

Hunnicut-Schultz Rites Read April 9

Baskets of calla lilies, Easter lilies and a white cross formed the setting for the Easter wedding of Miss Betty Hunnicutt and Billy J. Schultz at the First Methodist church April 9 at 3 p.m. The double ring ceremony was read by the Rev. W. A. MacArthur in the presence of 200 guests.
