Grange Master's Charges Refuted By Game Board

OREGON CITY, April 12—(AP)—A member of the state game commission Tuesday charged Grange Master Morton Tompkins' assertion that state money was being used to oppose a Rogue river dam project.

J. H. Van Winkle, commission member, said no public money was involved.

"The game bulletin in which the Rivers (Cole Rivers, field agent for the commission) article appeared is not printed at public expense," he said.

Van Winkle explained the bulletin's financing and said in a statement:

"None of the publishing cost is paid out of the state general fund. The game bulletin is supported entirely by license fees, voluntarily paid by sportsmen. The bulletin is the sportsmen's magazine. It is fitting and proper that it carry information of the Grangers' business and do not meddle in it. They expect reciprocal consideration from Tompkins."

"Tompkins uses the support of Grangers to espouse public power in the Grange Bulletin. And sportsmen think it is the Grangers' business and do not meddle in it. They expect reciprocal consideration from Tompkins."

\$10,000 Damages Awarded Against Two Osteopaths

SALEM, April 12—(AP)—The state supreme court Tuesday awarded \$10,000 damages against two Eugene osteopaths, who were accused of negligence in connection with the death of a woman in childbirth.

The suit was brought by Calvin Stroh, the dead woman's husband, against Dr. E. N. Rhoads, owner of Rhoads clinic and hospital, and Dr. L. E. Overton, an employee. Mrs. Stroh died June 10, 1947, in the clinic, three hours after her baby was born. Her husband charged that the osteopaths failed to observe that the woman had a ruptured artery causing her to bleed to death.

The supreme court decision, by Justice Earl C. Latourette, said the osteopaths "did not exercise that degree of skill and care ordinarily exercised in the practice of surgery in the locality under like circumstances."

The decision also said there was "substantial evidence for the jury to determine that the defendants were negligent in failing to locate and tie the ruptured cervical artery, and that such negligence caused the deceased to bleed to death."

Stroh was left with four children. The decision upheld Circuit Judge Dal M. King.

States Should Get U. S. Gas, Auto Taxes—Newbury

PHOENIX, Ariz., April 12—(AP)—Federal gasoline and automobile excise taxes should be diverted to the states for highway use, Earl T. Newbury, Oregon secretary of state, said here.

Speaking at the regional meeting of the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators—of which he is national president—Newbury said the federal government has collected more than a billion dollars in such taxes since the war.

Some of the state problems of highway financing would have been met more easily had this money been passed on to the state, he said.

Prison Officials Work For 'Above Standards'

SALEM, April 12—(AP)—The Marion county grand jury reported today that state prison officials are doing their utmost to bring the prison to an "above standard condition."

It said "inmates are well disciplined and the newly completed cell block is all that could be desired."

The jury also had good words to say about the prison hospital and the recent employment of a full-time prison doctor. It said food is sanitary and well prepared. The Marion county grand jury investigates state institutions about once a year.
