

Hunt Continues For Slayer Of Woman Lawyer

NASSAU, Bahamas, April 21.—(P)—Two heartbroken brothers were to view the body of their murdered younger sister today as police sought the person who stripped her almost naked and tossed her into a well to drown.

The semi-nude body of Miss Betty Renner, 38-year old Washington attorney, was recovered from a shallow well Wednesday. She was wearing only a brassiere.

Dr. H. B. Taylor, who performed the autopsy, said there was no positive evidence of rape but the possibility was still being investigated.

Her older brothers, Frederick P. Renner, 40, and Charles H. Renner Jr., 39, arrived from Miami, Fla., last night.

Major G. H. Ranoe, chief of police, said the death was definitely murder and that a Negro of the water type was being sought. The Negro was seen bicycling with Miss Renner in the area before she disappeared Tuesday.

Ranoe said there was a ragged cut on Miss Renner's head and bruises on the face. A struggle apparently took place about six feet from the well. Miss Renner was dragged over rocks to the depression, and then tossed unconscious into the well, he said.

The chief of police said it appeared Miss Renner was trying to run away when she was dragged down. Her bicycle was found neatly parked near the well, indicating she went there to see the place.

Townfolk reported Miss Renner often went on bicycle trips by herself. She was well liked and apparently had no romantic attachments.

Gasoline Price Boost Ups British Taxi Fares

LONDON, April 21.—(P)—London's taxi fares were boosted today for the first time in 16 years.

The government approved an increase of 3 1/2 cents per trip to meet increased gasoline costs. Gasoline went up 42 cents a gallon Tuesday after the Labor government's new budget added 10 1/2 cents per gallon to the gas tax.

The increase is a temporary relief for taxi drivers pending decision on their request for all-round fare increases.

Cab fares presently are about 10 1/2 cents for the first two-thirds of a mile and three cents for every third of a mile thereafter.

PP&L Gets Nod To Issue First Mortgage Bonds

WASHINGTON, April 21.—(P)—Pacific Power and Light Co., Portland, Ore., won authorization from the Power Commission yesterday to issue \$9,000,000 in first mortgage bonds.

Conditional approval for the issue was given April 7. The order yesterday approved a coupon rate of 3 percent a year, the price of 101.8011 to be paid by Blair, Rollins and Co., Inc., and Carl M. Leob, Rhoades and Co., and the initial offering price of 102.389 for resale to the public.

Granddaughter Of T. R. Sues Russian Husband

NEW YORK, April 21.—(P)—A 22-year-old granddaughter of President Theodore Roosevelt, Mrs. Edith Roosevelt Barmine, is suing for separation from Alexander Barmine, 51, former Russian general and diplomat.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald B. Roosevelt, of Cold Spring Harbor, N. Y. Roosevelt, a New York bond dealer, is the only surviving son of the late President.

Barmine, now a U. S. citizen, left the service of the Soviet Union in 1937.

Barmine's present wife is his third. They were married at Northport, N. Y., Sept. 8, 1948.

Details of the separation petition are withheld under rules of the New York state supreme court.

Convention In Hawaii Gives Boot To Bridges' Aide

HONOLULU, April 21.—(P)—The Hawaii communist convention last night expelled a delegate who refused to tell a congressional committee whether he is or ever was a Communist.

The 39-to-7 vote ousted Frank G. Silva, Kauai island business agent for Harry Bridges' CIO Longshore union.

Silva twice had refused to answer the Communist question put by the House Un-American Activities committee investigating Red influence in Hawaii.

An avowed former Communist, Ichiro Izuka, told the committee Silva had showed him a Communist party card in 1946.

Silva, in an impassioned speech, told the convention he never had been a party member. He said he had refused to testify because he had a constitutional right to silence.

Silva took a non-Communist oath April 4 when seated by the convention. Samuel Wilder King, former Hawaii delegate to Congress and a member of the convention, said Silva's actions placed the entire convention in "ill repute" before Congress.

Hawaii must seek congressional ratification of its proposed constitution. It hopes this will speed statehood.

S. P. Trains To Operate On Standard Time

SAN FRANCISCO, April 21.—(P)—The sprawling Southern Pacific lines will continue to operate its passenger trains on standard time after April 30, when California adopts Pacific daylight saving time.

But local trains and most trains operating entirely within California will advance their railroad time schedules one hour, so they will arrive and depart at the times (Daylight saving) to which travelers are accustomed.

Southern Pacific trains running from California to other states will operate one hour later by the clock on daylight time, just as such trains on the Union Pacific, Western Pacific and Santa Fe.
