Nonpareil Community club will hold a box social at the hall Friday evening. Proceeds of the affair will be used to purchase playground equipment. Members and friends are invited.

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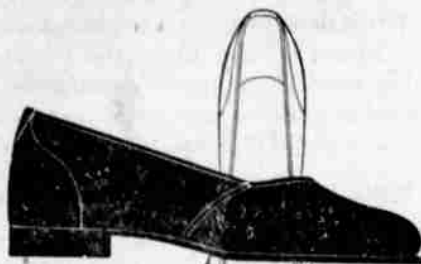
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
