Bigger School System Calls
For Bigger School Budget;

Bigger school system—bigger school budget.

Voters will go to the polls Friday, June 2, to decide on an amount of \$342,778.87 outside the six percent limitation. Voting will take place at the junior high school between the hours of 3-9 p.m., daylight saving time, (2-8 p.m. standard time).

C. Of C. Week
Starting Monday

The week starting May 7 has been proclaimed by Mayor Albert G. Flegel as Roseburg Chamber of Commerce recruiting week. All organizations and individuals are urged by the mayor to cooperate in the recruitment program to the end that "our chamber of commerce be prepared to render the increased service demanded by our ever expanding economy and population growth."

Head-On Car Crash
On Coast Injures 4

DEPOE BAY, Ore., May 6.—(AP)—A head-on collision of two automobiles on a coast highway brought north of here last night sent four persons to a hospital with serious injuries.

Police said the impact drove the engines of both cars against the front seats, showed one car off the bridge and toppled the other into a roadside ditch.

Suffering multiple fractures, cuts and shock were Mr. and Mrs. Glen F. Eldredge, R. 1, Sheridan. They were driving north. Occupants of the southbound car were William Wade and Lillian Sellers, both Portland.

All four were taken to the McMinville hospital for emergency treatment and then removed to Portland hospitals.

The injured were unable for several hours to help police establish their identities. Wade was driving a car registered to Jack Gregg, Portland.

Anti-Histamine Drug
Test Results Told

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(AP)—An armed services medical board reported yesterday that "numerous tests" have produced no evidence that present anti-histamine compounds help prevent or cure colds.

The group, called the epidemiology board, said the tests were made with civilian and military personnel suffering with colds and with volunteer groups artificially infected with the common cold virus.

Umpqua Dairy Asks Court
Order For Picketing EndMilk 'War'
Complaint
Registered

The Umpqua Dairy Products company yesterday asked the court for a temporary restraining order to stop picketing at the plant.

The complaint, filed Friday afternoon in circuit court, asks that the Umpqua Valley Milk Producers association, some of its members and the local Teamsters union be enjoined from picketing "in front of or in the immediate vicinity of" the plaintiff's place of business.

The request for a restraining order, upon which no judgment has yet been issued by the court, was filed following the third day of picketing by members of the producers association, affiliated with the Central Labor council, AF of L, Hearing Aided.

Each of the 16 named defendants were ordered by the court to appear Monday at 11 a.m. in circuit court in answer to orders to show cause why the pickets should not be enjoined.

Included in the complaint is the allegation that the plaintiff corporation has already been damaged in the sum of \$1,000, the sum asked in addition to costs and disbursements and "such other and further relief as the equity of the case may warrant."

Picketing continues
Meanwhile, picketing continued today the fourth consecutive day since the former-AF of L affiliates first set up the picket line. Umpqua dairy spokesmen said today the plant was still closed down, so far as milk processing, receiving and delivery was concerned. Although no home deliveries were being made by Roseburg dairy, that plant was still receiving milk, processing it and selling directly to customers who called at the plant. Melrose dairy, not affected by the strike, continued to make home deliveries, providing the city with an estimated ten percent of the normal milk supply.

Senators Assail
British Action
In Spying Case

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(AP)—Three senators assailed Great Britain today for withholding full cooperation from the United States in the Klaus Fuchs atomic spying case.

Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.), a member of the Senate House atomic committee, told a reporter he is shocked at reports that Britain has agreed to give the FBI only limited opportunity to question Fuchs, convicted of passing atomic secrets along to Soviet agents.

Sensors Bridges (R-NH) and Ferguson (R-Mich.) said information the FBI might get from Fuchs may be vital to defense plans under the North Atlantic pact and ought not to be denied this country.

There has been no official statement but reliable reports are that the British insist on fixing conditions under which FBI agents can talk to Fuchs—an arrangement the FBI is said to regard as inadequate if it is to get at the bottom of the atomic spying system.

A senator who asked that his name not be used publicly said even these unsatisfactory arrangements were not agreed to by the British except under pressure exerted by high American officials.

700 INVITED

Movie World Watches Wedding
Of Young Star Elizabeth Taylor

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., May 6.—(AP)—Elizabeth Taylor and Conrad (Nick) Hilton Jr., head to the altar tonight and thence to a reception featuring carved-ice statues of doves kissing and a horn of plenty spilling fruit.

There'll also be gustatorial trimmings—crablegs, chilled white chicken, smoked turkey and oysters—and champagne. Then the 18-year-old film star and her 23-year-old hotel-heir bridegroom leave on a honeymoon that will include three months in Europe.

About 20 M-G-M and Beverly Hills policemen were assigned to handle the thousands of fans expected to gather outside the Catholic Church of the Good Shepherd. Rope barriers were ready to be erected if needed to hold them in check.

The candle-lit ceremony, the movie capital's wedding of the year, was set for 7:30 p.m. (EST). Elizabeth planned a quiet day, following what her mother called a small dinner at the Taylor home last night. She added, "We've been going around in circles. It's certainly been hectic."

A telephone caller to the Taylor home could hear a vacuum-cleaner whining in the background. That was a houseman cleaning up the packing after each wedding gift arrived. There were two secretaries answering the busy telephone and doorbell.

A re-check of seating accommodations at the wedding rehearsal Thursday night indicated that it will be possible to squeeze in all 700 invited guests.

They include the Fred Astaire, Ann Blythe, the Fred Brisons (Rosamund Russell), Jerome Courtland, Montgomery Clift, Gloria De Haven, the Ben Gages (Esther Williams), the Phil Harrises (Alice Faye) and the Van Johnsons. Among others invited are the Johnnie Johnstons (Kathryn Grayson), the Gene Kellys, Janet Leigh, the Tom Lewises (Loretta Young), Peter Lawford, Ann Miller, Margaret O'Brien, the Walter Pidgeons, the Dick Powells (June Allyson), Ginger Rogers, the Red Skeltons, Colleen Townsend, and California Gov. and Mrs. Earl Warren.

Evacuation Seen
J. W. Sanger, general manager of the Winnieby hydro, said the emergency council meeting the city will be faced with a major evacuation job, in the event of a further rise of five feet; one which might have to be handled on a "national organization basis."

The Winnipeg Tribune quoted Mr. Sanger as saying "total evacuation of Winnipeg might be necessary."

Hundreds of blocks in the city and suburbs—sheltering a total of 300,000 persons—lay under water.

Street car and bus travel was disrupted as seven subways were flooded, one bridge knocked out of action and another opened and closed intermittently. Telephone communication was disrupted to flood-stricken sections.

An estimated 220 patients were evacuated from two municipal hospitals in the Riverview section of Fort Rouge.

Programs interrupted
Radio stations interrupted programs constantly with the latest flood bulletins and appeals to residents. Scores of social events were canceled.

Three hundred families have been evacuated from the Wildwood Park area of Fort Garry. Fifty square blocks of West Kildonan are flooded.

Worse is to come.
A brand-new flood menace is predicted from the United States, source of the ramblous Red. Engineers at Grand Forks, N. D., said the Red there has risen sharply because of rains through the last few days. The water will be rolling in a giant new tide towards Winnipeg.

Nine Midwest States Hit
By Storm; At Least Nine
Killed, Many Are Injured

An early May storm, powered by tornadic winds, slashed a path of destruction across the Midwest yesterday. At least nine persons were killed and scores injured.

Properly damage across a nine-state area was expected to mount into the millions of dollars.

The violent winds—which reached gusts of 100 miles an hour in some areas—battered the weather-weary north central states all day and into the night. Tornadoes struck at two areas in Minnesota.

There was snow, rain, hail and blinding dust. Flood water plagued some sections. A huge low pressure area extended over the entire north central part of the nation.

Truman Plan
For Business
Praised, Hit

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(AP)—

The new five-point program submitted by President Truman to aid small businessmen drew high praise today from Senate Democrats—and sharp criticism from Senator Wherry (R-Neb).

The program, sent to Congress in a special message late yesterday, calls for government insurance of loans to small business and for creation of investment companies to make long term loans.

It got a cool reception in New York banking circles. There was no immediate comment from small business groups.

Sensors Lucas (D-Ill): Maybank ("SC"), and Sparkman (D-Ala.), who were informed in advance of the President's proposals, called them sound and constructive.

They said they would push for action at this session of Congress. Maybank, chairman of the banking committee, promised to start hearings on the proposals not later than June 1.

Senator Humphrey (D-Minn.), a member of the new special Senate small business committee, said Mr. Truman's program "charts a course of action that has long been needed and that will offer hope and incentive to the American economy."

But Wherry, the Senate Republican leader, said small businessmen want less government spending, lower taxes and less interference by government in their business.

"Mr. Truman's five point program for putting the government in business shows that the President is still as far from understanding the problems of small business as he was last year in asking a return to price controls," Wherry said in a statement.

Mr. Truman's message reflected the administration's growing concern over the unemployment problem.

Soviet Tells Friendship
Of Former Prisoners

LONDON, May 6.—(AP)—Former Japanese prisoners of war have sent Soviet Prime Minister Joseph Stalin pledges of eternal friendship to Russia—all embroidered on a huge piece of silk according to Moscow radio.

The broadcast said a 26-yard-long banner carried the signatures of 66,434 ex-prisoners, a letter of 14,000 Japanese characters and a woodcut print of a group of standard bearers.

Maintaining that it was while they were interned in Russia that they first "became spiritually free and came to know the truth" the prisoners, according to the broadcast, wrote:

"We vow that neither the American imperialists nor the Japanese militarists will ever succeed in turning us again into their submissive soldiers, executing their criminal schemes."

WAVELL ILL
LONDON, May 6.—(AP)—Field Marshal Lord Wavell went to the hospital yesterday—his 67th birthday—for a serious abdominal operation. His family said his condition "will give rise to some anxiety for the next few days."

Wavell was one of Britain's top commanders in World War II.

Kidnaping
Possibility
Is StudiedFt. Lewis Officer
Maintains Youth's
Condition Too Good

TACOMA, May 6.—(AP)—Little Tommy Jenkins was found alive at 10 a. m. today 3,000 yards from his Fort Lewis home. His Irish Setter dog was with him.

FORT LEWIS, May 6.—(AP)—Maj. Arlie M. Heape, Fort Lewis provost marshal said today that three-year-old Tommy Jenkins who has been missing for two days has been found alive and well.

He apparently had been kidnapped, Major Heape said, and returned to the point at which he was picked up.

The major based his opinion on the fact the child was well and in excellent condition. The dog which disappeared with him was also found with the boy.

"We know he could not have been near the spot where he was found," the major said. "We have painstakingly searched every inch of that ground many times, with thousands of soldiers involved."

"No three-year-old boy could have survived two nights in the open with weather such as we have had the last 48 hours. If he had, he would have been suffering seriously from exposure. The dog, also, was in excellent condition, dry and apparently unharmed."

The youngster, son of a Fort Lewis sergeant, disappeared about a half mile from the spot where he was found in the woody North Fort. Three-year-old Tommy and Lassie vanished Thursday noon.

Three bloodhounds from nearby King county and the many groups of soldiers kept up their ceaseless hunt throughout the night.

The child's mother, the wife of Sgt. William H. Jenkins, rallied after treatment with opiates and followed the bloodhounds and the sheriff's deputies during the night.

Oscar Enger, 54,
Found Dead From
Gunshot Wound

Oscar William Enger, 54, of 1108 W. First St., was found dead in the bathroom of his residence at 5:30 p. m. Friday a victim of gunshot wounds, which Deputy Coroner M. B. Emmett reported were self-inflicted.

City and state police, the district attorney and Emmett investigated. According to Chief of Police Calvin B. Bird, Hov Phipps Rice, son-in-law of Enger, said he heard two shots. He investigated and found Enger in the bathroom with a .38 caliber revolver at his side.

Investigation indicated said Baird, that the first shot ricocheted off the wall, and landed in the bath tub. The second lodged in the victim's head.

On no person was found a receipt for a revolver and ammunition, indicating the gun was purchased about two hours prior to his death.

The family said Enger had been despondent for some time. Enger, a resident of Roseburg the last 10 years, was born July 1, 1895, at Thorsby, Wash. He had been a truck driver for Consolidated Freight 20 years. He held safe driver awards from both the National and Oregon Safety councils. He was a member of the B.P.O.E. 1168, Medford. He had lived in Medford and Eugene before coming to Roseburg.

Surviving are the widow, Beulah; a brother, Jesse, St. Mary's, Ida.; a daughter, Mrs. Maxine Carl, Salem; step-children, Mrs. Carol Hay, Roseburg, and Lionel Crossland, Puyallup, Wash.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Funeral home and services will be announced later.

'Flying Saucers' Reach

He was not hurt.
