Roseburg Trackmen Swamp University High At Eugene

The Roseburg high school trackmen produced one of their best performances of the season in ten events to win a decisive 97-25 victory over University high school at Eugene Saturday. The Indians dropped only two events, won 11 and shared a three-way tie for first place in the top sided meet.

Coach Frank Purdy's crop of sophomores looked promising. Ron Hagquist, a sophomore running in his first varsity competition, placed third in the quarter mile event. Sophomore Arlin Hill had at least a second place sowed up in the high hurdles but tripped on the last hurdle and didn't finish the race. However, Hill came back in the low hurdles to take a third place.

Fresh Shows

A Roseburg freshman, Jim Kemp, created a great deal of excitement by taking a first place in the 880 run. Kemp beat University high school's Fletcher, second in the state meet last year, in the half mile run.

The Indians' Bill Van Horn took a first in the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard run, ran an anchor man in the 880 relay to collect 14 1/2 points for high point honors of the meet. Raoult Stroup was runner up with 11 1/2 points.

Soggy Field

The times turned in by the Indians thineclads were not outstanding considering the soggy condition of Hayward Field, but Purdy was well pleased with the performances of his track men.

Sutherlin Captures Six-Team Track Event At Finlay Field

Sutherlin high school athletes took an easy victory with a total of 67 points in a six-team track meet held on Finlay field Saturday afternoon. The winning Bulldogs acted as the host school to the trackmen of Yoncalla, Glide, Myrtle Creek, Canyonville and Drain.

Sutherlin took an early lead over the visitors in the field events and gathered most of the points in the track events to easily win the meet.

Myrtle Creek trailed the Bulldogs in second place with 31 1/2 points; Glide placed third with 19 1/2 points, just half a point ahead of fourth place Yoncalla with 19 points; Canyonville collected 11 points for fifth place and Drain placed sixth with 2 points.

Sutherlin's Holgate took three first places and ran anchor man on the winning relay team to lead the individual scoring with 16 1/2 points. Merle Buck of the Bulldogs placed second in the scoring with 13 points.

Canyonville Loses First Track Meet To Coos River

The Canyonville Tigers were defeated 62-42 in their first dual track meet of the season by Coos River Friday afternoon at Canyonville. The meet was close until the final two events when Coos River swept the high jump and won a thrilling victory in the 880 relay to easily win the meet.

A number of excellent performances were recorded for so early in the season. Bill Hoffee of Canyonville, set a new meet record in the 220 yard run of 26 seconds. Homer Unger, also of Canyonville, set a new mark in the mile event of 5:26.2 minutes. The Tigers' Dick Cloud set a new Canyonville school record in the discus with a heave of 102 feet 9 inches.

Hoyce of Coos River set two new meet records in the pole vault and high jump events. Hoyce cleared 9 feet 6 inches in the pole vault and 5 feet 1 1/2 inches in the high jump.

The Tigers' Bill Hoffee was high point man of the meet with a total of 10 points. Hoyce of Coos River was high point man for the visitors with a total of 9 points.

Steve Souchock's performance with Sacramento of the Pacific Coast league Sunday suggests he may realize his ambition this year to bat .300 or better.

The long first baseman lapped three successive b-me runs in the first game of a doubleheader at Los Angeles to equal a coast league record and prece his team to a 19 to 5 triumph. Each of the round trippers came off a different pitcher in consecutive innings. That also could be some sort of a record.

The last man to poke three homers in one game in this circuit was Jack Graham. He did it for San Diego in 1948.

Souchock has been kicking around organized baseball for 10 years. He

came to Sacramento this season from the Chicago White Sox, of all places.

Los Angeles Drops

Sacramento also copped the second game of the twin bill by a less fantastic margin, 5 to 4, thereby dumping Los Angeles into sixth place.

The rest of the Sunday program went off in normal fashion, too. Oakland was rained out at Seattle; San Francisco and San Diego split a pair, so did Hollywood and Portland. This leaves the Hollywoods back in first place again, has a game ahead of the Padres.

At Portland, the Stars swatted out an 8 to 5 victory over the Beavers in the opener, then lost by 1 to 0 in a second game shortened to five innings by rain. Hollywood saluted the first one away early, jumping on Portland starter Red Adams, a four counters in the first frame. The Beavers used four moundmen in the contest. They yielded 13 hits, five of them doubles.

Scored On Error

Portland scored its lone run in the second game on a fielding error. Rain also washed out three games at Portland earlier last week. One was made up in a doubleheader Saturday. Another will be played on Hollywood's next trip north.

At San Francisco, the third place Seals handed Roy Welmaker, San Diego's ace right hander his first defeat of the season in the first game. San Francisco had to come from behind three times to win it, 7 to 6.

The afterpiece was a heartbreaker for the Seals. Cliff Melton had a perfect game going for the first five innings, but he injured his arm and the Padres hammered his relief, Harry Feldman, for seven runs in the seventh and last inning. Max West's pinch hit homer accounted for four of them.

As is the custom, the clubs will be idle today. Play resumes Tuesday with Seattle at Hollywood, Portland at Oakland, San Francisco at Sacramento, Los Angeles at San Diego.

The three rained out contests between Oakland and Seattle will be made up after the Oaks return north July 25.

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New Westminster Downs LA Monarchs

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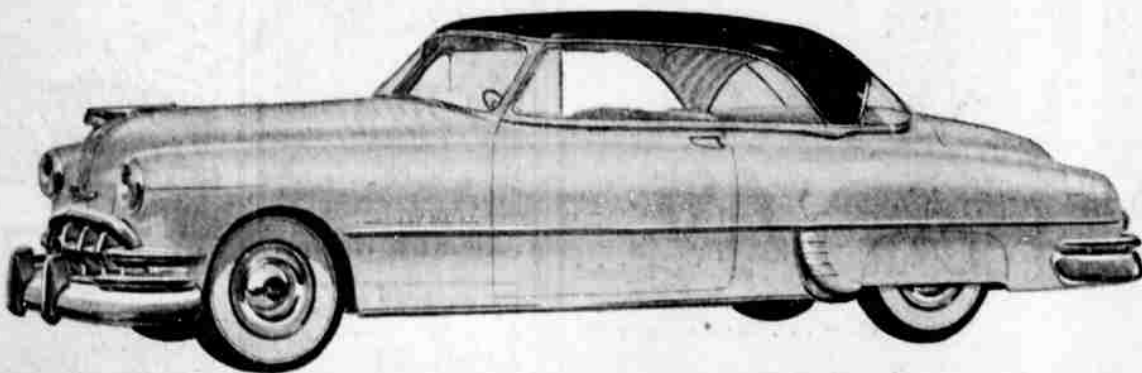
