

Roseburg Golfer Enters Big Field In Oregon Open

Norm Tauscher, professional golfer at the Roseburg country club, left Sunday evening to compete in the Oregon open golf tournament slated to get underway on the Tualatin Country club today.

Ron Clark, 22 year old University of Oregon sophomore and defending Oregon open champion, heads the list of 113 professional and amateur golfers entered in the tournament. Clark, who is defending the title he won at the Dallas last year which gave him a clean sweep of the Oregon amateur and open tournaments.

Plenty of Competition According to Tauscher, Clark will have lots of competition from a large field of talented amateurs. He lists Bob Duden of Portland's Eastmoreland club as the toughest of the play for fun boys, followed by Lou Jennings, Dick Yost, Lou Stafford, Tom Marlowe, Jimmy Briver of Seattle, E. L. "Gene" Bates, Harold Salvador, Dick Estey, Dom Provost, Sid Milligan and Johnny Frey.

Professors will be on hand to try to bring the title back to the play for pay ranks. Leading contenders will be Charles "Chuck" Congdon, Tacoma professional; Ed "Porky" Oliver, Seattle tournament star; and Harold West, 1948 Oregon open champion.

Wallick started fighting with Davidson, and Hessell walked up and got his famous "trigger" hold, and made Wallick give up. After that, Owen had to keep Hessell and Davidson from fighting Wallick, as both wanted to knock him around a bit.

In the opener, spectacular newcomer Eddie Williams decided George Strickland in a two-out-of-three-fall affair. Williams had a trick of reaching down between his legs, grabbing Strickland's leg and tripping him, but Strickland got behind him, but Strickland got wise and the next time Williams tried it, he grabbed both his hands and took the fall with a skin-the-cat hold.

Medford Wins Hayward Relay Class A Title

EUGENE, April 24.—Medford high school trackmen captured their seventh Hayward relay title here Saturday against competition from 21 schools of Washington and Oregon.

The Medford team of Coach Bob Newland won five of the 12 events and posted one of the two meet records hung up by the day's performances.

Medford scored 65 1/2 points to defeat the defending champions of Klamath Falls, who came in second with 46 1/2 points.

Records were in the discus and the shuttle hurdle relay. Des Koch, Shelton, Wash., cracked the discus record with a throw of 155 feet, 11 inches. It was 10 feet, 8 inches better than the old mark of Herb Nill, Medford, in 1947. The Medford relay team of Frank Morris, Hal Falkner and Don Spinis covered the distance and the jumps in 37.7 seconds. It was three-tenths of a second under the 1949 record set by another Medford crew of which Morris was a member.

Other scoring teams were: Springfield 38; Bend 24 1/2; Grant, Portland, 23; Lincoln, Portland, Salem and Eugene 18 each; Roosevelt, Portland, 17; Franklin, Portland, and Grants Pass, 10 each; Jefferson, Portland, 8; Albany and Corvallis, 5 each; Gresham and Shelton, Wash., 5 each; Roseburg 2 1/2; Vancouver, Wash., 2.

Fullerton, Rose Chalk Wins In Grade School Track Start

The Roseburg grade school spring track program got underway Saturday with Rose chalked up a win over Riverside and Fullerton edging the Benson thinclads. Both meets were held on the Finlay field oval.

The Rose grade school trackmen turned in the most impressive victory by running over Riverside 145 1/2 to 92 1/2. Fullerton nudged past Benson 141 1/2 to 126 1/2.

The grade school athletes were divided into four classifications for the purpose of the meet. The divisions were based on the sum total of exponents for an individual athlete's weight, height and age. The four divisions were heaviest, lights, pee wees and midgets.

A track oddity occurred in the midgets 140 relay event between Riverside and Rose. Both teams tied for first place, an event that doesn't happen in every track meet.

Generally speaking, the winning times in all four divisions were very close. However, Erickson's time in the 50 yard dash, an event run by all weights, seemed to give him an edge in the sprint events.

Erickson, running as a heavy, turned in a 7.7 seconds for the dash which was far superior to any of his other grade school competitors. Another unusual performance was turned in by Berg of Riverside. Berg, competing in the heavy division, threw the softball, the grade school version of the javelin, 155 feet 9 inches to completely outclass all rivals.

Fullerton and Rose, the winners of the first round of grade school track competition, will face each other on May 6 at the Finlay oval.

Pitcher Earl Jones and catcher Frank Kerr were sold to Little Rock of the Southern association. The amount involved was not announced.

President C. L. Laws and Manager Charlie Dressen said they planned to pitch 21-year-old Stanich immediately. The 6-foot-3-inch athlete was signed to a \$6,000 contract. He is not a bonus player. Stanich plans to complete his studies at UCLA in the off season.
