KRNR DIAL-LOG

Somebody was relieving a KRNR shelf or two of old program logs and papers to make room for the new and ever-changing things... Came across KRNR's first publicity pamphlet titled "KRNR Means Business!" On the back page was pictured KRNR's first manager... the late J. B. "Bud" Toles, standing near an old condenser "mike" and explaining the workings of the control room to an interested observer.

The year was 1935... the location, underground... beneath the Umpqua hotel on Oak street... daytime broadcasting... 100 watts... 1500 K.C. This was all when Roseburg was only 5,000 or 6,000 strong... when the famous Pioneer Drugstore still flourished on North Jackson St., next to Goettel's Variety... when KRNR personnel scarcely had room to breathe in the original three-room setup.

There was a "Children's Hour" every afternoon, when the youngsters came to gather round the storyteller, and sit cross-legged on the crowded studio floor to listen to her tales... to remain mysteriously silent when the little sign above them glowed, and warned "On the Air."

Under the imaginative direction of "Bud" Toles began the original "Man on the Street," "Man About Town," "Shopper's Guide" and many other shows of local appeal, some of which have long since been lost in the shuffle of years. There was an "Editorial Page of the Air" with "News-Review" editor Harris Ellsworth... now an Oregon Congressman... his air-time was 4 p.m.... now absorbed by MBS commentator Fulton Lewis Jr.

At the offset, radio owners proudly inserted the new call letters "KRNR" at the 1490 mark on their dials, then discovered that the "Voice or the News-Review" could be heard straight across the entire dial. Something was wrong... somewhere! A frantic search for the trouble disclosed that the entire radiator heating-system of the Umpqua hotel had to be grounded... ending the mystery.

The publicity pamphlet which inspired this years-ago glimpse wasn't too subtle—but mighty tactful in its potential-sponsor approach: "... It is usual to have a pipe-organ concert on Sundays. Advertisers may sponsor this type of music if they wish."

So ends a dissertation regarding the old KRNR... anecdotes that are new to some of you... and memoriestos part of that original 3,000.

Robert Lum, a stevedore who said he joined the Communist party in March, 1946, and quit the following October, gave this description of the party meetings:

Lum testified party members took roundabout courses to meeting places, looking over shoulders to make certain they weren't being followed.

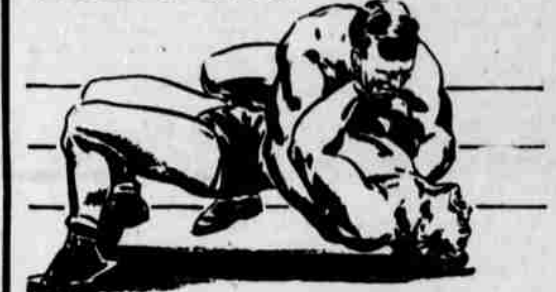
Lum was the 18th admitted former Communist to testify.

Three Slayings 24-Hour Record in Cincinnati

CINCINNATI, April 19.—(P)—A 27-year-old Cincinnati woman died in her bed here Monday night of a stab wound while her husband said he paced the floor as he "begged the Lord to please take care of her."

The husband, James Edward Ferguson, 32, held on suspicion of murder, told police "I did it, I know I did it but I didn't mean to or want to."

The slaying was the third in Cincinnati in 24 hours.

Mrs. Maria Ida Wiperman, 43, died Monday after she and her husband, John Wiperman, 35, were found critically wounded in their apartment Sunday afternoon.

Police Chief George Schultz of suburban Norwood said he was "convinced" Wiperman shot his wife and then turned the gun on himself.

The other slaying was the fatal stabbing of William Lackman, 42, Sunday night for which Winfred Hager, 37, is being held on a charge of murder.

Ferguson, who talked freely to police after his wife's body was found by a physician, said he had been "a case of nerves" ever since his destroyer was sunk by the

Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor in 1941.
