

Seattle Dumped Again; Oaks Defeat Lucky Beavers, 5-3

Hollywood is looking mighty natural atop the Pacific Coast league standings but somehow Seattle doesn't seem to belong so deep in the loop cellar.

The Rainiers were a good club in 1949 and had some of the best pitchers in the league. But that was last year. This year the Rainiers have won only five of their 18 games. Hollywood nipped them last night 5-4 for the fifth loss in a row and the 11th in 12 starts. The Stars pounded Jim Wilson for ten hits, including an inside-the-park homer by Herb Gorman. Bill Ramsey crashed into the center field fence going after Gorman's smash. By the time the Rainier outfielder picked himself up, Gorman was heading for home. Ramsey, finding the centerfield boards harder than his head, had to leave the game.

Padres Win
The win kept Hollywood a slim half-game ahead of San Diego which took an 11th inning 3-2 decision from Los Angeles. Al Smith lined an infield single off the shin of Pitcher Herman Besse to score Harvey Story with the winning run. Lefty Al Olsen limited the Angels to six hits and blanked them for the last four innings. Les Layton smacked a first-inning homer for the Angels. The Oakland A's homered their way into third place with a 5-3 win over Portland. The Oaks hit three homers, two of them by Earl Rapp. Roy Zimmerman got the other one. The win pushed Oakland past Portland and San Francisco in the standings.

A three-hit pitching performance by Bill Evans plus five San Francisco errors gave Sacramento a 10-4 win over the Seals. Evans walked five and hit two batters

OSC Gridders' Work Sessions In Third Week

CORVALLIS, April 19 — Spring football practice is well into its third week at Oregon State and Coach Kip Taylor is beginning to get a pretty good line on his new men.

"I am greatly pleased with the morale and the intensity with which our squad members are playing," Taylor declared. "However, our techniques in many departments are still very poor and need much more work." He added, "The end of the second week of drills was climaxed last Saturday afternoon with an intra-squad game on Bell field. A Blue Shirt team led by veteran quarterback Gene Morrow and letterman right half Ralph Carr edged out an 18-13 victory over the Whites. Morrow pitched accurate passes to Carr for two of the Blue touchdowns.

New men have been showing up well at nearly all positions and have made it plain that a number of the veterans will have to battle for their positions. Bill Storey, freshman basketball forward who did not turn out for Rook football last fall; and Don Bradley, transfer from California Poly, have been looking good at ends along with the veteran John Thomas. Doug Hogland, a standout on the freshman eleven last fall, looks like a great varsity tackle prospect. Sophomore Chuck Oetinger, another freshman stalwart last season, and Fred Burri, varsity reserve a year ago, have been showing up very well at guards. Dale Walker, a reserve last year, has shown considerable improvement at his center post. In the backfield Bob Redkey, transfer right half from Grays Harbor junior college; and Bud Woodward, transfer fullback from Long Beach, Cal. junior college, both have been looking very good. Woodward was one of the leading ground gainers in last Saturday's practice game. Ralph Carr, a letterman reserve last season, has been showing up well at the offensive right half post.

Bill Hawkins, football star of Navy's 1948 game with Army, is both a pitcher and first baseman on the Annapolis baseball team.

Combining 13 hits with nine Idaho errors, Oregon State walked the Vandals 14-5 yesterday to move to the top of the northern division coast conference baseball standings as Washington dumped the title-defending Washington State nine 5-3.

Two big innings sewed up the tilt for the Beaver, a four-run second frame and a big six-tally fifth canto. A total of 12 errors marred the fracas.

At Seattle, the curve ball tossing of Washington's Bobby Moen had the Cougar batsmen moaning in earnest as they went down to their first defeat in four games. Moen struck out nine and gave up but seven hits. Gordy Brunswick gave the Husky hurler his only trouble, clouting home runs in both the second and sixth frames.

Washington, meanwhile, caught up with big Gene Conley in the third frame, tagging the lanky youngster for three singles and a double after two were out in the inning to count four runs.

Action now centers at Eugene where the winless Idaho Vandals and Oregon Ducks square off today and Thursday to see which leaves the cellar.

Pete Newell To Coach Basketball At MSC

EAST LANSING, Mich., April 19 — (AP) — Peter F. (Pete) Newell, who made a reputation at the university of San Francisco, is the Big Ten's newest basketball coach. Michigan State signed Newell yesterday, ending a long search for a new coach. State makes its debut in Big Ten basketball next season.

There are no illusions for Newell, evidently. "It's a tough league I'm coming to," he said here yesterday. "I just hope the fans don't expect too much the first year. I'm no miracle man."

Newell, 34, takes over a team that won only four games in 22 last season. His own 1948-49 San Francisco team won the national invitational tourney. Frisco was eliminated in the recent NIT by City College of New York, eventual champion.

Cotton Wins Decision Over Tough Don Lee

SEATTLE, April 19 — (AP) — Eddie Cotton flailed away for 10 rounds last night at the chin of rugged Don Lee. He hit it often but couldn't earn better than a decision with the 165-pound Edison, Neb., invader.

Cotton, 167, almost had the verdict in the fourth round when Lee's seconds tossed in the towel. But Referee Jimmy Wilson tossed it right back out and ordered the battle to continue.

In two other 10-round struggles, Lou Joseph, 152, Seattle, decisioned Bruce Richardson, 153, of Los Angeles, and Buford Ransom, 147, Seattle, scored a sixth round T.K.O. over Billy Laudeman, 155, of Miami.

Billy Carter, Vancouver, B. C., 184-pounder, knocked out Joe Thomas, 188, Seattle, in the second round of their scheduled four-round curtain raiser.

PORTLAND, April 19 — (AP) — Heavyweight boxer Joe Kahut's attempt to break a contract with Manager Jack Capri was in the hands of the circuit Judge Martin Hawkins today.

Testimony ended yesterday after Capri asserted he had never broken contract terms, still felt friendly toward Kahut, and wanted the contract extended another five years.

Kahut countered with a statement that Capri was never intended as his manager. Matchmaker Joe Waterman was the actual manager behind scenes, Kahut said. Waterman died last fall. Kahut asked that the contract be declared invalid.

Yakima was back atop the Western International league today—right where it ended the 1949 season.

The Bears opened defense of their Class B league crown last night with an 8-3 win over the Wenatchee Chiefs as the eight-team circuit got under way on its five-month schedule.

More than 15,000 fans attended opening games in four cities. The biggest crowd, approximately 5,000, crashed the turnstiles at Kennewick where the Tri-City Braves made their league debut with an 8-3 11-inning loss to the Vancouver Capitanos.

Elsewhere in the circuit, Tacoma nipped Salem 4-2 and Spokane edged Victoria 5-3.

Yakima got only five hits off the left-handed slants of Wenatchee's Don Ferrarese but made the most of 10 walks. The Bears led the game in the eighth inning, scoring four runs on three passes, a hit batsman and a pair of binkies. Jim Westlake smacked a two-run homer for the winners in the final inning. The crowd of 3,040 fans got their first chance to cheer when Wenatchee scored its three tallies in the final inning.

Vancouver's Bob Snyder and Tri-City's Lou McCollum were hit hard up lighter than a girdle for 10 innings, but the string snapped for McCollum in the 11th as Jim Moore singled and scampered home on Bob McLean's triple. The Caps

didn't stop until four more runs poured across.

Spokane, the only home team to win, completed its scoring early with single runs in the first, second and fourth frames and two tallies in the fifth on singles by George Stassi and Ed Nulty and an infield error.

Victoria got to John Conant for eight hits, but couldn't group them. A crowd of 3,998 fans sat through the opener in 40-degree weather.

Tacoma's Clint Hufford blanked Salem until the eighth inning when the Senators broke through for their only two tallies on three bingles. It wasn't enough to offset the early inning trouble of southpaw Ken Wyatt who gave the Tigers a pair in the first on three walks and two hits, and single tallies in the fourth and fifth

frames. The latter was Glenn Stetter's home run over the 340-foot left field fence. Opening night crowd: 3,500.
