Single-Industry Dependence Unwise, Variety Planning Is Needed, V. J. Micelli States

Long range planning and avoiding a one-industry area were prime topics discussed by Victor J. Micelli, speaking before the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce Monday noon.

Heading his talk, "Community Service," Micelli emphasized the importance of civic groups and individuals giving sufficient time toward planning which may save thousands, even millions, of dollars in the future.

Furthermore, he stressed, if Roseburg can obtain a variety of

industries, instead of placing so much stress on lumbering, a "depression" such as we had during the winter months, when most of the mills were closed, would not have occurred.

Roseburg is no longer a "whistle stop," the speaker pointed out. "We must act as grown ups and forget jealousies." He urged that a survey be made of the community's needs. This is a job for the Chamber of Commerce, with the other service organizations to be called upon to help put across civic projects.

Four Objectives Listed

He listed four major objectives: 1. conservation of our natural resources; 2. long range community planning; 3. establishing of industries, and 4. rural-urban relations. He urged the study of soil conservation and erosion, particularly by such groups as the Future Farm-

New and morbid twist on "If I Knew You Was Comin'": "If I knew you was coming" . . . I'd be baked a snake . . . Thoroughly repulsed?

Wilfred Brown, news editor for Don Lee's "Newspaper of the Air," (10:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. Mon. thru Sat.), has turned from the news of the day long enough to pen a brilliant treatise on the "Crisis in Lunivania." He takes a dim view of the trouble-wrecked monarchy harking back to the days of Sri Velovavuvuvu Ubucudufuguhuhuh, the Father of Economics of Outer Hindustan, who wrote in the "Far Eastern Economist" in March, 1943, "Ub ghyt yzthig etain shrdlu, holtcha." "It's with this fundamental law in mind that author Brown takes his pessimistic swipes at the various and sundry Lunivanian regimes. For his readers, Wilfred indicates that the law suffers in translation, hence it is impossible to express in English the exact shades of meaning of the revered Father of Economics of Outer Hindustan. But for those content to acquire their learning second-hand, it may be roughly stated as: "You can't win!" The author of "Crisis in Lunivania" was for many years a world traveler, but has taken care to travel alone so that he may not be referred to as a "fellow traveler." He was born in Antarctica, near Little America. After graduating from Grahamsland university, he engaged in journalism in Hearstland for many years. Brown says he was stricken with the wanderlust after he left the Antarctic continent for the first time to cover the Bfrgskhb Expedition to climb Mt. Tchglbd. In late years he covered so many assignments that there arose a saying, "If there's action, Brown's not there."

Reviewer's note: In the unlikely event that some reader of this work does not read Sanskrit, I strongly recommend that he or she familiarize himself or herself, whichever the case may be, with the language. ers of America and 4-H clubs. Soil conservation, according to Micelli, is becoming an important problem. Water conservation is already serious. A dam, he contends, should have been built on the South Umpqua river 10 years ago.

Under long range planning he advised that financial assistance be given the city planning commission. He said this group has been hampered by lack of funds, and petty differences which have not permitted it to function.

On rural-urban problems, Micelli said, "We often forget the importance of agriculture. But the farmer should be treated like a human being, and not like a forgotten man. The merchants need these people more than the farmers need the merchants."

Community service implies personal sacrifice, said Micelli. "I don't advocate neglect of business, but such work should come during outside hours. He who serves must sacrifice, but those who serve are awarded by self-satisfaction of a job well done."

Worker Suffers Fracture Of Leg

Vandalism is indirectly attributed as the cause of a local man breaking his leg.

John B. Richards, assistant warden with the Douglas Forest Protective association, was taken to a bone specialist in Eugene Monday after he was struck on the upper part of his leg by a falling antenna pole.

Richards was assisting three other workers of the association in taking down the pole, atop Rose hill north of the Roseburg Lumber company, to replace insulators, which are believed to have been broken by vandals throwing rocks or with guns.

The 65-foot pole is used as an antenna for the remote control system serving the association's Roseburg office and lookout stations. The men were taking the pole down, when one of the guy wires slipped. In attempting to run out of the way, Richards slipped and fell and was struck by the upper portion of the pole. The accident occurred about 9:30 a.m. Monday.

The radio system is used only occasionally during the winter months, but in the summer it is used on a 24-hour basis, augmented by telephone service.

Considerable maintenance on telephone lines is necessary to repair ice breakage during the winter months, both along the protection roads and trails. Three men are out on roads and three on trail work. Other workers will be added soon.
