MAY-FESTIVAL TO BE EVENT OF FRIDAY

The annual all-day May-Festival of Douglas County Extension Units will be an event of Friday, May 5, with the ladies of the Methodist church serving the noon luncheon at the Methodist church parlors.

Home demonstration work is carried on cooperatively between the United States Department of Agriculture, the state land grant colleges and county governments.

In Oregon there are 28 county extension agents (home economics) with offices at the county seat. The agents are members of the extension staff of Oregon State College. A staff of specialists at the college works closely with the county agents in bringing home economics information to the people of the state.

Douglas county has seventeen organized groups of home-makers who meet monthly from October through May for a demonstration of some project connected with the home. These groups are called home extension units.

Units are organized by written request of a number of home-makers. Requests should be addressed to Corinne McTaggart, county extension agent (home economics) P. O. Box 512, Roseburg, Oregon. Interested persons may call the agent at 323 in Roseburg or visit the extension office upstairs in the Post Office building.

Demonstrations each month are presented to the groups by the agent or by project leaders, group members who have received training by the agent or specialist. New units were organized at Winchester and in the Winston-Dillard area during the past year. Mrs. Cecil Hartford, Rice Valley, has the following statements to make about the value of home extension work:

"I believe it to be a very important work from many standpoints. Talking from a personal angle, I will try to convey what my unit and I have obtained from this work during the past year. I am chairman of the Rice Valley unit. I not only have learned how to make lamp shades, do textile painting and many other things, but it has been a great help to me in teaching me leadership, meeting and knowing people. I might say teaching me the art of free speech in front of people. That has always been my difficulty, tongue-tied in public."

I have been re-elected chairman of our unit, so many more experiences are awaiting me in the coming year. I also am one of the seven Douglas county Home Extension committee members. During the month of March I visited Scottsburg-Elkton and Gunter units and learned how other units conducted their meetings and also met many new people.

This past year Recreational Community Benefits leader training was taught in a series of four meetings held at the Riversdale hall and were sponsored by Oregon State College Extension service at the request of women from Douglas County extension units. Rice Valley had the good fortune of being able to send two couples to learn this recreational leadership. These leaders are Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Churchill and Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Rice. They, in turn, are planning to teach our own group and we are all looking forward toward it very much.

We also have a program chairman in our unit. It not only gives her help in leadership and addressing people, but it also helps those who attend to take part, understand their leaders better and teach co-operation.

During the past year, we had a very interesting program. Streamlined Home Sewing and Family Business and the Law were under the direction of the county home extension agent. Textile painting, Gift Wrapping, Making Lamp Shades and Freezing Prepared Foods were under the direction of project leaders who were trained in this work.

In May the county extension agent will lead us in Care of the Skin. During the cold weather we were unable to have the project Landscaping Home Grounds. Many of the units in the county did en-

New Program Selected. On April 18 I attended the program planning day held in Roseburg to vote for our unit on subjects for the coming year. One representative from each unit was there and each unit has one vote. There were many subjects voted on, but the eight that received the most votes and are therefore the next years county program are as follows: Furniture Arrangement, Step Saving kitchens, Cupboard, storage space and Home Entertaining.

These will be in charge of the county extension agent (home economics). Outdoor meals, Candy and Cookie making, Textile painting and making cloth and felt bags. These will be under the direction of trained project leaders.

There is also to be a 3-day workshop on making cotton dresses. Special subjects to be considered are "safety and fire prevention" and "marriage relations."

These meetings are open to the public, not to a selected few. It is my belief that if more ladies would attend these meetings they would obtain a great deal of information and would enjoy it from a great many angles.

I feel that it is a great advantage to us all to have this extension service available, at very little if any cost to us at all. So come on, ladies of Douglas county, be one of us and enjoy the many benefits the Home Extension offers us."

Executive officers will confer at 10 a. m. at the Rose Hotel according to Mrs. Kenneth Bushey, council president.

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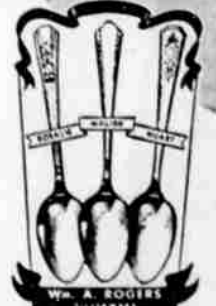
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
