

'Spec' Goldman Taps Golf Play

DALLAS, May 2.—(AP)—Old in destructible David (Spec) Goldman—who was a top national golf name when his opponents were in grammar school, and Buster Reed, 20-year-old collegian, led the way today into the second 18-hole qualifying round of the western amateur.

Drawing Spec, who says he always has to scramble for what he gets on the links, is playing this one with a big belt bracing his side. He suffered a fractured rib recently—he says he did it sneezing. Anyway, the Dallas veteran, and Reed, a North Texas State college student from Denton, Tex., who is just half Goldman's age, led the first 18-hole round yesterday with two-under-par 70's.

And right behind them were two more Texans—John Oliver of Dallas and Morris Williams Jr., of Austin—and a Shreveport, La., star, Jimmy McGonagill. They posted 71's.

Heavy rains last night made the Dallas Country club's 6,470-yard course a treacherous place indeed as the field, trimmed to 133 players by withdrawals, moved out in the second and final, 18-hole qualifying round.

Welmaker Leads Pitchers

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.—(AP)—Three Pacific Coast league pitchers held perfect records of four wins and no losses through games of last Saturday.

San Diego's southpaw ace Roy Welmaker still topped the circuit in games won, however, with a 6-1 record.

Jersey Joe To Fight At Mannheim, Germany

CAMDEN, N. J., May 2.—(AP)—After several months of trans-Atlantic negotiations, Jersey Joe Walcott and Hein Ten Hoff finally have agreed on terms for a 12-round fight at Mannheim, Germany, May 28.

The match was set yesterday when the contract was signed by Felix Boechicchio, manager of Walcott, and James Friedman of Bayonne, N. J., representing the city of Mannheim and promoter Leo Koenig. Friedman has been practicing law with American occupation personnel in Germany.

The fight will be held in the Mannheim stadium, which has a seating capacity of 90,000. The top prize will be \$16 in American money.

Under terms of the agreement, Walcott will receive a guarantee of \$25,000 plus \$6,000 for traveling expenses, all in American money.

Women's Golfing Increase Noted In Pro Fields

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.—(AP)—After years of struggling in virtual obscurity, women's professional golf is on its way to heights that may some day rival the men's extensive tournament schedule.

This is the opinion of Fred Corcoran, executive director of the Ladies Professional Golf association. Corcoran is the tournament expert who took over the men's faltering PGA schedule in 1937 and built it from a \$3,000 minimum purse tournament to a minimum \$15,000. He says he was booted out of office for his pains.

Since Corcoran took over the affairs of the ladies PGA last year, business has boomed beyond all expectations. The feminine pro shotmakers will play 10 winter and 10 summer tournaments this year. Three already have been held, at Tampa, Orlando and Augusta.

A tour of the Pacific Northwest is planned for this summer, following the western open at Denver in late June. Seattle is expected to be awarded the women's national open for a July date. Corcoran is negotiating with George Pratt, connected with a Seattle golf publication to hold the important event there.

Dates will be available for tournaments in Portland, Ore., Spokane and Vancouver, B.C.

The women stars are currently competing in the cross country Weatherlane open, the first 36 hole stage of which was won Sunday at Pebble Beach by Mrs. George (Babe Didrikson) Zaharias.

The next 36 holes will be played this weekend at Prairie View, Ill., followed by similar competition in Cleveland and White Plains, N.Y., on successive weekends. The low scorer for the full 144 holes will win \$5,000, while \$3,000 is being distributed for each of the four events.

Next on the tournament circuit after the Weatherlane will be the \$3,000 eastern open at Boston May 26, 27 and 28. The Chicago all-American tournament also is on the schedule.

In all, the women will play for a total of approximately \$75,000 in purses this year.

YMCA Softball League Will Close On May 19

The deadline for entry in the league has been set for May 19. However, it is hoped that the organizations desiring a team will not wait until that date.

This league is for the fun of playing and will not qualify any team for amateur playoffs. The only cost will be a small amount to buy a trophy, if that is desired. Each team will be expected to furnish its own equipment.

Churches Join League

The First Christian church and the Presbyterian church have notified the "Y" secretary of their interest in the Y-Church softball league. It is hoped, according to Cece Sherwood, "Y" activity committee member, that more churches will join so that a good league may be formed.

Any church desiring to join the league is asked to contact Marlen Yoder, "Y" secretary. The only cost for the league will be for the trophy as bats and balls are available for use through the YMCA. This equipment was furnished by the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs last year.

Pulitzer Prizes Awarded For Best In Newspaperdom

NEW YORK, May 2.—(AP)—Pulitzer prizes were awarded Monday to the Broadway musical hit, "South Pacific," and to the novel, "The Way West," by A. B. Guthrie Jr.

The Chicago Daily News and the St. Louis Post-Dispatch were given awards for meritorious public service in exposing Illinois newsmen on state payrolls.

The traditional American awards for newspaper work and literature were announced by Columbia university. The awards were provided by the will of the late Joseph Pulitzer, who died in 1911.

Other awards went to Samuel Flagg Bemis for the best biography, "John Quincy Adams and the Foundations of American Foreign Policy."

Meyer Berger of the New York Times, for the best local reporting in covering the Howard Unruh killings in Camden, N. J.

Edwin O. Guthman, Seattle Times, for the best national reporting, in a series clearing Prof. Melvin Rader of the University of Washington, of Communist charges.

Edmund Stevens, Christian Science Monitor, for the best international reporting in a series entitled "This is Russia—Uncensored."

Carl M. Saunders, editor of the Jackson, Mich., Citizen Patriot, for the best editorial. An editorial by him resulted in official designation of Memorial day as a day of prayer for peace.

James T. Berryman of the Washington, D.C., Evening Star, for a cartoon entitled, "All set for a super-secret hearing in Washington."

Bill Crouch of the Oakland, Calif., Tribune, for a news photograph of a near-collision between a B-29 and a stunt flyer at an air show.

O. W. Larkin, for the best art, "Life in America."

Gwendolyn Brooks, for the best poetry, "Annie Allen."

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Feller On Way To Old Form

CLEVELAND, May 2.—(AP)—What's behind Bob Feller's striking return to form in his two starts for Cleveland's Indians this season?

Better control and freedom from injuries. "That's 99 per cent of it," says Bob.

The big right-hander, in an interview last night before the tribe left for the east, also said he has been "pretty lucky in getting good breaks."

Feller won both of his two starts with polished performances. He pitched a five-hitter against St. Louis on April 22 and scattered eight blows in beating Detroit last Friday.

'49 Slump Recalled
In 1949 he didn't win his second game until June 14, when he also had six losses tied to his record. He ended that year with 15 wins and 14 losses and many of the fans said this year might be his last in baseball.

The former strikeout king now takes a strictly matter-of-fact viewpoint of his pitching. "I've broken all the records I ever hope to break," he said. "I'm not out to set the world on fire this year. I just hope I can be a good pitcher and help the club win the pennant."

Too Early
He also thinks it's pretty early in the season to be talking about how good or how bad he is. But he is willing to discuss some of the contributing factors.

Last year and the year before a sore shoulder bothered him well into the season. In 1947, when he began to go down, he slipped off the mound in Philadelphia and hurt his back and a rib.

This year he worked under wraps in spring training and got cuffed around pretty badly. But he came out without any injuries, as he intended.

"My arm isn't as strong as it was 10 years ago," but my control is better than it has been," Feller pointed out.

Paavo Ketonen Burned Up

SEATTLE, May 2.—(AP)—Harold D. Blount, a Fort Lawton soldier, was charged last night with disorderly conduct.

Witnesses said Blount became excited at the Eagles auditorium wrestling matches, ran to ring-side and pressed a lighted cigarette against the bare back of wrestler Paavo Ketonen.

Valuable Cow Goes Wild, Has To Be Destroyed

ANDOVER, Mass., May 2.—(AP)—The cow that tried to imitate a bull in ferocity had her life snuffed out last night.

Farmer Arthur Tibbert decided to shoot the \$1,000 Aberdeen-Angus when she showed no signs of ending her angry rampage.

For more than a week the animal attacked anyone who came near her as she tore through nearby woodland. She treed several persons who tried to capture her.

Joseph E. Haswell of the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals attributed her strange actions to approaching motherhood or stinging hornets.

Lookout Point Dam Bids Announced By Engineers

PORTLAND, — (AP)—The army engineers announced award Saturday of the Lookout Point dam project to three firms combined in a single bid of \$18,694,031.

The firms are Morrison-Knudsen, Boise, Peter Kiewit and Sons, Omaha; and Maceo corporation, Paramount, Calif. Earlier they were announced as low bidders for the project.

The job calls for completion of the earth embankment dam and construction of a concrete spillway on the middle fork of the Willamette river, 23 miles southeast of Eugene.

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Boxers Watch LaMotta's Title

NEW YORK, May 2.—(AP)—Boxing circles buzzed with new activity today, most of it centering around middleweight champion Jake LaMotta's rusting crown.

Al Weill, matchmaker of the International Boxing club, said he planned a series of conferences in his lush quarters that may set up a 160-pound title fight for late May or early June.

He said the talks would deal mainly with matching LaMotta against either Laurent Dauthuille, the new pride of France, or Sugar Ray Robinson, the welterweight king who wants to move up a notch.

Both Dauthuille and Robinson made menacing gestures last night in the direction of the Bronx better, who hasn't defended his title since he won it from the late Marcel Cerdan last June.

Dauthuille battered Steve Belloise, veteran New York contender, into submission in the seventh round of a scheduled 10-rounder at Montreal.

He smashed Belloise to the canvas three times in the first two

rounds and won an impressive victory. Robinson, meanwhile, announced through a spokesman that he would appear before the New York State Athletic commission Friday to post a \$2,000 forfeit bond as a formal challenge to LaMotta.

If LaMotta accepts a fight, Robinson will then relinquish his 147-pound crown. Robinson has whipped LaMotta four out of five times.

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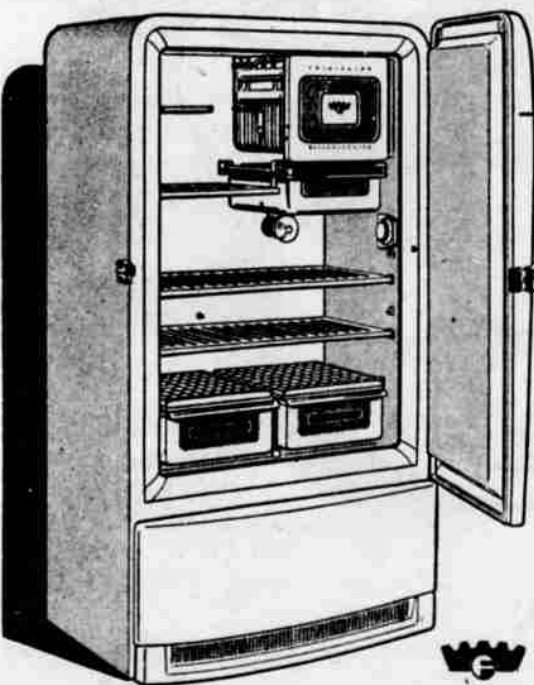
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
