Teen-Age Pair Trapped Via Burglar Alarm

CHICAGO, May 4. — (AP) — A 20-year-old girl, described by police as a cigar smoking, gun-toting Miss dressed in cowboy clothing, was seized today after detectives said her attempt at burglary failed.

The girl was captured with a 15-year-old boy when police said they set off a burglar alarm in the Lakewood Engineering and Manufacturing company.

The girl told police she and the boy smashed a skylight and lowered themselves into the plant at 1756 West Lake street. But she said they had planned to break into a drug store at 1758 West Lake street. She said she wanted to replenish her supplies of cigars and tobacco. Detectives said she carried a pipe, tobacco and a cigar.

Police said the girl, identified as Katherine Phillips, identified a 22 caliber gun found at the factory as hers. Police said she also carried a blackjack.

Both were held without charge.

Sunshine In April Exceeded Average

What's April noted for? April showers, of course.

But April in Roseburg was noted for its sunshine. That's what the latest monthly report from the local weather bureau station shows.

This area had 62 percent of the possible sunshine, the report shows, and the average is only 50 percent. This high percentage was obtained despite the fact that the total cloudiness was 7.7, or 1.5 above average, weatherman M. L. Caldwell points out.

But the precipitation total of 1.16 inches was 1.11 inches below normal. This makes the month seem quite dry. Actually it was still quite moist compared to the dry April of 1939 when only .15 inches of precipitation fell.

Highest temperature for the month was 84, on April 19, and lowest was a freezing 32 degrees on April 4. Average maximum was 62.2 degrees and minimum was 40 degrees.

The strongest wind of the month was recorded on April 7 when gusts reached 30 m.p.h. The average prevailing wind, however, was only 4.6 m.p.h.

Pakistan On Democracy Basis, Visitor Declares

WASHINGTON, May 4. — (AP) — Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan of Pakistan told Congress today that his new nation was founded on democracy and will remain true to its principles.

The leader of the world's largest Moslem state, starting an official tour of the U. S., said that "no threat or persuasion, no material or ideological allurements can deflect us from the path we have chosen."

He voiced a plea at the same time that leaders of world opinion use their wisdom and power "to dispel and not to enhance the fears of an apprehensive world."

New Dial Telephone Office For Roseburg Area Will Be Operating By February, 1951

Roseburg's new dial telephone office, central point of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company's expansion and improvement program in this area, will be in operation by next February, according to a progress report made today by Manager R. J. Henwood.

Cost of improvements and additions in the Roseburg exchange alone—including the new building at Jackson and Mosher streets, the dial central office equipment itself, and poles, wires and cables for outside line extensions—will total \$1,616,000, Henwood said.

He gave the following breakdown of budgeted expenditures: Land, building, and central office equipment—\$1,214,000; Outside plant (urban)—\$115,000; Outside plant (rural)—\$287,000.

Outside plant costs in Roseburg proper will be principally for cables and conduits necessary in re-centering controls in the new office, while rural expenditures will cover extension and rebuilding of the suburban and farmer line plant, Henwood explained.

These figures, Henwood pointed out, are in addition to sizable outlays already made in establishing new dial exchanges at Oakland, Sutherlin and Camas Valley, and in moving the Drain magneto office to larger quarters and increasing its capacity last year.

The new unattended dial office at Glendale, announced in April, will be started in August and is tentatively set for service early next year.

Further Extension Planned

Henwood indicated that still further extension of dial service is being planned for the area surrounding Roseburg. Another new dial exchange, plans of which are to be released shortly, and several miles of new distribution plant are in the program, he said.

During the past week, company representatives have called on rural residents throughout the territory to determine service requirements. Those without service are being given an opportunity to sign up now for telephones to be installed when lines are constructed.

At the same time, farmer line customers are being offered dial service when it becomes available. They have a choice of continuing to maintain their own lines, with switching service furnished by the Pacific company as at present, or of transferring their holdings and "letting the telephone company worry about rehabilitation and maintenance," Henwood said.

5,500 Telephones Served

Work now is underway in the Roseburg telephone building, which houses the company's business office and coaxial cable equipment, to prepare the second floor for switchboards and other operating facilities. Installation of the dial apparatus is to be started this fall, and completed in time for thorough testing before the conversion to dial operation by February, Henwood stated.

The Roseburg exchange presently is serving more than 5,500 telephones, and is handling an average of 28,400 local and long distance calls a day. Long distance calls alone currently are averaging more than 1,500 a day. This compares with 2,400 telephones in service at the end of the war, in August, 1945, when total daily calls averaged 8,300, and long distance ran about 700 calls per day.

FBI Infiltrates 'Commie' Cells, Attorney Declares

WELLESLEY, Mass., May 5. — (AP) — Former trust-buster Thurman Arnold says the FBI and members of the Un-American Activities committee infiltrate Communist cells.

Speaking before a Wellesley college audience last night, Arnold said: "These days every Communist cell is comprised of 50 percent Communists, 25 percent members of the FBI and 25 percent members of the Un-American Activities committee."

Without elaborating, Arnold said "the professional informant has become the moulder of our foreign policy."

The ex-chief of the Justice department's anti-trust division is now a member of the law firm defending Owen Lattimore against Communist charges.

AFL Official Hits Effort To Swing Vote To Flegel

PORTLAND, May 4. — (AP) — State AFL Secretary James T. Marr took a swing yesterday at attempts of Portland central labor council leaders to swing the labor vote for Austin Flegel in the Democratic gubernatorial primary.

Marr said the Portland council had made an issue of a 1949 amendment to the state unemployment compensation act by voting to support candidates favoring its repeal. He criticized council President Roy Renoud for calling on labor to support Flegel.

Marr said the labor records of the two other Democrats in the gubernatorial race were equally good. Marr said both Lew Wallace and State Treasurer Walter Pearson have declared for repeal of the legislative amendment to issue. The state federation's executive board had declared all three were acceptable and did not favor any one candidate.

Marr's protest came as the second Oregon Congressional district labor league for political education distributed cards endorsing Flegel for Governor, U. S. senator Wayne Morse for renomination, Vernon Bull, La Grande, for the nomination to Congress and Walter L. Toole, Portland, for the State supreme court.

Meanwhile, State Treasurer Pearson cited history to support his argument that if elected governor he could appoint the state treasurer. He said it had been done in two previous instances.

"Two Republican secretaries of state succeeded to the governorship, took the oath of office, and kept both offices," Pearson said. "The Republicans can do it. The Democrats can, too. I do not intend to occupy both offices, but will appoint a Democrat as state treasurer," Pearson declared.

Pearson referred to the late Frank W. Benson, who moved up in office in 1909, and Ben W. Olcott, who did the same in 1919. They both advanced because they were in line of succession when the governor was unable to serve, as provided by the constitution.

Horrible Sin: Red Paper Misquotes Joe Stalin

BERLIN, May 4. — (AP) — The east German Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland today publicly confessed to an "unforgivable mistake" — misquoting Joseph Stalin.

Yesterday the paper printed Stalin's "12 pre-conditions for the development of a (Communist) party of the new type."

One of these points, as it came out in print, stated:

"It is necessary for the party to understand that its leaders must be selected from the best elements of progressive fighters so that it will have genuine representative of the struggle of the reactionary proletariat."

Today red-faced Neues Deutschland carried a correction:

"Naturally," it said, "we meant revolutionary and not reactionary proletariat."

It added: "The editorial board will take the necessary measures."

He is charged with sending threatening letters to Miss Christine Matson, 25. Stanford was arrested by FBI agents April 24. He is held in the county jail in lieu of \$15,000 bail.
