Search For Lost Heir Dropped; Estate Divided

PHILADELPHIA, April 26.—(AP)—The orphan's court, calling off its eight-year search for a missing heir, has awarded his \$82,000 estate to four relatives.
Judge Grover C. Ladner issued an order yesterday ending the commonwealth's hunt for Henry Homer Jr. Homer has been missing since Jan. 26, 1942, when he walked out of a nursing home in suburban Devon with only eight cents and his father's watch in his possession.
The missing heir, son of the late Henry Homer Sr., former president of the Philadelphia Cricket club and for many years Philadelphia representative of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co., became heir to a \$82,971 trust fund upon the death of his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth G. Homer.
She directed that upon her son's death the income go to Homer's half sister and the principal to her three grandchildren.

New Theory On Evolution Of Brain Told

WASHINGTON — (AP)—A new theory on the evolution of the human brain has been advanced by a University of Virginia scientist.
It's the contention of Dr. S. W. Britton that man owes his superior brain to a victorious fight against the force of gravity.
By forcing himself to stand erect, the primitive man brought about certain changes in his blood and nervous systems, and thereby stimulated the development of a super-brain, Britton said.
In a report to the National Academy of Sciences, he even suggested it might be possible by careful breeding to help apes develop brains of a superior kind. He offered no specific suggestions about this, but seemed to imply that standing erect would do the trick.
Britton told the academy's annual meeting that man paid some penalties for getting up on his two

All of which ties in rather neatly with a story from Don-Lee: Almost three thousand dollars worth of gunpowder has been blown up on Don Lee radio action shows by Norman Smith, the famous sound effects engineer calculated the other day. He's been with the net for six years. He figures 1,440 radio shows he has worked on personally, including "Roy Rogers," "Cisco," "Red Ryder," and "Hopalong Cassidy." Irvin Izo, Don Lee purchasing agent, buys blank shells designed especially for "extra loud report" (says so on the box) at forty dollars per thousand. It figures out to \$2,840. Many of the shows require Norman to fire fifty or more shots as the Indians chase "Cisco" or "Hoppy." There's a lot of skill required, too, in shooting the blanks convincingly. For instance, Norman sometimes runs in a little ricochet to give the listeners that extra sense of actuality. This he does by firing a shot then immediately playing a record with a ricochet sound effect on it. Like this: shot-shot-shot-pinnngggg, shot-shot-shot-pinnngggg. If done rapidly and timed right, fond listeners are happy that Red or Roy or Cisco really winged the varmint cattle rustlers, and Norman Smith has done a very satisfying job in re-creating the west that lives forever.

feet—like fallen arches, varicose veins, and possibly sinus and heart trouble.
But the scientist said development of a "very delicately responsive human brain" offsets all the other drawbacks.
The way he figures it, man's circulatory and nervous systems had to make major adjustments once man reared his frame to the perpendicular for long periods of time. For one thing, blood had to be forced upward to feed the brain primitive man already had.
It was as a result of these adjustments, Britton theorizes, that the brain was stimulated to develop into the delicate, superior organ it now is.
And what prompted primitive man to get to his feet in the first place?
Britton suggests that man's ape-like forebears got up off all fours when they found that in searching for food and watching for enemies there were certain advantages to keeping their heads high and their upper limbs free for activities other than locomotion.
Britton theorizes, however, that it took these "pro-man types" a few million years to establish complete erectness.

Worthless Land Bought To Obtain Voting Right

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 26.—(AP)—Eighty-six persons bought a plot of land in the city of Nashville for \$10, an average of less than 12 cents apiece.
Home owners in suburban communities, city and county employees, and business men were among the purchasers of the 39-foot lot which slants steeply up a rocky, refuge-strewn slope.
A tale law requires that a resident of Davidson county to be eligible to vote in city elections must have owned property in the city at least a year before the election.
The next city election will be in May, 1951.
"This sort of thing has been going on for a long time and there is nothing illegal about it," City Attorney E. C. Yokley said after publication on the real estate transaction.

Airliner Bomb Plotter Put Under \$50,000 Bail

LOS ANGELES, April 26.—(AP)—Bail of \$50,000 has been set for John H. Grant, aircraft engineer charged with plotting to bomb an airliner in which his family was preparing to leave for San Diego April 17.
The bail was set in municipal court yesterday when the 32-year-old Grant was arraigned on six counts of attempted murder and one count of violating the state law concerning handling of explosives.
Grant is sitting in jail for his preliminary hearing, set for May 3. If convicted he would face one to 20 years on each of the attempted murder charges and a term of one-to-life on the explosives count.
