

Opportunities Offered Persons Looking For Work

(Ed. Note: This is the second in a series of articles on the Oregon State Employment service designed to inform the public concerning its facilities for offering services to the community, employer and worker.)

In the Employment Act of 1946, Congress set forth the policy of fostering useful opportunities for those seeking work and of promoting maximum employment, production and purchasing power. As a part of this national system embracing 1800 offices in 51 states and territories, the Oregon State Employment service recognizes the significance of the job-finding process in achieving high economic activity for the general welfare.

Every one of Oregon's 29 local offices and many itinerant points has a part in this "employment process." In Roseburg at the employment office are to be found most of the items and human factors that go to make up this significant process. With thousands of "free" workers moving from state to state, town to town and community to community, an interdependent system of employment offices is a necessity.

While natural resources, scientific progress, general trade and many other material factors are important in determining economic activity, the human factors, involved in the bringing together of jobs and workers and the continuity of this relationship are perhaps of greater significance.

Employment opportunities varied of location, kind and number are basic in starting this "employment process," but here again the human factor of fitting the worker into these openings is very important. Proper preparation, selection and adjustment of workers to all the conditions of employment is recognized as increasingly important in maintaining high production and general prosperity.

Just how the employment office in considering the worker—his application, counseling, training, placement, etc.—handles the "human factor" will be taken up in succeeding articles of this series on your Oregon State Employment service.

Drivers Warned To Drive Slow Around Curves

Oregon drivers could save many lives every year simply by remembering that any moving object prefers to travel in a straight line, the state traffic safety division suggested today.

Swinging wide on curves is the result of excessive speed and the cause of many head-on collisions, the division noted. On Oregon highways outside of cities and towns, one-quarter of the accidents and one-third of the fatalities occur on curves, indicating a need for greater respect on the part of motorists.

According to state police records, the usual excuse of drivers involved in collisions on curves is, "I thought I was on my side of the road." The unsuspecting driver who enters a curve at too great a speed finds his car creeping over the centerline or pavement edge so gradually he may not be aware of it. When he attempts to hold it on his side of the road, he encounters centrifugal force and a refusal of the vehicle to turn sharply. If the friction of the tires against the road surface is unable to overcome the tendency to slide, a skid is the usual result.

Trouble on curves cannot be blamed on lack of knowledge, the division declared, since every driver is presumably aware of the danger. Too many apparently believe the modern car can be safely handled on almost any curve, but the record shows inattention and carelessness are as dangerous now as in the days when sharper curves were matched by slower automobiles.

Austin Flegel Endorsed By CIO District Unit

NEWPORT, April 25 — (P) — The First Oregon Congressional district CIO political action committee has endorsed Senator Austin Flegel Portland, for the democratic gubernatorial nomination. The CIO state council had declined earlier to name a favorite, declaring all three democrats were acceptable.

The CIO committee said "If Flegel is not nominated by the Democratic party, we are going to get McKay again."

Delegates from woodworkers union locals pushed through the vote. They indicated Flegel's opposition to the 1949 unemployment compensation act was a factor. The union contends a "seasonality" clause in that act prevents some logging and sawmill workers from receiving full unemployment benefits.

Presbyterians Plan To Buy 90-Acre Estate

PORTLAND, April 25 — (P) — The First Presbyterian church announces it was considering buying a 90-acre estate, with houses, swimming pool, tennis courts, and similar accommodations, for use in church work.

The church has obtained a 45-day purchase option on the site, which lies between Corbett and Crown Point and is part of the estate of the late Gov. Julius Meier.

The area would be used for church conferences, retreats, seminars, etc. There are sleeping accommodations for 148 persons. The purchase price was not given.

Russia Aims To Invade West Europe, Paper Claims

ROME, April 22 — (P) — The Italian news agency Ari, which specializes in Roman Catholic news, declares that Russia has mapped plans for invading western Europe. The agency, quoting "confidential reports from clandestine resistance organizations in the U. S. S. R.," predicted that once the Soviet invasion was under way Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia would turn about and side with the Russians. Tito's communist regime has been on the Moscow blacklist for nearly two years for demanding independence from Kremlin dictates.

Wedding Announcement Is Only Three Years Old

TACOMA — (P) — Mrs. John Hutson reached into her mail box and came up with a letter dated April 20, 1947. It was an invitation to the wedding of her niece, Mrs. John Mostead, of Parkland. Mrs. Hutson called her niece to thank her for the invitation. The wedding took place May 18, 1947. Mrs. Hutson missed it.

Mrs. Mostead's husband, then the bridegroom-elect, mailed the letter three years ago. He is a clerk at the Parkland postoffice.

The invasion plan, said the agency, called for forcing Anglo-American troops to retreat from their Atlantic bases into Italy "where they would meet many surprises." The reports, Ari said, indicate that 1950 may be the "decisive year."
