More Light Industry As Job Slump Barrier Urged

PORTLAND —(P)—Oregon needs more light industry to take up the load in present employment slumps.

Glenn E. Brockway, regional representative of the Federal Bureau of Employment Security, advised this, reporting that Washington and California suffered from seasonal slumps because they have more light industry.

Brockway told the state chapter of public employment services that Oregon's unemployment mounted as high as 20 per cent of the working force in June, and even in summer was 4 or 5 per cent.

Employers Remiss in Tax Collections Face Action

SALEM —(P)—The state tax commission is issuing warrants against 415 employers who are accused of not turning over their withholding tax collections to the state.

The commission said these firms collected a total of \$141,155 in withholding taxes, and failed to pay it to county sheriffs, who will take the tax to the commission.

The warrants will be turned over employer's property unless he pays over the money.

Methodists Ask Action As Sequel To Shot At Pastor

PORTLAND, April 15—(P)—Portland's Methodist ministers want to do something to "obtain a correction of affairs in Lakeview."

They voted support of the Rev. Omer Idso, Lakeview, who recently reported he was halted on a highway and shot at, after earlier receiving threatening letters.

The ministers did not say, in a formal resolution, specifically what they considered the conditions in Lakeview to be. Nor did the group secretary, the Rev. Kenneth Dunkelberger, in releasing the resolution with this statement:

"Men in the Portland association who know Lakeview and the situation existing there were much concerned at this state of affairs."

The members suggested to Bishop Gerald Kennedy that they were available to aid in any way possible. One suggested that the clergy go to Lakeview, conduct a revival, and "get the community converted."

LAKEVIEW, April 15—(P)—Lakeview doesn't need "conversion" but would welcome any effort of Portland ministers looking into terrorism directed at Methodist minister Omer Idso, says Mayor Carl Lange.

He referred to a statement of Portland Methodist ministers that they should look into the Lakeview situation and the statement of one that to Lakeview to "get the community converted."

Lange said the town situation regarding Rev. Mr. Idso is being investigated by competent authorities but that he was sure the people of Lakeview would welcome any effort on their behalf by the Portlanders.

Rev. Mr. Idso, pastor of Lakeview's largest church, has received several threatening notes in past months, apparently designed to run him out of town, and narrowly missed assassination on a dark country road last week.

Rev. Mr. Idso is still in town, and says he is going to stay.
