Mrs. Walter V. Monger Gives Convention Report To D.A.R.

Mrs. Walter V. Monger gave an intensely interesting and complete report on the state D.A.R. convention to the Umpqua chapter members at a 7:30 o'clock dessert-supper meeting Monday night at the home of Mrs. W. M. Campbell with Mrs. Roy Entler, co-hostess.

Mrs. Monger, delegate from Umpqua chapter, stated the most outstanding speaker at the convention was Vice-Admiral Thomas L. Gatch of the U. S. Navy, who reviewed the book, "Modern Arms and Free Men," by Dr. Bush. He stressed that this country's outlook for peace is the best now in a long time, however, he said the people must not be stampeded into war with scare talk. He urged for total preparedness and as free men, to think freely, as America has always had the chance to do.

She stated Gov. Douglas McKay was a luncheon speaker and urged the delegates to work for all people to vote as he had no fear if people would vote, but he had a grave fear if only the pressure groups vote.

The state resolutions committee presented three resolutions to the delegates to be voted upon. They included: World government, which was opposed, according to the resolution, because "by such universal federation, the United States of necessity would relinquish the major part of its sovereign rights and on a basis of proportionate representation, would have 6% of the world's voting power." No. 2, Disapproval of federal aid to education was based on the belief that such aid "would ultimately mean state socialism." The resolution strongly opposed passage of any legislation which would place control of education under one bureaucratic head. No. 3, Compul-

sory health insurance was opposed on the grounds it would mean further heavy taxation through the creation of another bureau, would violate freedom and individual liberty of the people and that such government invasion of the field of medical care could open an avenue of advance into other professions with a welfare state of socialism the inevitable result."

Umpqua chapter voted to write the Attorney General of Oregon asking for definite information as to whether or not Oregon did or did not stand with the sponsors of the world government resolutions.

The program was a forum on world government and what America stands to win or lose by considering it. Mrs. George Brown acted as chairman.

The forum, which followed, was led by Mrs. Monger. Mrs. William Anderson and Mrs. Ray Petrequin gave interesting talks on information they had gathered regarding the subject. Mrs. C. P. Caylor, regent, presided. The D.A.R. opening ceremonies were followed by the devotion in the form of a poem entitled, "God Bless America," read by Mrs. W. M. Campbell. A report of the nominating committee was given.
