

Hunt For Missing Corvallis Boy Is Back At Mill Race

CORVALLIS, April 27. — (AP) — The search for missing Tommy Pickett, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Layton Pickett of Corvallis, today was back where it started Sunday, in the mill race about a mile south of here.

Benton county Sheriff C. N. Lilly said searchers who have been combing the countryside for several miles around have been called in and new attempts will be made to search the stream.

The youngster wandered away from a picnic party Sunday and since then has been sought in the mill race and the surrounding country.

The sheriff said what little evidence has been uncovered to date still points to drowning as the most probable fate of the boy.

Charles Jaspers of the Portland harbor patrol, an expert in recovery of drowned persons, was here this morning to make another thorough search of the race.

If this brings no results, Lilly said it was probable the stream would be dammed tight and the water pumped out, either Friday or Saturday.

The Corvallis Moose lodge meeting last night would help financially or in any other way in the search and in damming up the stream.

TYPIST MOVES TONS

LONDON. — (AP) — Move ten tons a day; it's easy, men. A slip of a typist can do it any day with her finger-tips.

Statisticians for British typewriter manufacturers worked it out this way: The average typewriter key requires a pressure of 14 ounces. The length of a line of typing averages six inches. That means sixty impressions for one line or 840 ounces.

If the average letter runs fifteen lines, that's 12,600 ounces. Thirty letters are regarded as a good day's work for a typist. That means 378,000 ounces a day—23,625 pounds or 10½ long tons.

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
