

Amateur Fights Packed With Action

Bobby Sanders KO's Opponent In First Round

400 Fight Fans Watch Best Southern Oregon Amateur Talent Friday

With 4-col. SPTS. BANNER
It took Roseburg's Bobby Sanders just 45 seconds to deliver a jolting right that sent Geary Doves of Klamath Falls into his own corner, and then to the floor, giving Sanders a TKO in the final bout of the 12 event amateur card at the armory Friday night.

Sanders, fighting his first amateur match, started the round at a slow pace as the fighters felt each other out. Then, out of nowhere, Sanders delivered his powerful right to Doves' jaw, ending the scheduled three-round bout.

The final event topped off a thrill-packed evening for 400 local fight fans that watched the best amateur talent in southern Oregon fight to four TKOs, three split decisions, and four unanimous decisions.

The 12-event card saw just about every boxing style known, and a few unorthodox systems. In the semi-final bout between Eugene's Jack Bishop, 156, and Bill Butler, 151-pounder from Klamath Falls, Bishop was completely mystified by Butler's buzz-saw tactics. Butler came out and exchanged a few blows with Bishop and then went into his act. He tossed four punches for every one that he landed on Bishop's body. It was all Bishop could do to keep out of the way. Bishop attempted to fight fire with fire by using Butler's tactics, but Bishop just couldn't keep up the pace. The judges handed down a unanimous decision for Butler.

One of the smoothest fighters to perform on the armory amateur card was Medford's Dick Adkins. The 138-pound Medford boy fought Lee Chapman, 138, to a draw in the first round of their bout, but the second round was a different story. Chapman was on the defensive throughout the rest of the bout as Adkins threw everything in the book at him in an attempt to get a knock-out. In the final round, Adkins had several chances to send Chapman to the dressing room, but both boys were so tired that it was all they could do to stand up. The judges handed down an enthusiastically approved unanimous decision for the Medford lightweight.

All the amateur Roseburg fighters put on a good show for the home town crowd. Don Parrott, 130, of Roseburg won a unanimous decision over Eugene's Dennis Carlson, 128. Parrott could have done a lot of damage with his smashing left to Carlson, but the Eugene fighter fought a clever defensive game by falling into a clinch whenever he got into trouble. Another Roseburg boy to win for the home town was Oral Wescott, 147. Wescott scored a TKO over Perry Johnson, 150-pounder from Klamath Falls. Both boys were a little too cautious in the opening minutes of the first round, then Johnson let go with a right-handed haymaker. Wescott dodged and

Indians Clean Bench In Easy 16-8 Victory Against Bulldog Team

The Roseburg high school baseball team took its fourth game in five starts on Friday night Friday afternoon by nipping the Sutherlin Bulldogs, 16-8.

Coach Norm West cleared the benches over the one-sided contest, before, throwing 28 baseballs hopelessly into the fray.

Sutherlin opened the scoring in the initial inning after Firman walked and Danchok rapped out a single. Firman raced home on a Roseburg error and Danchok scored on a fielder's choice.

The Indians bounced back in their half of the first inning to score three runs and take a lead they never relinquished. Gene Henry opened the hitting with a Texas leaguer to left field and advanced to third on a Sutherlin bobbie. Lloyd Stumbo rapped out the first of his two hits to score Henry, then came home on a balk. Chet Rowe took first after being hit by a pitched ball, advanced to second on a passed ball and came home on a fielder's choice.

Substitute Roseburg players began filing in and off the diamond in the fourth inning after the team mates had built up a commanding 14-2 lead over the Bulldogs. Sutherlin Coach Bob Brigham stuck fairly close to his starting lineup throughout the remainder of the game and his boys succeeded in narrowing the final gap to 16-8.

Three-base hits were a dime a dozen during the contest, with Roseburg's Lloyd Stumbo, Rowe and Scofield garnering one apiece and Norris, Sutherlin first baseman, also chalking up a three-bagger.

Heavy batsmen for the Indians were Gene Henry and Lloyd Stumbo, both with two for three. Rowe hit one for two and Coen, Scofield and Gary each hit safely once in their only time at the plate. Fennell, Sutherlin pitcher, hit safely in both official times at bat, while Norris collected two for four.

The Pacific Coast league finds itself beleaguered again today by those three familiar party crashers, Jupiter Pluvius, television and the San Diego Padres.

The Padres elbowed their way to the head of the receiving line last night by trouncing San Francisco, 10 to 0, while the Hollywood Stars, erstwhile leaders, watched a downpour at Portland wash out their chance to stay even.

And the television blight, fancied or otherwise, got a verbal dusting by League President Clarence Rowland. A gritty, fist-shaking sort of personality, Mr. Rowland is a very salty talker when it comes to his two pet peeves. Television is one of them. The major league draft is the other.

Video, said he, is to blame for the alarming drops in attendance at San Francisco and Los Angeles. He intimated that the way to remedy this is for the clubs to invoke the 30-day release clauses in their TV contracts.

Alas, however, the Los Angeles Angels, hardest hit of all the clubs, have no such clause. They seem destined to play out the season before sparse gatherings in a city with more than 300,000 TV sets in operation.

At Wrigley field last night, where the Angels lost a 10-inning affair to Sacramento, you could have fired a shotgun into some parts of the stands without hitting anybody. Only 1774 customers appeared. It was worse the night before.

Sacramento scored its winning run on a bad throw in the tenth. Jim Tabor, the runner, moved into scoring position on a balk by relief pitcher Red Barrett. Max Surkont hurled for the Sacs, struck out 14, utilized his rookie pitching sensation, Roy Welmaker, in blanking the Sacs. It was Welmaker's second shutout of the season and his fifth victory against no losses. After chucking four hit ball for eight innings, however, he had to call on Xavier Rescigno to put down a ninth inning rally which ended with the bases loaded. The triumph put San Diego a full game ahead of Hollywood.

At Seattle, catcher Ray Noble, a Cuban, drove in three runs with successive doubles as Oakland came from behind to trim the last place Rainiers. The Oaks now have won four straight games in the current series.

Confusion Arises Over Beau Jack's Low Blow

WASHINGTON, April 15.—(AP)—Beau Jack stopped Lew Jenkins at Uline arena last night, but the battle of the two former lightweight champions ended on a confusing note that caused more excitement than the actual fight.

This is what happened: At 2:32 of the fifth round of the scheduled 10-rounder Jack landed a low blow that floored Jenkins. Referee Ray Bowen gave Jenkins a five-minute rest period to recover. At the end of the five minutes Jenkins' second claimed he was unable to continue.

Dr. Leon Gordon, of the District of Columbia boxing commission, was called into the ring. He ruled Jenkins was able to resume, but Jenkins still was restrained by his handlers.

Referee Bowen then raised Jack's hand in token of victory as Jenkins sat on his stool.

Former Heavy Champ Observes 75th Birthday

BURBANK, Calif., April 15.—(AP)—It's diamond jubilee time today in the life of the last of the world's old line heavyweight champions, James J. Jeffries.

It's big Jim's 75th birthday, and No. 75 finds him still a strapping bear of a man, alert and friendly, but a little on the ailing side.

There have been many large birthday parties for the onetime king of the ring, but this one has taken on the aspects of an official holiday — city and state.

Burbank's official city family has proclaimed it "Jim Jeffries day," and Gov. Earl Warren has extended official greetings to boilermaker Jim.

And the sports crowd, with the boxing delegation in the fore, was invited en masse to Jeffries' sprawling cottage for a birthday party this afternoon.

Jeffries was born April 15, 1875, in the little town of Carroll, O. The family moved to Los Angeles when Jim was a youngster, and it was there that he grew and developed into what many an older timer insists was the greatest heavyweight of all time.

Deeply etched in the annals of boxing, of course, are the highlights of the Jeffries fighting career—his 11th round knockout over Bob Fitzsimmons for the championship in 1899, his two knockouts over "Gentleman Jim" Corbett, his roaring battles with sailor Tom Sharkey, and yes, his ill-advised, unwise come-back attempt against Jack Johnson in 1910, five years after he had retired, undefeated in 23 major bouts.

Blood Plasma Stockpiling Begun By Red Cross
