Papoose Club Defeats Glide Track Team

Hod Turner's Papoose thinslads defeated the Glide high school varsity 54 2/3 to 49 1/3 in a dual meet on the Wildcat oval Wednesday afternoon.

The track meet was not a full regulation affair. During most of the meet there was a slight drizzle that forced both teams to run their events under raps. The 220 yard dash was not run because of the poor condition of the track. No javelin competition was held as the Glide high school had only one javelin and that was broken in the last qualifying throw.

The Roseburg junior high school took six first place honors in the meet. Jim Kemp won both the 440 yard dash and the 880 yard run. Gene Couey won the 200 yard low hurdles event. Jim Backen took first place in the high jump and his teammate Don Gibby won the discus throw. The Papoose 880 yard relay team won their event.

Jim Kemp paced the individual scoring by virtue of his two first place wins. Kemp collected 10 points in the meet.

Turner plans to give his thinslads a rest until the first of next week. Two junior high school track men Jim Kemp and Don Hagquist, will compete with the high school varsity in the Roseburg Invitational track meet Friday.

The Papoose squad will compete in a three-way meet with the Canyonville varsity and the Indian Jayvees next Tuesday, May 2. The meet is scheduled to get underway on Finlay field at 3:30 p.m.

Indian Baseball Nine To Play Myrtle Creek

It doesn't always take sluggers to win ball games. Portland beat Sacramento last night 6-5 by fashioning a four-run ninth inning rally with only two balls hit out of the infield.

Here's how: Luis Marquez started the rally by beating out a bunt and Johnny Rucker did likewise. Then Steve Mesner singled to the box for the third straight infield hit. Mickey Rocco next slammed a single to right, scoring Marquez and showering Solon hurler Max Surkont. Jess Dobernic relieved and helped the Beaver cause by walking three batters and throwing a single to Joe Polich. Glen Lierman came in to put out the fire.

Seattle Loses Again
Red Embree hammered the Seattle Rainiers deeper into the Pacific Coast league cellar. Throwing a six-hitter and striking out ten, he pitched San Diego to a 10-3 win over the Rainiers. The Reds have won only six games this year while dropping 20. Embree never allowed more than one run in an inning. Padre Burten Adams smacked his fifth homer of the season and also belted a triple. Frank Colman hit a roundtripper for Seattle.

Ducks, Huskies, Cougars Best in N. D. Track

Statistically, if the northern division track meet was held this Saturday Oregon would take it by grabbing off most of the second-place points.

The best marks to date for all meets in the division show Washington State, Oregon and Washington with four top performances each. Montana men dominated the discus and broad jump and Idaho has the fastest mile.

The statistics compiled by Art Litchman of the University of Oregon show the Webfoot school ranks second in eight events. This includes a one-two-three in the 100-yard dash and one-two-three in the pole vault.

Strictly on comparative times, Washington figures for three seconds and Washington State for two, the latter including a clean sweep in the shotput.

Oregon will have a small squad at the Drake relays this week while Oregon State invades Washington State and Idaho tangles with Washington in Seattle. Montana will be idle.

The Idaho-Washington collision is merely one phase of a scorer's headache planned for Seattle. Washington and California will meet in a dual event at the same time and all three will compete in a triangular meet. Actually each event will be run just once, but one winning effort could earn a Washington man victory in three events while each California or Idaho victory will be good for a pair.

California probably will pick up all the marbles on its record date the invader from the south figures to win every event.

At Pullman, Washington State should get back on the victory trail against OSC.

Al Hoffman, Roseburg high school tennis coach, announced today that the Indians will play their home matches of the season against Marshfield and North Bend this coming Friday and Saturday.

The Marshfield high school squad is rated as one of the strongest tennis teams in the state. The Indians defeated the Pirates in an earlier contest 6-1 on the Coos Bay courts. Ron Robbins, of foot ball and basketball fame, heads the Pirate list of talented racketmen. Robbins won the only match in the earlier Indian-Pirate clash by defeating Roy Van Horn 6-2, 6-3. Jim Slover is another outstanding Marshfield tennis player. Slover is also a basketball and football star at the Coos Bay school.

Hoffman expects to match Gordon Conley against the outstanding Ron Robbins. Dick Jacobson will probably draw the match against Slover.

Local tennis fans who want to see the game at its best are invited to see the Marshfield-Roseburg clash scheduled for the high school courts at 2:30 p.m.

Saturday, the Indians will play a double header with North Bend. The Indians have also beaten the North Bend tennismen 7-0 in an earlier match at the bay city. TOMORROW Entry Lists For Roseburg Invitational Meet Flow In

Frank Purdy, coach of the Indian track and field team, said today that he has started to receive the entry lists from the seven high schools competing in the Roseburg Invitational track meet to be held here tomorrow night, April 28.

Marshfield high school will send 19 athletes to compete for top honors in the first annual invitational meet and Myrtle Point has signified that they will send a 25-man squad to the meet.

Today, Purdy hopes to receive the remaining entry lists. As soon as all schools have submitted their lists, he will go to work on drawing the names to compete in the qualifying heats.

Hurdles Painted
The hurdles on the Finlay field oval are getting a new coat of paint especially for the night meet. The hurdle uprights are being painted brown and the cross bars are getting a coat of white paint. The white and brown combination is designed to make the hurdles easily seen under artificial light.

The school cafeteria has completed arrangements to feed more than 175 athletes and coaches that will be present for the meet. A regulation training meal will be served to the guests. The coaches will have several special tables to conduct two important meetings during the dinner hour. The tennis coaches of the district will lay plans for the forth coming district tennis meet. The basketball coaches will work out scheduling problems and other matters during their meeting. The dinner will start at about 4:45 p.m.

Score Board Readied
A score board will be placed in front of the stands for fans to follow the scoring of the meet. After an event is run, the score will be posted and added to the totals so

the spectators will know each team's standing in the meet.

Purdy is thankful for the light rain that fell Wednesday. He said the track was getting a little too dry to be workable. With the light rain, the track should be in excellent condition by Friday night, providing Jup Pluvius does not get too enthusiastic.

The high school hand, under the direction of E. G. Stiles, will be on hand to provide music at the start of the meet and during the intermission periods.

The climax of the invitational meet is scheduled for 10 p.m., when Karl Faulkner will present the three Lions' trophies to the captain of the winning team, the captain of the runner-up team and the special trophy to be awarded to the winner of the mile run. Bud Parsons, of Barcus Sales and Service, will present the Barcus trophy to the individual high scorer of the meet.

The finals of the prep track and field classic are scheduled to get underway on Finlay field at 7 p.m.

Trout Liberated in County Streams

Approximately 19,000 pounds of rainbow trout have been liberated in Douglas county streams of the Umpqua drainage since March 27.

According to Ross Newcomb, fishery biologist, this represents 110,000 fish, averaging 5.9 fish to the pound. They average 7 1/2 inches in length. The last planting was April 21. The game department is holding 40,000 fish for later release this summer. All the fish were raised at the Rock Creek hatchery.

Newcomb said that 946 of the fish are jaw tagged on the left side. He said he hopes anyone catching a tagged fish will send the tag or the number to him at Roseburg or to the State Game commission in Portland. He said he would be glad to write to anyone sending in a tag with his name and address, and he will give them the information as to where the tagged fish was released and how far it had moved in the river.

Some tagged fish were also included in the plant made recently in Loon lake.
