

All Entries For Boxing Feature In

Ernie Nazelrod, promoter for the YMCA-sponsored southern Oregon amateur boxing championship, said today that he has received the last of the final entry lists and is now matching the boys by weights for the Friday night card.

According to Nazelrod, the final championship bouts to be held at the armory Friday night, April 28, should be packed with action. He believes that the final card will include as many as 15 to 18 bouts. Some of the boys who are entering the tournament for the first time will have to fight twice before a champion in their weights can be determined.

Has Two Chances

Nazelrod reported that, under the tournament rules, a fighter must be beaten twice before he is put out of further competition. This will result in many of the same boys that performed in the exciting semi-final card April 15 facing each other again.

One of the best slugging contests of the April 15 card was the match between Bill Butler, 150, and Frank Bishop, 156. Butler used an unorthodox style that completely mystified his opponent. Local fight fans described it as a buzz-saw technique. Butler, a young Klamath Falls fighter, was able to consistently throw lefts and rights at such speed that it was more than Bishop could handle. The same boys will face each other on the Friday night card.

Sanders, Carter Eyed

Another top performance is expected in the Sanders-Carter match. Byron Carter is a Medford amateur who has received a great deal of attention down in the pear country. Local fans were somewhat disappointed when Sanders, fighting at 165 pounds, made such quick work of Geary Doves, 170 of Klamath Falls, in the semi-finals April 15. It took the Roseburg amateur just 45 seconds to win a TKO over Doves. Sanders is tentatively slated to fight Carter and Nazelrod says he will have his hands full in getting a win over the Medford fighter.

With 15 to 18 bouts scheduled for the card, Nazelrod suggests that fans that like the lightweight matches come early and leave whenever the big boys take over the show. Or, if the fan likes to

Senator Star Again Defeats Red Sox Club

What strange power does Washington's Rae Scarborough hold over the Boston Red Sox?

Joe McCarthy, Boston's puzzled manager, would give half his salary to find out. Tom Yawkey, the Red Sox' wealthy owner, went even further than that. He reportedly offered the Senators \$200,000 and two players for the pitcher's services, just so that his club won't have to face him. He was turned down.

And no wonder. Scarborough, just another pitcher to the rest of the American league clubs, is Christy Mathewson, Walter Johnson and Cy Young rolled into one when he comes face to face with the hard hitting Red Sox. He thrives on them.

Record Not Great

In six seasons in the big leagues, the 32-year-old righthander has won only 38 games and lost 43 to the six other clubs. Against the Red Sox, Rae boasts a gaudy 10-5 record. No wonder the New York Yankees offered six players for him recently.

Scarborough met up with the Red Sox for the first time this season last night. He proceeded to shut them out, 3-0. Three hits were all the power-laden crew could get off his offerings and all were made by one player — Al Zarilla, who rapped out two doubles and a single. Three others reached base by bases on balls.

Only once before in the major leagues has a player collected all three of his team's hits, that was all the way back in 1910 when Jimmy Sheppard of the Chicago Cubs made three against Harry Gaspar of the Cincinnati Reds.

The Red Sox-Washington game marked the first time Scarborough has faced Joe McCarthy's men since he beat them, 2-1, last Sept. 28.

The defeat knocked them from undisputed possession of first place into a deadlock with the Yankees. It eventually proved the margin of defeat as the Yankees won the pennant by one game. Exactly a year before — Sept. 28, 1948 — Scarborough pitched a 4-2 triumph over the Sox. That loss cost them the '48 flag.

The Senators scored all their runs in the eighth. Until then Al Papai had kept pace with Scarborough, holding the Nats to four hits. Then Washington tallied three times without getting the ball out of the infield.

As if losing the game wasn't enough, the Sox may have lost the services of Dom DiMaggio for an indefinite period. The brilliant centerfielder was forced to leave the game with a stiff right leg after the fourth inning. Ted Williams, recovering from a siege of the grippie, was back in uniform but was still too weak to play.

Lanier Wins
Another masterful pitching performance was turned in by Max Lanier, veteran southpaw hurler of the St. Louis Cardinals. The pardoned Mexican league jumper threw a four-hitter at Cincinnati last night in defeating the Reds, 1-0. Ken Raffensberger, who holds two 1-hit shutout victories over the Redbirds, was the unfortunate loser.

Lanier was the whole show. He not only fanned seven Redlegs but drove in the lone run of the game with a double.
Brooklyn defeated the Boston

WALLA WALLA, April 25.—(P)—Linfield's Carl Wickham gave Whitman only one hit in the first game of a Northwest conference baseball doubleheader yesterday—but lost 5-0. His own wildness did it.
His efforts went to naught in the third inning when Whitman scored four runs without a single hit and with only one Linfield error.
The Oregon club snapped back in the finale to win 4-2 on Marty Bergen's three-hit chugging.

Braves, 8-4, in the National league's only other game, scoring the winning runs in the seventh inning on a wild throw by catcher Del Crandall. The youthful catcher threw the ball into left field attempting to pick Duke Snider off third and both Snider and Carl Furillo scored.
Dick Donovan, making his first start in the majors, was the loser. Don Newcombe was credited with his first victory although he needed help from Willard Ramsdell in the ninth.

Invitational Track Meet To Start At 3:30 Friday

Coach Frank Purdy announced today that the starting time for the preliminary events for the first annual Roseburg invitational track meet to be held here Friday has been moved back from 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Purdy stated that the 2:30 p.m. time had been agreed upon by the seven schools entering the meet but the change was necessitated by a scheduling conflict with Marshfield. Marshfield authorities phoned Purdy Monday and asked that the time be changed because their athletes could not be excused from school early enough to make the three-hour trip to Roseburg. After several hurried phone calls to the other schools entering the meet, the 3:30 p.m. starting time was agreed on. Finals will still be at 7 p.m.

Officials Lined Up

Purdy also reported today that he has lined up all the officials that he will need for the invitational meet. It is interesting to note that many of the officials are not new to the thinned sport. The principal officials will come from the Roseburg high school coaching staff. Jack Newby, Indian basketball mentor, will act as clerk of the course; Cece Sherwood, Roseburg football coach, will be the official starter; Al Hoffman, who is presently very busy guiding the Indian tennis team toward an undefeated season, will serve as scorer for the meet; Ray Brown, assistant football coach, will judge the shot and discus events; Hod Turner, Papoose thinned coach, will be an official timer, and baseball Coach Norm West will be judging the broad jump events.

Others Listed

Purdy's list of officials also includes many great and near-great athletes of former years from the Roseburg area. Benny DuFresne, former Oregon State trackman and co-holder of the OSC-Washington duel meet record in the high jump, will be on hand to judge the high jump event. Sam McGaughey, former holder of the state record in the mile and present holder of the best mile time at Roseburg high school, will serve as an inspector during the meet.
Jim Finlay, holder of the district 120 yard hurdle record until topped last year by Don Hubbard, will serve as a finish judge. Don Hubbard, the present district high hurdle record holder, will be on hand to judge the broad jump

T. V. BEST? Can You See Sports Events Better At Home Or At Site

NEW YORK, April 25 — (P) — Can you see a sports event better at home via television or at the site?

This question and many others relating to R. V. and sports were battled back and forth at the writer's home the other evening. Present were some friends who are paying customers at sports events and who have television set too.

Being in on a pass, I let the others do most of the talking.

Finally, one of my friends turned to me and said: "Okay, you tell us what you think. After all, you've always got a good seat at the arenas and you've got a television set. Which is better?"

I said it depended on the sport and the location of the event.

For T. V. visibility, I rated the most televised sports in the following order:

1. Boxing and Wrestling. Excellent.
2. Basketball and Football. Very good.
3. Hockey and baseball. Fair.

Faults in All
There were faults to be found in the presentation of all of them on T. V. as against being at the scene where you can do a little yelling. But, again, that depended on where you sat at the arena and how much you paid for your seat.

Remember, though, it costs you nothing to watch at home, there's no fighting through crowds and no traveling.

Few seats at a boxing arena can compare with a ringside view at home. The important things you miss at home you probably won't see if you're further back than the 15 row at the arena.

Take, for an example, the recent battle between Rocky Graziano, the former middleweight champion, and Tony Janiro, the handsome Youngstown, O., fighter, at Madison Square Garden.

Janiro bled from the nose through most of the scrap. He also was bruised about the right eye. (He had a pip of a shiner the next day). Rocky was cut slightly around both eyes. None of this was seen by T. V. onlookers. I learned from those who watched.

Good General View

Having seen boxing on television myself, I can say the difference is this: T. V. will give you a fine general view but it does not show cuts, blood, and most important, the severity of a punch unless a boxer starts staggering around or falls.

Wrestling is perfect on television.

That is, if you like the groans. Because of the ten-second rule under which the ball must be brought down to the forecourt half of the court, basketball also becomes a fine subject for television. The smaller the area to be scanned, the better it is for video.
