Easing Of Pain By Hypnotism Demonstrated

DETROIT, (AP)—What hypnotism can do to ease pain was reported to the American Psychiatric association here.

The studies were made at Johns Hopkins university medical school. They were reported by Dr. Harold Rosen of Baltimore.

Hypnotism helps because pains are often partly due to emotions.

One case was a war veteran who hurt his back in an auto accident. He could not walk and couldn't work.

When hypnotized and told he could walk, he did so without difficulty.

The trance studies showed he was fooling himself without realizing it. He hated his job and the deep-seated emotion kept him from working by causing pain in his back.

A man fell downstairs and injured his head. Afterward he suffered blurred vision and headaches for no apparent cause. Hypnotism cured him of the eye and head troubles and revealed the real cause. This was worry about his family, finances and possible blindness.

Hypnotism cured the pain of a phantom leg, which is the sensation you still have use of the leg after it is amputated. Hypnotism used on such man revealed that he craved to be dependent on someone. Psychiatric treatment was then used to make him realize

the emotion. That cured him.

Dr. Rosen said Hypnotism can be used in three ways. One is to suggest deep sleep, another to suggest there is no pain, and the third to suggest the pain will no longer be disturbing. Each one works or fails largely according to the effect of emotions.
