Slated Govt. Investigation Of Crime Puts Spotlight On Anti-Gambling Law Flouting

WASHINGTON.—Now we're going to have a nationwide investigation of crime by a special committee of senators. Senator Estes Kefauver, Tennessee Democrat, proposed this last January. The Senate didn't get around to approving the idea until this month.

This committee, with the help of a hired staff of investigators, will dig into the doings in various cities around the country. (Don't confuse this with the hearings held here for several weeks now by another Senate committee trying to figure out a way of choking off race horse information pumped to gamblers around the country by wire and phone.)

(This committee has called in a number of people who might have something to say on this, including some gambling big shots. But these hearings have not really been a crime investigation. They were not intended to be.)

The big question facing the Senate investigators as they start out is this:

1. Is there a super-gang of mobsters running a nationwide crime syndicate?

2. Or is crime, although it crisscrosses the nation, more of a local enterprise engaged in by local mobsters trying to make a fast buck?

The attorney general, J. Howard McGrath, says that if there is a nationwide crime syndicate, his Justice department doesn't know about it. But some state and city officials, asking government help to mop up, say there is such a syndicate, pulling the crime strings everywhere.

Gambling Laws Flouted
Nevertheless, gambling is nationwide although everywhere, except in Nevada, there are laws against gambling. All states have laws against other forms of crime, such as prostitution, extortion, swindling, and narcotics. But it's gambling which has the spotlight now.

It's hard to believe a gambler can operate in one place very long without the knowledge and connivance of local police or city officials. If he's allowed to continue, it's because he pays off or has done, or is doing, political favors and gets protection that way.

You can see why this is so: unless he's being paid off or has received orders from higher up, even the cop on the beat couldn't afford to let a gambling joint do business under his nose.

If he did, sooner or later he could be accused of stupidity, failure to do his duty, or taking graft. So he'd be a sap to let a law violator work near him unless he was getting money or orders from above.

And so on up the line. Which means that wherever there's any extensive gambling there's corruption. And corruption, since money hunger is the root of it, undermines government and leads to worse crimes, like murder.

State Earns Profit
A number of states, although they have laws against gambling, are not opposed to gambling as gambling. In them it just depends on where the gambling is done.

But personal services aren't all the girls were paying for. Groups bid for the privilege of watching a bubble-gum blowing contest among four of their tutors. Others paid to listen to a faculty barber shop quartet strain throats and octaves.

Students Suspended For Peril-Fraught Hazing

YOUNGSTOWN, O., May 5.—(AP)—Eight upperclassmen were under suspension from Youngstown college classes today because of an initiation hazing in which fraternity pledges were marooned overnight on a Lake Erie breakwater.

Dr. Howard W. Jones, college president, also announced that the charter of Phi Gamma, the fraternity involved, had been suspended indefinitely.

Dr. Jones declined to disclose the names of the eight students who drew indefinite suspension by the executive committee of the college. The committee also voted to tighten enforcement of hazing rules and set up new regulations for initiations.

Eight pledges of Phi Gamma were stranded 100 yards out in Lake Erie near Ashtabula until several hours after daybreak when the coast guardmen said if the lake had got rough during the night the boys might have drowned.
