Fish And Potatoes Turkey Good Any Season Of Year Team Deliciously

The team of fish and potatoes is as famous as ham and eggs. Let's consult the Fish and Wildlife Service of the U. S. Department of the Interior on this matter.

New England Fish Chowder

(Serves 6)
One pound fillets, 2 tablespoons bacon, chopped, 1/2 cup onions, chopped, 2 cups hot water, 1 cup potatoes, diced, 2 cups rich milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and a dash of pepper.

Cut fillets in about 1-inch cubes. Fry bacon until crisp and browned. Add water and potatoes and cook 10 minutes or until potatoes are partially tender. Add fish and cook until it can be flaked easily when tested with a fork. Add milk, seasonings, and heat. Serve immediately with chopped parsley sprinkled over the top.

Fish Patties

(Serves 4)
One and one-half cups flaked cooked (or canned) fish, 1/4 cup dry mashed potatoes, 1 tablespoon finely-chopped onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, pepper, flour, fat.

Combine all ingredients except flour and salt. Shape mixture into patties, roll in flour, and brown in fat.

Fried Fish (Serves 4)
Use 2 pounds fillets, steaks or pan-dressed fish, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon milk or water, 1 cup bread crumbs, cracker crumbs, corn-meal or flour.

Cut fish into serving-size portions. Sprinkle both sides with salt and pepper. Beat eggs slightly, and blend in the milk. Dip fish in the eggs and roll in crumbs. Place fish in a heavy frying pan which contains about 1/2 inch melted fat, hot but not smoking. Fry at a moderate heat. When fish is brown on one side, turn carefully and brown the other side. Cooking time is about 10 minutes depending on the thickness of the fish. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve immediately on a hot platter, plain or with sauce. Serve with French fried potatoes.

Turkey Good Any Season Of Year

For spring dinners turkey is always a good buy. Today, it is a year-round menu item.

Barnett Gabriel head of A. & P.'s national egg and poultry department, explains why. "Improved production methods and more efficient distribution make turkeys available right through the year. This availability of broadbreasted turkeys at such favorable prices and the fact that there are now over 28 million pounds on hand puts them on the festive table in spring, too."

But the cheesecloth versus basting of turkey controversy goes on. Kathryn B. Nile, home economics director of the Poultry and Egg National Board, urges me with soft-spoken conviction to plug for cheesecloth.

"Roast turkey at low temperature," she says. "Cover top and cloth with fat from bottom pan preferably white cheesecloth. Moistened cloth with fat from bottom of pan if cloth dries slightly during cooking."

It's scientific, undoubtedly. Some of our best friends do it. Nevertheless, we stick to basting. It

gets to be a family affair. Every one takes a whack at it, even the early guests. The cookery experts of the U. S. Department of Agriculture agree with us. They say "baste." So that matter is settled to our crisp brown satisfaction.

For a Sunday treat, old-fashioned strawberry shortcake is always welcome. Use your favorite biscuit dough with a little extra shortening. To serve, split warm biscuits in half, remove some of the soft part then butter. Cover with slightly sweetened fresh strawberries. Use heavy or whipped cream.

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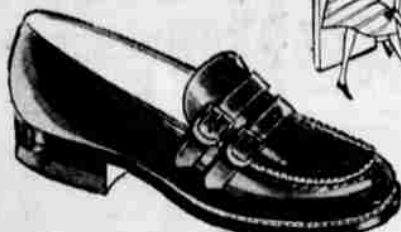
