Fugitive Caught By Writing His Name On Bottle

SEATTLE, April 14 — (AP) — Because Elmer William Molotte wrote his right name on a whisky bottle in a Portland, Ore., bottle club, he was held here for return to Chicago to face charges of interstate transportation of a stolen car.

Molotte, 30, was arrested by the federal bureau of investigation after a nine-month search that carried through nine states. J. B. Wilcox, special agent in charge here, said the car was stolen in Lewiston, Idaho, July 12, and abandoned in a Chicago used car lot when lack of identification blocked its sale.

The whisky bottle with Molotte's name was found in the rear trunk. An army buddy who said Molotte had passed a \$25 check on him started the FBI on a trail that led through Phoenix, Ariz., El Paso and Dallas, Tex., Miami, Fla., Chicago, St. Paul, Long Beach, Los Angeles and San Francisco, Calif., Portland and Yakima, Wash. At each stop, popped bad checks which FBI laboratories in Washington, D. C., said originated with Molotte.

The end of the trail was reached yesterday when another check victim tipped the FBI that Molotte was in town, driving a car. A check of rent-a-car agencies narrowed the search and Molotte was nabbed as he sat in the car waiting out a red light.

Wilcox said Molotte will be held for the Chicago charge although check charges are outstanding against him in several cities.

Oregon Farmers 2 Weeks Behind On Spring Work

PORTLAND — (AP) — Oregon's farmers are two weeks behind on their spring work. That was the highlight of the weekly weather-crop report of the Portland weather bureau and department of Agriculture for the week ending last Saturday.

Cool rainy weather kept farmers from their fields, through most of last month and much of this. However, some field work was done in parts of western Oregon between showers last week, and rather good progress was made in eastern Oregon the early part of the week. Then cold weather and showers (plus high-elevation snow) interrupted it.

Although crops are getting a late start this year, they came through the winter in relatively good condition, the report said. A heavy snow blanket during most of the cold weather protected fall-seeded fields and slowly rising spring temperatures brought gradual snow-melt and little erosion.

Grains, while retarded, have good color except in some low spots where there are indications of drowning out. Orchardists had varied experience on winter damage. Heaviest damage was reported to the peach and apricot orchards of The Dalles and Milton-Freewater areas. Near total loss is seen in many parts of those areas. Some eastern Oregon cherries and prunes also suffered damage, but apples and pears seem to have been largely unscathed.

But since the fruit trees are slow in starting new growth, evaluation of winter damage is difficult as yet. The department of agriculture said ranges and pastures had been held back, too, by cool March weather. Little stock has been turned out because of the slow grass growth.

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Youth Conference Importance Told By Gov. McKay

SALEM, April 14 — (AP) — Oregon's two-day conference on children and youth opened Thursday with a plea from Governor Douglas McKay for the "balanced guidance, development and conservation of our human resources."

He told the 600 delegates, representing more than 60 agencies interested in youth problems, that the conference would supply facts which would help parents rear their children.

He denied that its purpose is to tell parents how to do their job. The governor declared that the purpose of the conference is "to consider how we can develop in children the mental, emotional, and spiritual qualities essential to individual happiness and responsible leadership."

He said the conference is expected to develop proposed legislation which would enable the state to develop its resources of youth. **Human Resources Paramount**

"We worry about our supply of timber and our thinning soil—well and good," he said. "But their abundance avails us nothing if we neglect to provide for the balanced guidance, development and conservation of our human resources."

"Planning, blue printing, charting the course of Oregon's future—those are the obligations we owe not only to our citizens of today but to those generations yet unborn."

Governor McKay said Oregon is far ahead of other states in what it is doing for youth. He added that the conference's data would be taken next winter to the mid-century White House conference on youth.

"This conference," he said, "will divulge, far more completely than ever before in our history, the details of an inventory of our homes, our families, of our schools and churches, of our laws, our welfare agencies, and of our health and recreational facilities."

"I hope that all people will regard these findings and the resulting recommendations as a yardstick
