to save the people of India and New York and Chicago, but not the rest of the people of the United States?"

"Of course, the TB death toll in India is much larger than it is here, and they need a vaccination program worse than we do. But still 50,000 die from TB in our country every year.

"Isn't it worthwhile to save 45,000 of those people?"

To Dr. Corper's argument that a national vaccination program would be a massive waste of funds, Dr. O'Brien noted that public and private agencies are spending \$350,000,000 a year to fight TB.

"And they're not making any progress in controlling the disease," he said. "All we're doing now is trying to save the lives of the poor physical wrecks who already have TB."

waiting in Denmark even before the U. S. plane involved in the incident had taken off from Wiesbaden April 8. Thus, it said, "it was a previously prepared provocation."

(The United States directed a sharp note to Moscow yesterday charging that Soviet fighter planes fired on an unarmed U. S. Navy Privateer over the open Baltic sea and thus violated international law. The U. S. note demanded punishment for those responsible and payment of indemnity for the 10 Americans who apparently lost their lives in the incident.)

New Times said the incident was a "plain intentional provocation," and described it as "training in the fabric of international incidents."

"After the American provocation in the Baltic it is evident that Washington has set out upon the same risky path of provocations and instigation of international incidents and conflict along which the German and Japanese fascists traveled."

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CIO-AFL War On Waterfront Becomes Tense

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The AFL-CIO jurisdictional war has built up toward a tense situation on the waterfront.

Longshoremen of Harry Bridges' CIO union have accused the AFL's Dave Beck and Harry Lundeberg of putting on a squeeze, and expressed determination to block AFL teamsters from "piling and sorting."

The hunt began after Cuevas, 22, spirited his sweetheart away from a Greenfield, Mass., finishing school Friday in his automobile.

After the wedding announcement, blessings came from Octavio Cuevas, father of the groom, and millionaire H. L. Green of New York City and Fairfield County, Conn., father of the bride.

What started out as a struggle between AFL and CIO warehousemen for supremacy in warehouses of the area thus threatened to spread in two and possibly three of the most powerful unions on the West Coast.

One is Bridges' International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union.

The other is Seattle Dave Beck's AFL teamsters. Both these unions give every evidence of backing the rival locals in the warehouse controversy.

The third union, not yet involved but mentioned by the ILWU as a target for resentment, is Harry Lundeberg's AFL Sailors' Union of the Pacific.

A longshoreman spokesman accused Beck of "trying to muscle in on the dock work" and Lundeberg of "trying to get more shore jobs for his sailors at our expense."

Officials of CIO longshore local 10 said it not only was supporting the CIO warehousemen but expected to get back "about 80 percent more actual dock work than we have been claiming in recent years."

Lundeberg, long a bitter waterfront enemy of Bridges, shrugged off the charges against his union as "just talk."

Dead Snakes Hang From Trees; Birds Do The Impaling

TROY, N.C. (AP)—The mystery of the dead snakes hanging from trees in North Carolina appeared solved today: They were impaled by shrikes, or butcher birds.

That was the consensus of scientists and laymen alike. The snakes were first discovered on thorny locust trees here Sunday, and then similar reports came in from other parts of the state.

The snakes here—plus a mouse and lizard on trees—have been viewed by thousands of curious folk.

Dr. A. D. Shaftesbury, biology professor at the woman's college of the University of North Carolina in Greensboro, gave this explanation, which was backed by other scientists:

The great northern shrike, also called a loggerhead shrike, snatches its victim in its notched bill, which is hooked at the tip. Unlike other birds of prey, it has no claws, and therefore doesn't tear its victims apart with beak and feet. Instead, it lights on a thorny tree or barbed wire fence, and impales its food.

And around the state laymen reported they have seen shrikes do just that for years.

Convicted Negroes' Rights Observed, Jury Finds

OCALA, Fla., April 19.—(AP)—A federal grand jury found no violation of the civil rights of three Negroes convicted of rape in Lake county.

The investigating group gave its report yesterday 24 hours after it had been impeded to look into claims of Walter Lee Irvin, Charles F. Greenlee and Samuel Shepherd.

The jury said it had heard all the evidence and related circumstances "of the alleged beating" of Irvin, Greenlee and Shepherd.

"We find and report no true bill," said the jury, which had three Negroes among its members.

Irvin and Shepherd were sentenced to death and Greenlee to life imprisonment for the rape of a young Lake county housewife last summer. The death sentences are under appeal.
