

Padres Down Seals In Bid For Race Lead

Portland Trims Hollies, Oaks Trounce Rainiers, Sacos Wallop Angels

To figure who's leading whom in the Pacific Coast league today, hop aboard your slide rules for a jaunt through the wilderness of higher mathematics.

The Hollywood Stars are still setting the pace percentage-wise, but they're half a game behind the San Diego Padres. All of which seems to indicate one of two things: that the Padres are stouter than any-who realized, or that the Arabs who made up our numerical system kept two sets of books.

The Padres, who have languished in the vicinity of third place most of the season, backed into their semi-lead last night with a brisk 8-to-1 triumph over San Francisco. Al Olsen chucked five-hit ball during the proceedings and his mates responded by raking two Seal pitchers for 11 hits.

At Smith and Jack Graham, two of the league's powerhouses, got three apiece. And Milt Nielsen added to San Francisco's woes by stealing four bases.

Hollywood, meanwhile, was losing at Portland on a field well soaked with two days of rain. The Beavers sloshed to a 3-to-1 victory, scoring all their runs in the fourth frame on Bob Cherry's two-run double and a single by Joe Polich.

At Seattle, Hank Behrman tossed a five-hitter and gave Oakland a 7-to-2 triumph over the Rainiers. The setback was Seattle's third straight. It dropped the Suds into a tie with Sacramento for last place.

At Los Angeles, Sacramento's Frankie Dasso gave up 10 bases on balls, but still his team won, 6-to-1. Dasso was as stingy with hits as he was generous with passes, however. He allowed only four knocks, while his comrades belted three Los Angeles hurlers for 11.

Oklahoma Will Play Pittsburgh In 1952

PITTSBURGH —(AP)—The high-flying Oklahoma university football team has agreed to play a team coached by the man who engineered its last setback suffered two seasons ago.

The University of Pittsburgh said the Panthers will meet the Sooners in Norman, Okla., Oct. 4, 1952. A second game will be played in Pittsburgh the following year or in 1954.

It will be their first meeting. Oklahoma, rated number two last season and Sugar bowl champs in 1948 and 1949, has been undefeated since whipped by Santa Clara then coached by Len Casanova.

The Chiefs, Southern Oregon league title holders in last season's regular play, face a tough rebuilding job after seven months of idleness. Sargent stated the invitation is open to everybody except softball players as the Chiefs are interested only in prospects that are interested in baseball.

Every position on the ball club is wide open, according to Sargent, but the Chiefs have lined up a nucleus of outstanding pitchers to handle the mound chores during the coming season. Cy White, former Medford mounder, Wally Richardson, one of last year's regular hurlers, and Buzz Sporer, formerly with Salem and Yakima of the Western International league, are expected to be on hand Sunday to limber up their arms during the opening practice session.

Beware Spotted Fever, Fishermen Warned

PORTLAND —(AP)—Two cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever have prompted the Oregon State Board of Health to warn fishermen to be inoculated against the disease.

The two cases occurred in Malheur county last week. There have been 15 cases of it within the last two years, with one victim dying. State health officer Dr. Harold M. Erickson urged sportsmen to be vaccinated against it if they plan to fish east of the Deschutes river. The disease is spread by wood ticks.

OSC Jumper Threatens Mark Set By DuFresne

The 12-year OSC-Washington dual meet high jump record of 6-4 held by Benny DuFresne, Roseburg businessman, is seriously threatened by Ken Elliott, ace OSC high jumper and captain of the Beaver track team.

Elliott cleared the 6-4 1/2 mark during a practice performance at the Corvallis campus recently. Elliott hopes to put the record on the books when the Beavers meet the University of Washington trackmen at Seattle this weekend.

Last week, Elliott cleared the 6-2 mark against the Oregon Ducks at Eugene.

Boxers Ready For Second Card Of Elimination Tilts

The second elimination card, to decide the eventual finalists for southern Oregon amateur boxing titles, will start at 8:30 tonight in the armory ring.

Krause To Pitch Against Cougars

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 14. — A pair of seasoned veterans will draw the starting assignments at Howe field on today and Saturday when the University of Oregon Ducks open the northern division season against the defending champions from Washington State college.

Coach Don Kirsh nominated Mel Krause and either Swede Johnson or Sid Hills for the pitching jobs against the hard-bitten Cougars. All three are left-handers. Krause and Hills leading the pitching last season and Johnson carrying the load in 1948.

The remainder of the sophomore-dominated ball club seems set for the opening of the league season. On one or two positions still are open to question after the non-conference games. Either Joe Sugura of Portland or Jack Smith of Eugene will be the catcher. Both have shown promise so far in the year.

The infield appears set with Phil Settecase, a sophomore from Sherwood at first, Daryl Nelson, a rookie from Portland, at second, Ray Coley, another newcomer from Boise JC, at short and the veteran Don Kimball at third base.

The outfield is apt to be shifted depending on the hitting strength demonstrated by several of the candidates. Ray Stratton, a letterman of the last two years, will be in left. Either Dick Salter, the football end from Pasadena, or Duane Owens of Molalla will be in center. Joe Tom, who is hitting the ball at a .400 clip, will probably draw the right field post. John Jones, Chuck Strader and Ed Vannet will form the utility outfield strength.

The race for the remaining pitching jobs is a tight one. Jim Hanns, Stan Aune, Gene Rose, Lyle Rogers and Joe Elkins all are battling for the spots still open.

Today's game was scheduled for 3 p. m. and the Saturday game will start an hour earlier. Opening day ceremonies will precede the start of the game on Friday.

Sarboe Will Coach At Spokane High School

SPOKANE, April 14. —(AP)—Phil Sarboe, head football coach at Washington State college for five years, will join the staff at Spokane's North Central high school next fall as director of athletics.

Another college coach, Jerry Stannard of Whitworth, has been offered the job as Sarboe's assistant.

Sarboe resigned last December after a poor season and was later replaced by Forest Evashevski, from the Michigan State college staff.

Stannard announced recently that he would not seek another contract as athletic director at Whitworth, near Spokane.

R. H. S. Netters Slated For Two Corvallis Tilts

The five top men on the Roseburg varsity tennis squad will leave for Corvallis early Saturday where they will attempt a double invasion of Beaverville.

Saturday at 2 p. m., the Indian team will cross rackets with the strong Oregon State Rooks, then will stay at college fraternities overnight to meet the Corvallis high Spartans Sunday morning.

Coach Al Hoffman said his traveling squad will consist of the following players, ranked 1-5 in this order: Dick Jacobson, Roy Van Horn, Ronnie Strickling, Norm Queen and Gordon Conley.

Hoffman said this looks as the weekend of "really stiff competition" for his netters. The Rooks, he said, are loaded with talent and have won every match except one so far this season. Their victory list includes wins over Corvallis high (7-0) and the Oregon College of Education varsity (5-0).

The lone loss was at the hands of Grant high of Portland, a team blessed with the presence of a state singles champ and one of the two players who last year took state doubles honors in high school competition. The number one man for the Rooks, Leroy McCoy, is especially good, Hoffman said. The former Marshfield high net ace successfully warded off the efforts of Roseburg players in their two encounters last year.

Hoffman said the Corvallis high squad is something of an unknown quantity this year, although the Spartans are thought to be better than average, despite their one-sided loss to the Rooks. The Roseburg coach said Corvallis was affected as little by graduation as was the Indian squad, losing only one player by that route.

Hopes that the Indian net squad will soon be bolstered by an experienced player were expressed by Hoffman, who said Larry Henninger is now back on the active list after a siege of mumps. According to net rules, Henninger must work his way up the list of competitors and is now holding down tenth spot on the squad, Hoffman said.

Lee Grable, the muscular grappler from Phoenix, Ariz., is willing to match any wrestler in either the mat sport or demonstrating feats of strength—and the Arizona man will be able to match his mat prowess at the Roseburg armory Saturday in a special one-hour match against Ted Bell, the sensational Jersey City stylist. Grable, who boasts a 49-inch chest and a 33-inch waist, is also willing to match his strength or wrestling ability against two other top muscle-men, The Great Atlas or Georges Dusette. This part of the program must wait, however.

Grable will be matching his deadly and effective abdominal stretch against Bell's spectacular "Jersey Special," a combination of the Japanese armbar and the whip whiplock. Both are accomplished matmen and are expected to stage a stellar scientific exhibition.

The headline attraction, however, will be a grudge battle between Gordon Hessel, Albuquerque, N.M., and Leo Wallick, Detroit villain.
