

### Missionary To Speak On Work In Chinese Field

Dr. Donald A. Irwin, long active in the educational and evangelistic work of the Presbyterian missions in China, will speak at the First Presbyterian church, April 24, at 7:30 p.m., according to Dr. Morris H. Roach, local church pastor. A 6:45 potluck dinner will precede the talk.

Since 1920, Dr. Irwin has had close association with the youth of China and has acquired an understanding of the political and social problems of that nation. He served as academic head of two Chinese schools prior to the war and in recent years has worked in student evangelism in the educational center of Hangchow, as well as serving as pastor of the Hangchow University church.

Dr. Irwin was born in Tengchow, China, the son of missionary parents. He attended high school in this country and was graduated from Washington and Jefferson college and Western Theological seminary of Pittsburgh. The University of Pittsburgh granted him a Ph.D. degree in the field of religious education.

At present, Dr. and Mrs. Irwin have been unable to return to China because of the political situation there. He has been assigned temporarily to work among foreign students on campuses of western universities.

Bollman was hired Wednesday night by the temporarily appointed city manager, H. C. Hamilton, of Springfield, to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Recorder Kenneth Giles. Giles had resigned along with several other Springfield city officials.

Bollman said today that he would remain in Roseburg until someone could be familiarized with the work of his office here. He said he would probably be here another two weeks, but would in the meantime be checking with the Springfield office. He said payrolls remain to be gotten out in that city.

City Manager M. W. Slankard announced today that he is accepting applications to fill the position to be vacated by Bollman. Applicants must live within the city of Roseburg. The position, he said, pays \$315 monthly.

### Woman Attorney Found Dead; Murder Suspected

NASSAU, Bahamas, April 20 — (AP) — The body of Miss Betty Renner, 38-year-old Washington, D. C., attorney, was found in an open well in a quarry yesterday and police believe she was murdered.

The body, clad only in a brassiere, was found in a well off Gladstone road in a lonely pine forest about six miles from this resort city.

Maj. G. H. Rano, police chief, said that was "no positive proof" that she had been raped.

Miss Renner was the daughter of Charles H. Renner, president of the Plaza Poultry Co., in Washington, and was a graduate of the Washington School of Law and of Catholic university.

She served in Tokyo on the staff of Joseph E. Keenan during the war crimes trial and prior to that was an attorney with the justice department in Washington.

### All-Negro City Court To Be Established In Miami

MIAMI, Fla., April 20 — (AP) — This city's all-Negro municipal court—believed to be the first set up along purely racial lines in the south—will open on May 1.

The city commission yesterday unanimously chose Lawson E. Thomas, 32-year-old Negro attorney, as judge of the new court.

"The court will be an interesting experiment in self-government by Negroes," said Thomas. "It will give the Negro a chance to show his ability to participate in government."

The court may produce stiffer sentences for Negroes. Several Negro leaders long have urged the appointment of a Negro judge in the belief he would be more capable of judging a Negro lawbreaker.

About 50,000 Negroes live in the greater Miami area.

### House Committee Votes Slash In Excise Taxes

WASHINGTON, April 20 — (AP) — The House ways and means committee today voted a \$75,000,000 reduction in manufacturers' excise taxes. It would repeal completely the excise levies on household cookstoves and waterheaters, light bulbs and several other items.

The group refused to reduce the excises on automobiles, motorcycles, trucks, buses, truck tractors, parts and accessories, and tires and tubes. These taxes collect over \$500,000,000 annually.

This was the first direct action the committee has taken in the three months it has been studying President Truman's proposal for an overall excise cut of \$655,000,000.

### Romania Grabs Homes Of 'Upper' Class People

BUCHAREST, Romania, April 20 — (AP) — Houses belonging to former wealthy owners of the "upper middle classes" were taken over today by Romania's Communist-led government.

Affected by the decree are houses belonging to former industrialists and big landowners, former bankers and big merchants and "other elements of the upper middle classes."

Also nationalized were all privately-owned hotels and their entire inventory and all houses being "exploited" by their owners for rent.

Houses belonging to workers, white collar workers, small artisans, professional men and pensioners were exempted from the decree.

### Nude Doukhobors Flee After Firing 3 Hovels

NELSON, B. C., April 20. — (AP) — A demonstration by 50 nude, song-chanting Doukhobors was routed by police at nearby Krestova yesterday shortly after three small dwellings were destroyed by fire. No arrests were made.

Authorities identified the demonstrators as members of the radical Sons of Freedom sect.

One of the three homes—all described by police as "dopchek-style" dwellings—belonged to Alex Dahtokoff, a Freedomite now jailed for his part in the burning of a school. Another belonged to Pete Khalidinn, one of the 36 Doukhobors arrested last week in connection with the destruction of the home of the late Peter (the Lordy) Virgin. The third was owned by Mike Bayoff who, police said, was released recently from jail and committed to a mental hospital.

The demonstration coincided with the start of preliminary hearings against the 36 persons charged in connection with the Virgin home fire last week.

### Vote Favors States In Oil-Rich Tideland Issue

WASHINGTON, April 20. — (AP) — The House judiciary committee today approved legislation giving the state clear title to the oil rich tidelands.

Under the terms of the bill, the states would own submerged coastal lands three miles out from their shorelines. In the case of Texas, the limit is 10½, because of conditions under which it entered the union.

The bill further provides that the states shall receive 37½ percent of all revenues from oil and gas leases between the three-mile limit (Texas, 10½ miles) to the edge of the continental shelf.

The federal government would receive the remainder.

### Three Join Roseburg Air Reserve Squadron

Three Air Force reservists made application for membership in the 9415th volunteer air reserve training squadron, Roseburg, at a meeting of the squadron Wednesday night.

Lt. Col. Theodore Wirak, commanding officer, presided over the short meeting, spent in answering personnel questions and bringing records up to date.

The commanding officer said he is anxious for all reservists in this area, both officers and enlisted men, to join the local squadron. He pointed out that membership in such an organization is necessary for the accrual of points toward retirement and promotion.

The reserve meetings are held in the armory at Roseburg on the first and third Wednesdays of each month. The next regular meeting will be May 3.
