New Drug Development May Harm Waste Industry

ASTORIA, Ore. — (AP) — The newly-developed drug aureomycin, which encourages growth in hogs and chickens, isn't being hailed too happily here.

The discovery is expected to cut into the sale of water-soluble waste products of fish reduction plants. Such products have been used for feed.

"There is still a demand for our product," said Paul Mason, sales manager of the Delmar Canning company, "but the market has been curtailed and it seems likely that eventually aureomycin will supplant the natural item."

R. F. Carruthers, president of Bioproducts, was more encouraging. He expressed doubt that aureomycin, whose production is still limited, would compete "at any time soon" with fish meal.

SALEM, April 25 — (AP) — Bands and orchestras of Salem and Eugene and the band of the Lebanon high school received superior ratings at Saturday's Western Oregon Music festival.

Other ratings included: Class A—B: Albany, Corvallis, Woodburn, Cottage Grove, Dallas and Sweet Home bands, all excellent; Springfield band and Corvallis orchestra, good; Junction City and Cascade Union High bands, average.

Camp Tye Dates Set; Candy Mint Sale Continues

Camp Tye, Camp Fire Girls summer camping site, will receive a boost with proceeds from the candy mint sale which closes Saturday. This sale replaces the doughnut sale held last year by the Douglas county Camp Fire Girls.

Proceeds will be divided between the participating Camp Fire, Horizon and Bluebird groups and the council. The individual groups will sponsor campfires and council plans call for improvements to the camp area.

Many campfires were provided last year by sponsoring organizations and individuals who felt the value of summer camping as an important part of the Camp Fire activity. It is hoped that more girls will be able to attend this year as a result of the candy mint sale.

Camp Tye will open July 9 and continue until August 6, according to council members who announced tentative dates recently. The program this year will stress camp craft and use of outdoor materials.

Begun two years ago, the camp proved to be a county-wide affair before completion. Communities were solicited for lumber and necessary supplies and with the aid of civic and fraternal organizations and parents the camp was built and equipped in six weeks.

The camp now boasts a hand-craft shelter, built by the D.R.A. community, a lodge and kitchen, complete with fireplace and electrically wired by REA, Douglas Electric and Trowbridge Electric; and 12 sleeping cabins.

Improvements scheduled before the opening of camp this year include a cabin for the cook and helper, swimming area facilities, laundry trays and a small sink in the kitchen. It is planned to enclose the lodge in order to allow winter camping.

Last year the camp was staffed with five paid counselors and 15 who volunteered their time. Lockwood Motors and Doyle's Wrecking yard supplied emergency transportation for the five-week camp schedule last year.
