Senator Morse Offers Defense Of Voting Record

WASHINGTON, April 14.—(P)—
Senator Morse (R-Ore.) defended
his voting record today with state-
ments of support which he said
were submitted by Republican
leaders.

Morse, up for re-election, is op-
posed by David I. Hoover, who has
called Morse a bad Republican who
should start his own party.

Morse made public statements
from 17 Republicans now in the
Senate and Joe Martin, House Re-
publican leader from Massachu-
setts.

Missing from the list were three
top GOP Senate leaders—Wheery
of Nebraska, Taft of Ohio and
Millikin of Colorado.

Asked why they were not in-
cluded, Morse replied, "I think this
is a pretty good cross-section of
the Republican party."

Morse implied that the Republi-
cans volunteered the laudatory
statements.

Martin said: "It is neither nec-
essary nor desirable for Republi-
cans to always think the same on
public questions. Through differ-
ence of opinion and debate we
reach the right decisions. Senator
Wayne Morse has contributed ma-
terially to the Republican record and
has been helpful to the Republi-
can cause. I hope he will be re-
elected."

Senator Vandenberg of Michigan
was quoted as saying, "I want to
thank you for your relentless and
consistent support for what I be-
lieve to be a sound foreign
policy for our country. You have
been a tower of strength in defense
of indispensable cooperation with
our anti-Communist allies for the
collective security which not only
protects us but also sustains the
hopes of free men for a free
world."

Missing Portland Man Located In Eastern Hospital

BRENTWOOD, N. Y., April 14
—(AP)—A man in Pilgrim state hos-
pital, was identified Thursday as
August Wempe, 79, well-to-do
Portland, Ore., resident who dis-
appeared seven months ago.

Dr. Harry J. Worthing, senior
director of the mental hospital, said
the patient is confused in some
respects but gives an account of
his identity which checks with
known facts.

"He not only says that he came
from Portland but believes that he
still is in Portland," Dr. Worthing
said.

The hospital head said the
elderly man talked of his wife,
Emilie Anna Wempe, who is
known to have died in Germany in
1940. Further confirmation, Dr.
Worthing said, has been received
in a letter from Wempe's son,
Arthur, in Bremen, Germany.

A suitcase containing old coins,
gold bond coupons and identifica-
tion papers bearing the name of
August Wempe, Wabash hotel,
Portland, was found on the Union
Pacific streamliner City of Port-
land last Sept. 16.

Dr. Worthing said the man in
the hospital remembers the suit-
case and is uncertain whether he
lost it in Portland or on a train.

August Wempe inherited an
estate at Portland during World
War one. He still has unclaimed
accounts in two Portland banks.
Relatives filed a missing person
report on him some time ago.

The man was found in a hotel
by New York police last Nov. 20
and taken first to a hospital for
mental tests.

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National Forest Timber Sales In 1949 Show Drop

PORTLAND — (AP) — National
forests in the Pacific Northwest
didn't make as much out of their
timber last year.

Regional Forester H. J. Andrews
reported the average price for
national forest timber was \$8.32
per thousand board feet, compared
to \$13.90 in 1948. The total cut
was lower, too: about 866,000,000
feet in Oregon and 568,000,000 in
Washington.

Timber sales revenue in the two
states totalled about \$12,000,000.
The heaviest revenue was from
the Willamette national forest;
\$2,556,784.

Spring markets and recent busi-
ness trends indicate an increased
interest in national forest stumpage
and timber prices for 1950. "It is
doubtful whether we shall see the
extreme competitive bidding of
1948," Andrews stated, "but each
forest reports special requests and
inquiries for new blocks of timber
and an increased need for forest
access roads. The nation's de-
pendence on the Northwest for big
timber and much of its lumber
ings focus on the critical need
for roads to move this timber to
market. The U. S. forest service
is constructing access roads as
rapidly as funds permit, yet it is
evident that the demand for tim-
ber exceeds our road program.
The only immediate solution is to
have timber sale operators build
as many of the access roads as
they can as well as their operating
roads in order that we may put
the timber on the market."
