

MAY DAY BLOODSHED PREVENTED IN BERLIN

Installers Of
Phone System
End Walkout

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—The threat of a nationwide telephone strike was ended today—at least for the present.

Striking telephone installers called off their week-old walkout against the coast-to-coast Bell system early this morning and began new negotiations.

The back-to-work order flagged down pickets who would have marched today in an effort to paralyze the nation's phone service.

The break came at 1 a. m. after a 15-hour bargaining session with federal mediators, and only four hours before the first pickets were scheduled to walk.

The strike was called last Monday by division 6 of the CIO Communications Workers of America against the Bell system's manufacturing and supply unit, the Western Electric Co.

Division 6 now will join 23 other CWA divisions in new wage talks with the Bell system's parent corporation, American Telephone and Telegraph Co., and its several subsidiaries.

In the back-to-work settlement, Western Electric reinstated the 104 original strikers at South Bend, Ind., who walked out to support six workers who refused to cross a muddy field to work on a television tower.

The "muddy field" issue and the long-standing wage dispute led division 6 to jump the gun and strike two days before the presidential strike truce ended last Wednesday.

Elevator Strike In

New York City Ends

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—Elevators started running again today for weary apartment house dwellers as a four-day strike of 12,000 service employees in 1,000 Manhattan buildings was called off.

A wage-hour dispute between the AFL employees and the apartment landlords was sent to a fact-finding board yesterday.

Demand made by local 32-B of the AFL Building Service Employees International Union include a weekly pay increase of \$2.75, a cut in the work week from 48 to 40 and a pension-welfare plan. The union says present wages range from \$43.50 to \$50.32 a week.

The landlords have contended that they cannot take on any added expense as long as rent ceilings are in effect.

Ceiling continues as New York state today took over rent controls from the federal government under a new state law.

MacArthur Advises Japan

To Outlaw Red Party

TOKYO, May 1.—(AP)—General MacArthur suggested today, for the second time in ten months, the possibility that the Japanese Communist party might be outlawed.

In a statement on the third anniversary of Japan's "no-war" constitution, the occupation commander blasted the Communist party as "an avowed satellite of an international predatory force and a Japanese pawn of Alien power policy, imperialistic purpose and subversive propaganda."

Similarly last July 4 he castigated Communism as "national and international outlawry" and questioned its right to continued legal sanction.
