Information On Travel To Europe Given At Kiwanis

Travel to Europe is expected to be greatly accelerated this summer because of efforts by Europeans to obtain more American dollars. Mrs. Rodney Peterson, in charge of the Roseburg Travel Service, told the Kiwanis club members Tuesday noon.

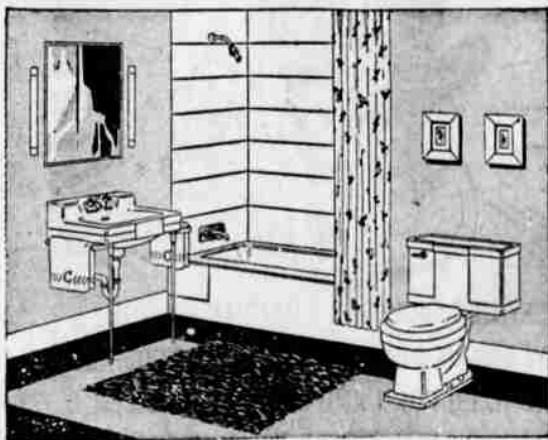
Accommodations in Europe will be cheaper and service better, she said. Special interest is being given to European travel also because this is Holy Year, and many Catholics will be making pilgrimages to Rome, she added.

Mrs. Peterson explained the working of the travel service, which not only provides information on travel in the United States and abroad, but also can make all necessary arrangements for trips, including travel and hotel accommodations.

arrangement except first class, for less than a year in advance, she advised. Tourist and cabin class accommodations are booked almost solidly for at least that far in advance.

Air Rates Vary
A great deal of travel is being made by air, which takes about 15 hours from New York. The principal passage is by DC-6 and Boeing Stratocruisers, she said.

Air rates cost about \$665 during the "on" season, from May to August, or \$493 during the "off" season, the remainder of the year. This is because of the greater demand for passage during the summer months. Mrs. Peterson recommended off season travel, especially in southern Europe, because the weather there is very warm during the summer.

Passports, which are very easy to get, are all that are required in most European countries. A military permit is needed in Germany and a visa for Spain, but these also are easily acquired, she stated.

She also discussed arrangements for scheduling air travel within the United States.

Candidate Speaks
Included on the program was a short talk by Senator Austin Dunn, Baker, a candidate for the office of supreme court justice. Dunn called attention to the importance of one clause in the constitution, stating that Congress shall assemble once in every year. He spoke of Mussolini's march on Rome and Hitler's taking over the Reichstag, demanding votes of confidence. "Democracy is the government of freedom only when free men work incessantly on it," he concluded.

Divorce Costs Actress' Hubby Nearly \$300,000

LOS ANGELES, April 26.—(AP)—Austin L. Adams Jr., 27, dropped almost \$300,000 yesterday in obtaining a divorce from Betty Adams, 26, whom he married four years ago.

Adams inherited \$800,000 from his mother, Mrs. Helen Whitmore Adams, Middlebury, Conn.

He testified his wife "stayed away from home too much without explanation."

Under terms of an agreement, Adams set up a \$100,000 trust for each of their two children and a \$75,000 fund for his wife. He also agreed to buy her a \$20,000 home and a \$2500 automobile. She was given custody of the children.

Reds Making No Headway In U. S., Truman Asserts

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—President Truman's assertion that all Communists have been tossed out of the government failed to convince Republican critics.

They also challenged the President's statement that the Communists at home aren't a great threat to this country. That just doesn't jibe with FBI reports, they contended.

In a speech to present and former government lawyers, broadcast to the nation, Mr. Truman said:

"There is no area of American life in which the Communist party is making headway—except in the deluded minds of some people."

"Not a single person who had been adjudged to be a Communist or otherwise disloyal remains on the government payroll today."

Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) contended that "his apparent indifference to the greatest threat ever faced by this nation is impossible to understand." McCarthy has been charging that the State department is a haven for Communists.

The President told the Federal Bar association in his speech:

"We know the greatest threat to us does not come from Communists in this country, where they are a noisy but small and universally despised group. The greatest threat comes from Communism abroad, where the center of its military and economic strength lies."

"The real danger is that Communism might overrun other free nations and thus strengthen itself for an ultimate attack on us."

Mr. Truman said his administration is "striking hard blows at Communist subversion wherever it is found."

"This administration has fought Communists with action and not just with words," he declared.

"We have carried on this fight with every law on the statute books and we have recommended new laws when we found they were necessary and could be framed without impairing the very freedoms we are seeking to protect."

He said that "no known instance of Communist subversion—or any other kind of subversion—has gone uninvestigated" and "no case where the facts warranted has gone unprosecuted."

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Gadget Enables Plane To Test Ice Floe Strength

WASHINGTON, April 26.—(AP)—The air force has developed a gadget to help fliers find out from the air whether an ice floe is strong enough for plane landings.

The device is dropped on the ice by parachute. The impact detonates a small charge which sets up vibrations in the ice. A seismograph, similar to those which detect earthquakes, records the vibrations. Its report is transmitted automatically by radio to the plane.

An idea of the depth and strength of the ice mass can be obtained from the radioed recording.

The device is expected to be of special value in Arctic operations. It was tested during the past winter on Lake Superior.

School Bonds Voted By Three Oregon Towns

PRINEVILLE, April 26.—(AP)—Crook county high school is going to have a new building—a \$500,000 bond issue having been approved Monday at the third try.

A year ago the voters turned down the proposal. In January they voted for it, but a technicality voided the election. Monday, with

some scattered returns still not in, they voted 557 to 250 in favor.

CENTRAL POINT, Ore., April 26.—(AP)—Voters here and in Gold Hill approved a \$500,000 bond issue Monday for construction of a new high school.

The vote in consolidated school district No. 8 was 213 for the project and 14 against; in Central Point, 95 for and 47 against in Gold Hill.
