Surplus Cheese To Go To Needy Americans

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The government has made surplus butter and cheese available for free distribution to needy Americans.

The Agriculture department placed 15,000,000 pounds of butter and 5,000,000 pounds of cheese on its list of "give-away" commodities. Public and private relief agencies, the school lunch program and the Bureau of Indian Affairs are eligible for the products.

The "give-away" list already includes potatoes, dried eggs and dried milk. Items on the list are a part of a \$4,000,000,000 stock of commodities owned and stored by the government.

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New Journalism Head Appointed At U. Of Oregon

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 17—(Special)—Appointment of Dr. Gordon A. Sabine to head the University of Oregon journalism school is announced by President H. K. Newburn.

Dr. Sabine, a member of the journalism faculty for the past two years, was appointed dean of the school and associate professor, succeeding Dean Clifford F. Weigle, who will leave in June to become associate director of the Institute for Journalistic Studies at Stanford university. The new appointment is subject to confirmation by the state board of higher education.

Before coming to Oregon, the new dean was a member of journalism faculties of the Universities of Wisconsin, Minnesota and Kansas. He received his baccalaureate and master's degrees in journalism from the University of Wisconsin, and his doctorate in 1949 from the University of Minnesota.

A background of varied professional work on newspapers and magazines has been experienced by Dr. Sabine.

In the magazine field, Dr. Sabine was for a year editor of the Wisconsin Wildlife. He has written freelance and assigned articles for such publications as the Saturday Evening Post, Esquire, Coronet, Country Gentleman, Successful Farming and Better Homes and Gardens.

During the past two years the journalism educator has carried on extensive research in the field of Oregon journalism. This has included an analysis of the content of the state's daily newspapers last year, followed by studies of readability of editorials and other aspects of the training and work of Oregon editorial writers.
