

Roseburg Trackmen Edged By Grants Pass Cavemen

Roseburg high school track team produced one of their best performances of the season but were defeated by a powerful Grants Pass aggregation 61 1/3 to 60 2/3 in a dual meet on Finlay field Tuesday afternoon.

As the events were run off, Grants Pass took an early lead over Roseburg. The Indians trailed until the last two events, when Frank Purdy's thincads took a four-and-one-third point lead with only the 880 yard relay left to run. The whole meet hinged on the outcome of the relay race. Grants Pass took the 880 relay, beating the Roseburg runner at the finish line by just four inches, giving the Cavemen the meet. It might be added that sloppy baton passing cost Roseburg the meet.

Indian Lead Track

The Indians dominated the track events and the Cavemen took all first place honors in the field events, except the discus throw, to dominate the field competition. The sole first place winner for Roseburg in the field events was Bill Sumner who tossed the pancake 117 feet and 7 inches. Sumner also turned in the best performance for an Indian high jumper by taking a second in the event with a jump of 5 feet 6 inches.

An examination of the statistics shows how Roseburg dominated the track events. Grants Pass was able to score only 23 points from the running events as Roseburg collected 45 points in the track events. The situation was almost reversed in the field events, with Grants Pass collecting a two to one point ratio over the Indians in the field events.

Best in Short Events

The Indians turned in their best times of the season in the short running events and the hurdles on the Finlay field track. Bill Van Horn and Jim Shrum beat the Cavemen's talented dash man B. Roth in the 100 yard dash. Last

year Roth beat Van Horn in the dash event with a 10.8 seconds time. Van Horn took first place honors in the dash, going the distance in 10.6 seconds—the best time he has turned in for the season on the Finlay oval.

Jim Kemp, a natural track athlete running as a freshman for the varsity, ran the 440 yard dash and the 880 yard run for the first time of his career to take first place honors in both events. However, Grants Pass left their best 880 and 440 man, Dufur, at home with a split heel. Dufur could top Kemp's time easily on Kemp's best day.

Teams Compared

It is interesting to compare the pole vault performance of the Grants Pass junior high school and Roseburg junior high school, meet with the performances of the varsity. The varsity pole vault event was won with a vault of 9 feet 6 inches while the junior high meet was won with a 10 foot vault.

Bill Van Horn won the individual scoring with a total of 113 points. Jim Kemp and Raoul Stroup each collected 10 points for the runner-up honors.

Rus Werner, Grants Pass track mentor commented after the meet that the Cavemen were lucky to win. He also stated that the 1950 Roseburg track team was the best he had ever seen.

Need Field Strength

Frank Purdy of the Indians commented after the meet that if he could only get some consistent scorers in the field events, Roseburg could give any high school in the state a tough battle. He also stated that a little more depth in the track events would not hurt the team either. "At any rate," said Purdy "the boys ran hard, turned in some of their best times of the season and that's all you can ask them to do."

White Men Sentenced For Attack On Negro Girl

ROME, Ga., April 26.—(AP)—Two white men were convicted and sentenced to three to five years in prison last night for attempting to rape a 13-year-old Negro girl.

A third white youth was expected to go on trial today on charges of rape in connection with the same case.

An all-white male jury, composed mostly of farmers, deliberated almost two hours before returning a verdict of "guilty of assault with intent to rape." The jury fixed the penalty.

Convicted last night were James Marion Elder, 26, of Lockmart, and Jerald David Hicks, 24, of Dallas. Still to be tried is 20-year-old Louie Eugene Byars of Rome.

Papooses Lose To Caveman Juniors In Duel Track Play

The Roseburg junior high school track and field men took seven first place honors to the Grants Pass thincads six, but were defeated by the junior Cavemen 61 2/3 to 51 1/3 in a dual meet at Finlay field Tuesday afternoon.

The Grants Pass athletes completely dominated the field events winning all events except the discus throw. The Papooses took all first place honors in the track events except the 75 yard dash. The junior Cavemen captured enough "second and third place honors to out-score the Roseburg junior high school athletes.

Papooses Lack Depth

The meet clearly indicated that the Papooses have an excellent track-and-field team but lack the depth of the Cavemen junior high school. It also showed that the Cavemen had the advantage in the field events. Only four Roseburg junior high school field men placed in the field events. Stonebreaker took a first in the discus throw, Sconce placed third in the javelin throw, W. Palmer tied for second place in the high jump and Wehde placed second in the shotput.

However, even in defeat, the Roseburg junior high school athletes can be proud. It was just about a year ago, April 26, to be exact, that the Papooses lost a dual meet with the Grants Pass junior high school by a lopsided score of 110-12. If nothing else, the meet showed a definite improvement over last year's performance with Grants Pass.

Guthrie Shines

Guthrie of Roseburg turned in a wonderful performance in the meet. Guthrie walked off with the high point honors by taking a first in the 50 yard dash, a second in the broad jump a third in the 75 yard dash and ran on the winning 880 yard relay team, for a total

of 10 points. His team mate Hagquist took two first place honors in the 330 yard dash and 660 yard run to gain the runner-up spot for high point honors with 10 points.

On Thursday, the Papooses will be host to the Glide high school track team in a dual meet scheduled to get underway on Finlay field at 3:30 p.m.

Newest Jet-Propelled Plane Devours Space

MT. CLEMENS, Mich., April 26.—(AP)—The air force's newest jet-propelled fighter plane—the F-86 Sabre—will protect industrial Detroit.

Selfridge air base here received the first of the sweep-wing planes yesterday.

A speed of 710 miles an hour is claimed unofficially for the F-86. The air force says the craft holds the official world record of 670 mph.

The F-86's will supplant the F-80 Shooting Stars in the 56th fighter-interceptor group at Selfridge. The new plane has a tactical radius of 500 miles and a service ceiling of more than 40,000 feet.

Harvard Prexy Advises Faculty Probe Easing

BALTIMORE, April 26.—(AP)—Dr. James B. Conant, president of Harvard university, suggests that schools keep from going overboard in trying to keep Communists off their faculties.

"To my mind," he told 2,000 educators and Harvard club members last night, "the harm done by a few crypto-Communists on a faculty would be far less than the harm done by instituting a policy of relentless inquiry into the private life of every teacher."

Pearson, Fliegel Unite In Blast At State's Rulers

ASTORIA, April 26.—(AP)—State Senator Austin Fliegel and State Treasurer Walter Pearson buried their feud last night to attack the Republican administration of Oregon.

The two Democrats were joined on the speaking program by Lew Wallace, Portland, the other candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, Wallace, however, sniped at Fliegel.

They were the principal speakers at a banquet sponsored by the Clatsop Democratic central committee. The State Highway commission, the highway engineer and utilities Commissioner George Fliegel were their targets.

Fliegel declared earlier yesterday he would oust Flagg from office if elected. He said the commissioner was running the utilities office "for the benefit of the monopolies." He referred to Flagg's allowing a power company to boost rates in Astoria and a month later reducing the same company's rates at The Dalles. He told the Clatsop Pomona grange that Astorians were "being forced to make up the losses" of the utility elsewhere.

Walter Pearson, who had first hit at Flagg last week, repeated his call on Gov. Douglas McKay to oust Flagg. He said here that Flagg had failed "to represent the people in regulating the utilities."

The state treasurer accused the State Highway commission of holding itself above the legislature and the governor. He said Chief Engineer R. H. Baldock was a man who might have been very good 20 years ago, but now is still building two and three lane bridges, when he should be making them four and six lanes.

Wallace chided Fliegel for his campaign against the 1949 unemployment compensation law. Wallace said the state senator had voted for it and now wants it revised. Fliegel replied he voted with labor at that time and with labor had since changed his mind.

The Portland senator, who has on occasion demanded Pearson quit the gubernatorial race, said he would be "in there pitching for the winner" in November. "I have supported both men in the past and will again if either gets nominated."
