950 winter steelhead migration shows improvement over the parent run of 1946, reports Ross Newcomb, resident biologist of the state game department.

The 1950 migration shows return from the 1946 run and gives the first cycle comparison since management studies were started on the river, Newcomb says.

The 1946 count, as of March 31, was 4,737, while for the current season 5,229 fish have been tallied through the Winchester counting station. The count does not include fish migrating up the South Umpqua river, nor those stopping in the main Umpqua.

Winter steelhead will be counted for another month Newcomb states. The migration still is in progress, although it is slow. Every indication points to a gain of the progeny run over the parent run, Newcomb says.

By way of comparison, counts for other years show 9,890 in 1947, 7,682 in 1948, 7,893 in 1949.

QUESTION: In a recent discussion of various types of insurance covering damage and theft of things like jewelry, furs and luggage, one of our friends with some insurance experience kept comparing "regular" fire and theft policies with what he called "floaters." Can you tell me what difference there is between these policies?

ANSWER: There is a basic difference in these two kinds of insurance. Under the "regular" policy, the insurance company states the various types of loss for which it will pay and it is not liable for losses not specifically mentioned in the policy. In the "floater" the company is liable in all losses not specifically excluded by the policy. Any good insurance agent can tell you which is best in your individual case.
