Educators Tell Seniors Aspects Of College Life

Five representatives from schools within the Oregon System of Higher Education met with Roseburg high school seniors and Glendale high school seniors at Roseburg senior high Monday morning. The officials spoke generally on problems and aspects of college life.

Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, president of SOCE, Virgil Fogdall, dean of men at the University of Oregon; John J. Howard, curriculum supervisor at Oregon Technical Institute, Klamath Falls; Miss Olive Slocum of the department of nursing at the UO medical school, Portland; and Dallas Norton, personnel coordinator at Oregon State college, spoke generally on conditions at Oregon colleges. Dr. Stevenson represented all Oregon colleges of education.

After the general meeting, the seniors were divided into sections and given specific information on jobs, registration, housing, etc. for the school of their choice. A question and answer period was held at the end of the informal gatherings.

Lie May Confer With Red Leaders

LAKE SUCCESS. —(AP)—If he goes to Moscow on his save-the-U. N. campaign, Secretary-General Trygve Lie expects to spend about two days in steady conferences with the Kremlin leaders.

Lie hopes to see Prime Minister Joseph Stalin, Deputy Premier V. M. Molotov and Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky on the expected flying visit.

These plans were disclosed by informed sources here as Lie worked on details of what may be the most important trip he has undertaken since he became secretary-general of the U. N. in February, 1946, for a five year term expiring early in 1951. He is eligible for re-election as secretary-general by the general assembly next fall.

In addition to trying to convert the Russians once more to resuming normal relations in the U. N., Lie will carry his campaign along the way to the British and French top foreign officials.

He expects to call on Foreign Minister Robert Schuman while in Paris and is making a call at London to talk with Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin or Bevin's top assistants if Bevin is not in London or is indisposed by chronic illness.

Lie sails on the Queen Mary next Saturday. He will take a large party with him to Paris, but if he finally decides to go to Russia, it was said, he will take only his top Russian aide, Assistant Secretary General Konstantin E. Zinchenko, and maybe one of his private secretaries.

Search For Oil In Washington Viewed At Meet

OLYMPIA. —(AP)—Have major oil companies been sincere in their hunt for oil in Washington?

No, said a representative of Governor Langlie at a state legislative council subcommittee's hearing on a proposed state oil code. He was joined by a Tacoma man.

Yes, answered an oil company official.

John Scully, representing Langlie on the group drafting the code, said he was convinced large oil companies were not looking for producing wells in the state but had been sinking only exploratory holes.

Albert Hale, Tacoma, made the statement that the Standard Oil Co., had capped a potential 500-barrel a day well in Gray Harbor county several years ago because a Texas oil strike gave it a surplus.

To these accusations, W. L. Stanton, Union Oil Co., geologist, replied: "We came here to drill for production. If the management of our company thought we were drilling holes for information and not for oil and gas, we would not get a nickel for further work."

Stanton said his company had spent \$2,800,000 up to March 1 on 14 wells in different parts of the state. One of the most recent wells in the Ocean City area, still is being tested at various levels. The geologist said Union will decide next week whether to drill there.

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Vatican Denies Accord With Polish Government

(By The Associated Press)

The Communist-led Polish government has announced a new accord with the Roman Catholic church but today the Vatican press office denied that any such pact had been signed.

The Warsaw announcement said the pact had been signed by three Catholic bishops and pledged religious freedom in Poland in return for the church's promise to fight enemies of the Communist regime.

"Nothing is known here of any such agreement," said the Vatican press office. "The circumstances and contents of the accord in question preclude any foundation to the news."

Announcement of the pact was made after Poland's leading Catholic primate, Adam Stefan Cardinal Sapieha, had left Poland for his Holy Year visit to the Vatican. In Rome the cardinal refused to comment on the accord. Vatican sources said it was doubtful if the accord could have been signed without the cardinal's approval.

Doolittle Raiders Back Missionary Job In Japan

PALM DESERT, Calif. —(AP)—The Doolittle Tokyo raiders are raising a fund to "teach those Japanese something about humanity."

At their fifth annual reunion, Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle and 35 of the 80 men who first bombed Tokyo gave \$5 apiece. The fund will be used to support the work of Jacob D. Deshaizer, bombardier on one of the B-25s, who has gone back to Japan as a missionary.

U. S. Millionaire's Daughter Elopes With Young Cuban

NEW YORK, April 18 —(AP)—A northern climax to a tropic romance looked like the answer for police searching for beautiful 18-year-old Joyce Green—vanished daughter of a chain store millionaire.

She eloped from her fashionable finishing school Friday with Juan Gonzalez Cuevas, a 22-year-old Cuban she met on a summer cruise last year.

Cuevas, son of a Miami, Fla., transit executive, is a pursuer on the Green line ship Santa Rosa. Miss Green is tall, dark and statuesque beauty, the daughter of H. L. Green, head of the National chain of Green variety stores.

New York police got the romantic story from two of Cuevas' friends picked up in their Manhattan apartment. They are George Mendez, 22, and Jose Antonio Suarez, 19.

Both admitted helping the elopement and said they stayed with the couple from the time Miss Green left the Stoneleigh-Prescott Hill school at Greenfield, Mass., until they saw them last at Great Neck, Long Island, on Saturday night.

The couple had not yet married, they said.

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., April 18 —(AP)—Allen Clark, 53-year-old nationally known sculptor, died Monday from auto accident injuries.

Native of Missoula, Mont., and resident of Santa Fe, N. M., Clark was enroute to visit members of his family at Tacoma, Wash., Sunday night when his car overturned twice 20 miles northeast of Delta, Colo.

Clark was a member of the national Institute of Art and Letters. His sculpture has been acquired also by the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Seattle Art museum and the Hall of Fame at New York university.
