May 2 Hearing On Ducks Postponed To Later Date

SEATTLE — Hearings on ducks, scheduled for May 2 in Seattle and May 4 in Spokane, have been postponed indefinitely, the State Game department reported. The department said it was advised by regional director Leo Laythe of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service that information was too scanty to warrant the hearings at this time.

They will be rescheduled, Laythe said, following the regional hearing May 22 at Portland.

Another Try To Cut Waterways Measure Fails

WASHINGTON, April 18—(AP)—The Senate rejected Monday a move by Senator Douglas (D-Ill.) to eliminate a \$250,000,000 Missouri river item from the \$1,840,000,000 water projects bill.

By a vote of 49 to 17 the Senate tabled Douglas' proposal, which was in the form of an amendment to the big bill.

This was one of a series of defeats for Douglas in his attempt to trim \$800,000,000 from the bill, which would authorize numerous flood control, rivers and harbors and reclamation projects, some new, some enlargements of projects now under way.

Douglas so far has not succeeded in eliminating a penny from the bill. His announced plan is to try to eliminate \$200,000,000 for the lower Mississippi; \$100,000,000 for the Ohio and \$80,000,000 for the Arkansas river.

The bill would authorize Congresses at later sessions to appropriate money for numerous flood control, rivers and harbors and reclamation projects in virtually all 48 states.

Douglas was voted down several times last Friday when he tried to eliminate various projects costing nearly \$200,000,000.

He labeled many of the projects as "pork."

The bill passed the House last October with an authorization total of \$1,332,000,000.

The Senate on Friday voted down an amendment to the big authorization bill to add \$413,000,000 of irrigation projects and set up a Columbia basin account to handle finances of all power and irrigation projects in the Columbia basin.

The action came after five days of debate.

Dixie Howell Denies He's Leaving Idaho

MOSCOW, Idaho, April 18—(AP)—Idaho football Coach Dixie Howell denied yesterday that he plans to leave the Vandal institution. Published reports to that effect, he said, have "threatened our entire athletic program."

Howell said he has "no other plans" but to finish out the contract which runs through the football season.

"I shall be, at least as far as I am concerned, the head football coach until the university see fit to make a change," he added.

French Object To Ruhr Plan

BONN, Germany —(AP)—France has turned down a joint American-British plan which would give the Germans final say in future ownership of the Ruhr's huge iron and steel industries once occupation is ended.

The French veto automatically suspended for 30 days passage of a new Ruhr control law, which is designed to break up the vast state-owned cartels and the giant Krupp empire, which has supported German militarization for the past 100 years.

French High Commissioner Andre Francois-Poncet objected to a section of the law's preamble which would give the Germans the right to decide the form of future ownership of the rich industries. He turned the issue over to his government.

American High Commissioner John J. McCloy and British High Commissioner Sir Brian Robertson, however, voted to retain their original promise to the Germans.

The 30-day suspension will continue indefinitely unless Britain and the U. S. at high level conferences—possibly at the meeting of the big three foreign ministers in London next month—decide to overrule the French objection and put the law through.

Price Supports For Potatoes Hit By Senator

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Holland (D-Fla.) suggested Saturday that the nation's potato growers might be wise to try doing without government price supports.

Holland was the only Senator who voted no when a five-member agriculture subcommittee recommended a set of drastic controls over the planting and marketing of potatoes.

If the controls become law, at least two-thirds of America's commercial potato growers would have to approve restrictions before the Secretary of Agriculture fixed the nation's potato crop would be eligible for price supports.

"I think the bill is unworkable," Holland told a reporter. "Potatoes are grown on a nationwide basis the year around. It is a crop that does not lend itself to regulations and controls."

Voting for the drastic new controls were Senators Ellender (D-La.), Chairman Lucas (D-Ill.), Thye (R-Minn.) and Aiken (R-Vt.) Earlier this session Congress voted to end potato supports next year unless rigid controls are applied. It took this action after noting that the government has spent \$500,000,000 supporting potato prices since the war.

Excess production could bring penalties of 75 percent of the parity price of potatoes, or 15 percent more than the present level of government price supports. Farmers or first buyers of the "excess potatoes" would have to pay the penalties or be subject to government suits.

Parity is a level set by the Department of Agriculture which is intended to assure farmers a fair income in relation to the prices of the things they must buy.

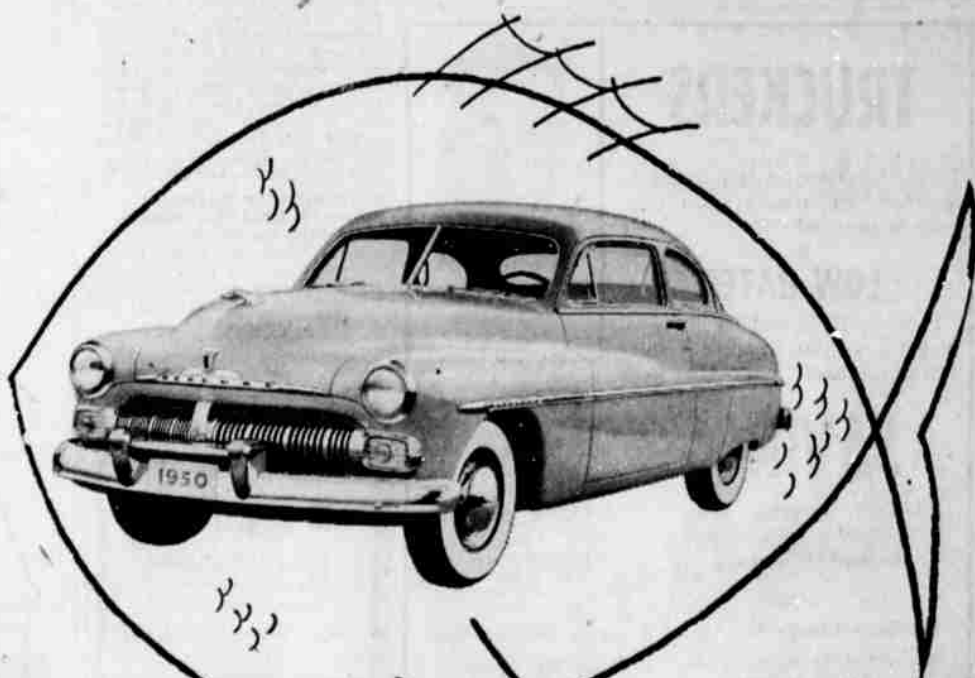
