This special broadcast will be a preview of the 1950 baseball season, which will be marked by one of the strongest crops of rookie stars ever to hit the major leagues in baseball history. The program will be presented on the eve of the opening of the major league season on April 18, and will preview the prospects for the championship races in both leagues this year. All clubs have materially strengthened themselves with outstanding rookies, some signed as bonus players and others who have successfully traveled the "farm systems" to become regulars for the parent clubs. The broadcast will be presented in behalf of Wheaties, "The Breakfast of Champions."
