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Rates Boost Asked By Telephone Co. In Washington

SEATTLE, April 19.—(AP)—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company said Tuesday it has applied for its third general rate increase in Washington state in three years.

The application requesting a 10 percent increase was filed with the Public Service commission in Olympia. All subscribers would be affected.

The application also requested that the five-cent rate on coin box telephones be increased to 10 cents.

No increase was requested in long distance rates.

The company was granted a rate increase in 1947 which brought in \$3,700,000 a year and the first of this year another boost was approved to provide an additional \$3,573,000 a year.

Tuesday's request, if granted, would bring in approximately \$4,250,000 a year, a spokesman said.

This is approximately the amount rejected by the commission when it approved 52 percent of the increase requested by the company last year.

E. D. Wise, vice-president and general manager of the company, said the increase is necessary because of inflationary tendencies which have heavily increased cost of plant and equipment.

Wise also left room for an additional increase request. "The rate application is based on the going level of costs," he said. "If expenses increase beyond present expectations because of higher material costs, higher wage rates or other factors, the application would have to be amended to cover the increase," he said.

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
