Swim Pool For Victim Of Polio Gift Of Union

MILWAUKEE, April 27.—(AP)—A group of warmhearted boilermakers are going to see that a young polio victim gets the swimming pool he needs for exercise.

After Saturday seven-year-old Jimmy Gaynor will have the pool in his backyard at nearby Waukesha, Wis. Jimmy's grandfather, Jack Gaynor, owns a Milwaukee tavern, patronized by many boilermakers.

Grandpa Jack sold the idea of a swimming pool for his grandson to Joseph F. Maley, business agent for the AFL Boilermakers union.

On Saturday several boilermakers will drive to Jimmy's house in a truck donated by the John Hennes Trucking Co., which also donated steel sheets and welding equipment, and build the swimming tank.

The tank will be 12 feet long, six feet wide and four feet deep. After that it will be up to Jimmy.

Cheese Vs. Cheese Match Up To Congress Verdict

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(AP)—A bitter-end match has been arranged in Congress between a slab of Wisconsin cheese and a chunk of cheese from Ohio, each weighing in at 75 pounds.

"I hope politics won't enter into this," said Rep. Lawrence H. Smith (R-Wis.).

Smith, manager of the Wisconsin entry, challenged Rep. McSweeney (D-Ohio) to the contest in an effort to settle a dispute over the relative merits of Ohio and Wisconsin cheeses (Swiss type).

The two 75-pound cheese wheels will be cut in half and samples of each will be served in the Senate and House restaurants. The lawmakers will be asked to hand down their decision—without being awayed by political considerations.

Chicago Loyalty Parade To Counteract Commies

CHICAGO, April 27.—(AP)—Chicago's first loyalty day parade, designed to counteract any May day demonstrations by Communist groups, is planned for Saturday.

Some 25,000 persons are expected to take part in the parade. David H. Caplow, Cook county commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, is parade chairman. He said military units and bands from veterans organizations, high schools and the police department will be augmented in the parade by Chicago residents.

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
