

Vikings Win Track Meet On Finlay Field

Roseburg Jayvees Lose First Contest Of Year; Myrtle Creek Improved

The Roseburg junior varsity trackmen sustained their first loss of the season from a vastly improved Myrtle Creek thundersquad in a three-way meet on Finlay field Friday afternoon.

The Vikings took the high score honors, collecting 72 points, with the Jayvees placing second with a team total of 65 points, just 6 points behind the Vikings. The Jayvees of the junior high school placed third with a team total of 21 points.

Coach Frank Purdy of the Jayvees was forced to use a weakened squad in the triangular meet. The Jayvees usually use three place men from the varsity in the Jayvee meets, but the Indian track meet was forced to let many of the boys off for the day as he plans to use them in the Hayward Relays at Eugene today. The consistent scorers for the junior high school, Jim Kemp and Ron Hagquist, were also out of action because of the impending relays. The two ninth graders are running on the Roseburg varsity team but compete in the triangular meets for the junior high school.

Jones of Myrtle Creek looked good in the dashes. His 10.9 seconds time in the 100-yard dash was not exactly an outstanding performance for a high school track meet, but it is a considerable improvement over the time he turned in for an early meet with the Indians. Jones and his teammate Holder were the high individual score winners with 17 points apiece.

Tom Taylor, running his first 200-yard hurdle event of the season, turned in a pretty good time of 27.5 seconds for that event. Taylor has shown consistent improvement throughout the season and should develop into a good varsity man.

The Indian varsity team left early this morning for Eugene to run in the 13th annual Hayward relays. The event was scheduled to get underway at 11 a.m.

Ashland wound up with 42 1/2 points, Cottage Grove 41, Klamath Falls, 34, Molalla 25, Coquille 19. No other team got more than 10 points.

In class C Pleasant Hill had 20 points, Banks 25, Creswell 24, Gold Hill and Henley 19 each.

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Coast League Pitchers Hurl Three Hitters

The Pacific Coast League hasn't been honored by a full grown no-hit, no-run game in three years, but the latest pitching performance indicates that the law of averages is bound to catch somebody this season.

As of today, the likeliest looking candidates are Ben Wade of Hollywood, Al Lien of San Francisco and Ralph Hamner of Los Angeles. These gentlemen were the principals in three-out 'em, three-out 'em last night, one of which had perfect game written all over it for nearly eight innings.

The embroiled crying towel goes to Wade, 27-year-old right hander who won 18 for Nashville last year. He retired 23 Seattle batters in a row before the whammy, personified by Lonnie Frey, got him for a single with two away in the eighth.

It was the closest anybody had come to a regulation no-hitter since Tommy Bridges cranked one for Portland in April of 1947. Wade issued no walks, struck out six, allowed nobody but Frey and Hillis Layne, who tripled in the ninth, to reach first base. It was Wade's second shutout.

Hollywood won the two hitter by 7 to 6, handing the sinking Rainiers their 14th defeat in 15 starts and their fifth goose-egging. It was Hollywood's fourth shutout victory this season.

Wade's feat shaded only slightly that of Al Lien, the San Francisco veteran took 10 innings to blank Sacramento, 2 to 0, with another two hitter — and he scored the winning run. He was nicked for singles in the third and tenth innings.

Max Surkont, beefy Solon right hander, went along with Lien in a scoreless duel for nine innings, but sealed his doom in the overtime by giving his rival a base on balls. Lien took third on Jackie Tobin's double and both scored on two long flies.

Hamner, the other shutout impresario, set the second place San Diego Padres down 10 to 0, with a three hitter. Hamner was the first twirler to blank the Padres this year. Los Angeles combed four San Diego moundmen for 16 knocks, including homers by Clarence Maddern and Frankie Baumholtz.

In last night's other game, Oakland fashioned a plain 6 to 4 triumph over Portland. Joe Brovia's home run with one on for the Beavers highlighted the proceedings. Oakland got off to an early 4 to 0 lead and maintained the advantage the rest of the way.

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Page Upholds Stengel Over Boston Sox

"Yeah, but I got Joe Page!" That has been Casey Stengel's stock reply in nearly every discussion concerning the relative merits of his New York Yankees and the powerladen Boston Red Sox.

More than once during the recent spring training grind the Yankee manager was reminded that the Red Sox owned the greatest hitters in Ted Williams and Vern Stephens and the best pitchers in Mel Parnell and Ellis Kinder. To all this, the grizzled Stengel would reply:

"Yeah, but I got Joe Page!" This statement becomes more significant every day as the American league pennant race swings into the close of the opening week.

To date, the Yankees have played four games. They've won three and lost one. Page, the brilliant relief artist, has been summoned to relieve faltering mates in three of them. The Yankees won all three. Page saved two for other hurlers and received credit for the other.

Manager Joe McCarthy will long remember how the southpaw ace stopped his Red Sox cold last Tuesday and Wednesday with four scoreless innings, two in each game. Now the Boston skipper has company in Bucky Harris, veteran pilot of the Washington Senators.

Harris, who like McCarthy, once bossed Page as manager of the Yankees, sweated and fretted yesterday as Fireman Joe set back eight of the nine men to ace him to help the Yankees defeat the Senators, 14-7. It was the Yankees' home opener.

Page relieved starter Tommy Byrne in the top of the seventh in the midst of a Washington Rally that produced five runs and gave the Nats a 7-7 deadlock. He yielded a run-producing fly and a single that tied the score. But with the potential winning runs on the bases, Page settled down to retire Sam Dente for the third out, then set back the ensuing six men in succession to gain his first triumph.

A seventh inning home run by Joe Magglio with a mate aboard off Mike Harris shattered the 7-7 tie.

A home crowd of 44,642 watched the unbeaten Detroit Tigers register their third straight victory by defeating the Chicago White Sox, 4-1. The only other unbeaten American league team is St. Louis, winner of its first two games. The Browns and Cleveland were idle yesterday.

Vic Wertz's homer with two on in the eighth broke a 1-1 deadlock and won for Detroit.

Present For McCarthy

Maurice McDermott, 21-year-old left-hander, gave Manager McCarthy a swell present on his 63rd birthday when he pitched the Red Sox to an easy 8-2 triumph over the Philadelphia Athletics. The youngster hurled seven-hit ball to spoil the home start of Connie Mack's 50th season as manager of the Athletics. Stephens hit a bases-loaded homer in the ninth.

A grand slam home run by Catcher Roy Campanella and superb clutch pitching by Preacher Roe helped Brooklyn whip the New York Giants, 8-1, in the Dodger's home opener.

The Chicago Cubs turned the tables on an old nemesis when Bob Rush outpitched Harry Brecheen to give the Cubs a 2-0 triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Ralph Kinner hit his first home run for Pittsburgh, but the major's home run king had to play second fiddle to teammate Wally Westlake. The muscular outfielder hammered two homers and a single to drive in six runs and lead the Pirates to a 7-5 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

A thunderstorm ended the Philadelphia-Boston game in a 2-2 tie after the Phillies had failed to score in the top of the eighth inning.
